#### EXECUTIVE REPORTS

<u>Highlights from Maurie Dears Senior Report</u>

Season 1981/82 saw a change in the allocation of duties within Registration and recording of the Junior section. Overall this change was successful and allowed administrators more time with other duties.

The season saw a great deal of coming and goings with a total of 146 teams from 38 clubs with 3100 registered players. 112 players sought and were granted clearances but throughout the season there was 53 unregistered players, 4 overage youngsters and 15 ineligible.

The computerised match reports again highlighed the mass number of errors in spelling, additions and balanced scores. Over one thousand four hundred problems required further action and costly re-input. The cost of \$1,571.00 to clubs in fines is a trend that must be rectified if clubs are to progress and gain the full benefits of computerised records. I will not embarrass those clubs who contributed significantly to the huge error rate but I will congratulate,

Norwood, South Warrandyte, Heathmont Uniting,

Heathmont Baptist, Scoresby and Wantirna as being the best six.

We ask you to examine your clubs system and rectify where needed. "How can I help" may be the best way to start a trend of error free recording.

### THE SEASON THAT WAS



The R.D.C.A. July Annual meeting enthusiastically elected new executive members Mr. Bob Giles (Ringwood) and Mr. Dan Gipp (Glen Park) and appointed Mr. Maurie Dear the new Registration Secretary. A new cricket club Vermont, was also included into the R.D.C.A. After several years of top class performances in lower grades the gradings Committee recognised the talent of Knox City, Wantirna Sth and Ainslie Park by lifting their first aged teams into the division one groups.

As we have become accustomed to, the early October games were washed out and it was almost November before Cricket was being played in sunshine on dry grounds. JOHN MARTIN HOLDEN again generously came forward with three monthly awards for outstanding performances of our youngsters. With half the season over the gradings were working well and almost every grade in their aged groups were even with little difference between most sides. It was also becoming clear that the intention of removing pressure from the Under 12 boys at finals time was having an adverse effect during the season, as many team managers pressed even harder to gain Premiership points.

The Inter-Association Carnivals were almost with us and it was pleasing to find 32 clubs nominating 168 boys for practise and trial matches. A total of 70 lads were finally selected as R.D.C.A. players with a broad representation of 27 clubs. The Carnivals as mentioned previously in Under 12, Under 14 and Under 16 were an outstanding success and it would also be fitting to draw attention to the excellent facilities that Ringwood, Croydon and East Ringwood Clubs made available.

Past years have seen clubs grouping together to provide an unofficial Under 12 competition and this year was no exception. Ringwood, Norwood, Montrose, Wantirna and Croydon United provided the nucleus of unofficial cricket that gave our timiest cricketers the chance to keep playing cricke on Saturday morning and in some case Friday evening at twighlight games. March bought finals time but again bad weather interrupted many games. However, by the end of March Vermont proved their all-round talent by taking the Under 16 Premiership, Wantirna Sth Under 14 and Croydon Nth Under 12's.

The Presentation evening was switched to the Ringwood Civic Centre with over 550 people in attendance. The entertainment and presentation was excellent and by far the biggest held by the R.D.C.A. The season was completed, but with the Indoor Centre gearing itself for coaching, the R.D.C.A. organised a six week sponsored clinic for 22 of its youngsters, from 14 clubs. We now look forward to 1982/83 and trust that through the clubs, their Junior Administrators, Managers and players the season ahead will provide good cricket and above all good sportsmanship.
