REPORT OF THE JUNIOR COMPETITION PRESIDENT 1986 - '87 SEASON

The junior competition of the R.D.C.A. continues to provide cricket in a friendly competitive atmosphere to more than 3000 young people of our area.

Despite a very disappointing start to the season due to a very wet September and October and a very high number of team withdrawls, the season finally was under way in October and the fixture and draw for all grades became settled by mid November.

The redraw of the fixture in some grades was complicated by the non-availability of some grounds due to the wet weather and in some instances this continued until the end of November.

The end of the season was also disrupted by bad weather and it is unfortunate that a couple of final games were unable to be played out.

However the highlight of the season was the very hard work that had to be done by Bob and Marian Giles in the redrafting of the fixture and ground allocations.

The personal contact that Bob made with the officials of each Club that was in trouble enabled a practical solution to be found for each problem and the very small number of mishaps that did occur were always the result of a lack of communication within the Club concerned.

Bob has indicated that he will not be available to perform this task next year and we will miss the dedication and enthusiasm of the entire Giles family that has been such a significant factor in the smooth running of our junior competition over the last few years.

Our Secretary, Rod Hinchliffe, has also indicated that his business work load has become too much for him to continue as our Secretary.

We have been very fortunate in the junior competition in having a succession of excellent people to perform our secretarial duties.

Rod has really been outstanding in this respect. He has been of immense value to me in his timely and neat presentation of minutes, letters etc and I know that he has been of great assistance to all of you at all times during the season.

On your behalf I thank these people for their efforts over the years and wish them every success in their new ventures.

The junior executive has had a very busy season but it has also been a rewarding one because of the most enjoyable co-operation that we have received from every Club in the competition.

I thank you for your support and your real interest in promoting junior cricket in our area. I trust that this interest will be rekindled each season as our competition becomes even stronger and our players gain the skills to fully enjoy this great game.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The 1986 -'87 cricket season has been and gone and its for sure that if there's one thing well all remember about it, thats the incredible run of bad weather we had right through it.

There is, though, another aspect we would be wise to take note of for the future. The simple statistics show that even when we could play, we didn't play as much cricket as we've done in past seasons. We had at least one instance of only 30 overs being bowled in a full mornings cricket and this wasn't outstanding! Only a couple of seasons ago we were regularly getting 50 overs in. Coupling this with the phone calls I was getting every Saturday through the season, I'm left with the clear impression that us adults are getting too involved in the matches to the extent that we're now holding them up.

I don't doubt that we all mean well. But we perhaps need to remind ourselves that its the boy's game and we should be doing all we can to let them get on with it. Our measures of "success" at the end of each day have to include how much cricket we played and how much the boys enjoyed it; not just whether we won or lost. Please let us all think about this seriously before we front up for season 87/88.

Talking about 87/88, you'll have a new Junior Secretary. I've really enjoyed my two years as Secretary and wouldn't be looking to give the job up if it weren't for other pressures mounting on me I would like to thank everyone for the assistance and support given me over the last two years; 1'm sure that my successor will get the same support and, I trust, enjoy the job as much as I have.

JUNIOR REGISTRATION AND RECORDS SECRETARIES REPORT

Season 86/87 saw the Junior Section of the R.D.C.A. maintain its high standard of Junior Cricket. Not only has the standard been maintained, but the size of the competition has been maintained.

Obviously with a large body to administer the workload placed on the committee of the Junior Executive is proportionate. However this work can be reduced by careful planning and administration by all participating clubs, particularly Junior Administrators and Team Managers.

The three major areas of concern each year are:-

- 1. Final Team nominations, this is usually not settled until RD 3. Careful planning by clubs may alleviate this problem.
- 2. Unregistered or Ineligible players. This leads to either fines or loss of points to the clubs concerned. Close liaison between team managers and Junior Administrators will reduce this problem.
- 3. Match result sheets. Errors that occur in this area are misspelt players names, team codes and grades incorrect, and players performances omitted. These errors lead to fines that could be reduced by careful administration by team managers.

applications totalled 91, this by far the lowest number for

many seasons.

Unfortunately there will always be problems with

unregistered and ineligible players, the result being loss of

points or fines. In season 86/87 there were 34 unregistered

players and 4 overage players. This resulted in 10 teams losing

hard earned points, whilst the remainder received fines.

Apart from the problems mentioned, the clubs which form

the R.D.C.A. must be thanked for providing cricket of a high

standard for many Junior Cricketers.

This season the R.D.C.A. Junior Executive continued its Representative matches against the following associations.

Two matches were played against FTGDCA, these comprised of one U14 match and one U12 match. A later U16 match was rained off. Both matches were played in good spirit but unfortunately were marred by rain.

The R.D.C.A. travelled to Shepparton in November. Matches were played at Under 18, 16 and 14 levels. These games were played on turf, the results being a win to the R.D.C.A. Under 18 side and losses to the Under 16 and 14 sides. Shepparton visited the R.D.C.A. at Ringwood Cricket Ground in February with Under 16 and 14 sides, these games were both won by the R.D.C.A. As always the matches between these two associations were played in good spirits.

During March the R.D.C.A. went to Cobram with an Under 16 side to play the GOULBURN VALLEY CRICKET ASSOCIATION in an Annual match. This match was played on turf and was won by the R.D.C.A.

The Junior Executive has a policy in which we endeavour to give as many Junior players as possible the experience of playing in these types of matches. In the 8 games played this season over 90 boys were given games.

In addition to these games many more boys were given games in DOWLING SHIELD, R.M. HATCH SHIELD and IACC matches. This an indication of the strength of the R.D.C.A. Junior Competition.
