GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

It is said that Cricket is a Dying Game; However I am sure that this statement has eminated from the pens of journalists describing the current state of the English Test Team. For proof to the contrary, notice should be taken of the ever increasing size of Associations like the R.D.C.A. since 1969-70 our Association has increased almost 70% in size from 117 teams (78 Senior, 39 junior) to the 196 teams of last season (114 Senior, 82 junior) to become the largest single Association in Victoria, if not Australia.

Whilst it is pleasing that our aim to provide facilities for as many cricketers as is possible, we must realise that, without certain refinements and modifications both faculities and administration, we must soon reach saturation point in the number of cricketers who can play within our boundaries.

Together with many of the Executive posts in the Association the position of Hon. General Secretary is, at/present time, too big for one person on a part time basis and I am fortunate to have the support of my wife, Ann, who acts as my Secretary.

Moves are under way to investigate a separate administrative body to control the Junior Section of our Association which, as you can see from previous data is fast approaching the size of our whole Association of 7 years ago.

Notwithstanding this, reorganisation of our Administration, which is considered will be to the advantage of all Clubs within the Association, I, as General Secretary and other members of the Executive rely greatly on the efficiency of the various office bearers of each club and in this regard I would wish to express my gratification to all Club Secretaries for their assistance over the past season.

The future of our Association looks most promising and with the provision of more cricket in the form of the highly successful "Twilight Competition", perhaps the innovation of a Sunday Competition, and the possible graduation of some of our top grades from matting to turf wickets in the foreseeable future, augers well for the growth and improvement of the standard of cricket in the Ringwood and District Cricket Association.

The registration and clearances for season 1975-76 were at an all - time high. According to the C.U.C.F. we are probably the largest junior association in Australia.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

Senior Teams

Season 1975-76 was again a successful year for our Senior teams winning the three Inter-Association matches played on Australia Day.

The Curtis Clark Shield was retained by the 1st eleven with a resounding win over the North Suburban Cricket Association when we lost only one wicket passing the opposition score with Colin Garrett getting a century.

The 2nd eleven accounted for the Dandenong Cricket Association avenging our defeat of the previous year.

The Under 21 team had a convincing win over the Nth Suburban C.A. after one loss and two matches ruined by rain during the Victorian Inter-Association matches played during the year. Again the team was selected after a aquad was chosen early in the season to allow time to practice and play matches on turf although the wet weather interfered with our plans.

Our thanks go to all who participated in these games and to Don Stevens for managing the Under 21 tean through all their matches.

Although we were completely successful om Aust. Day we must not rest on our laurels so I remind clubs that it is vital for this Association to play the best teams possible and that players must be given the opportunity to be seleffted by being nominated by their clubs.

SELECTION COMMITTEE (CONT.)

JuniorTeams:

Selection for the Australia Day Inter-Association matches wad made easy because only 16 boys/nominated for each side.

From our 1750 registered players of 3% were nominated by their clubs and considering the effort required to organise these games, the wisdom of continuing the Inter-Association games is open to question, in view of the apparent lack of interest by many clubs.

We were, however, able to win two of the three matches played against South Suburban Churches Cricket Association and each player selected was a credit to his club.

JUNIOR GRADES REPORT

The Junior Competition increased by 12 teams from last scason, the most pleasing feature being an increase in the Under 12 competition from 16 teams to 26 teams, necessitating a third division.

<u>Under 12 Competition</u> - New special rules were introduced for the Under 12 competition, the aim of these rules being to bring more batting and bowling to all of the team members, rather than the one or two stars.

These rules were met with some early doubt because not all Under 12 managers attended the special meetings called to discuss the formation and implentation of the new rules.

However, the rules proved to be an outstanding success and before the end of the season had gained the warm approval of all team managers.

One serious inconsistency was the reversion to senior rules for the final series. Although attempts were made to amend the rules before the finals, we had left our run too late and the final game in two grades became a "no contest" after the first day of play.

FINALS - The number of non competing team am managers who volunteered for umpiring duties in the final series was very disappointing.

For the first time we were unable to provide an umpire at each semifinal game and the standard of some games suffered as a result.

MATCH RESULTS SECRETARY

This has been the best year for return of Official Result Sheets since I became Match Results Secretary four seasons ago. The new design of the form has also reduced the number of times I have had to ring Clubs about queries on innings totals.

Nevertheless I must record the fact that a club missed out on the four in one grade because a team captain left it to the other team captain to fill out the result sheet and send it to me.

The result sheet showed the team to be all out when in fact it should have showed them to be only five wickets down. In addition it was filled in in such a way that it was not obvious that this was the case.

I have always taken the attitude that if a mistake is obvious I will check with the club as to the accurate score and of œurse fine that club for an inaccurate result sheet.

But the responsibility for an accurate result sheet always lies ***
with the team captain and hos club.

The Association Executive has consistently taken the stand that the Official Result Sheet which is sent to the Match Result Secretary is the Official result of the match. In the only case which has gone to appeal the Cricket Union of Victoria, that body has supported that view.

Therefore clubs should ensure that team captains are aware of their responsiblilies and that they actually check the result entered on the result sheet before signing it.

In presenting myreport I believe that mention should be made of those performances which are not just good performances, but which are performances "par excellence".

I had in mind that I would record those batsman who had scored centuries or those bowlers who had taken ten wickets or more in a match. However when I found that seventy-three batsman and twenty six bowlers had performed these feats in senior grades alone, I decided that higher criteria would have to be met.

Therefore this report presents details of those batsman who have scored 150 runs or more in an innings or who have scored more than one century in the season and those bowlers who have taken 14 or more wickets in a match or who have taken 10 or more wickets in a match more than once.

These can be properly called performances "Par Excellance".

Details of the seasons cricket performances are as follows: -- SENIOR GRADES.

Number of teams competing - 110 comprising of 12 in each of Chandler Shield, A, B, C, D, E, F, and G grades and 14 in H Grade. In addition 4 teams competed in an unofficial I Grade which was formed after the season commenced so that surplus players could get a game of cricket.
