# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 1997/98 cricket season was again one of change to the Association, as we experienced the loss of the senior division of the Scoresby club while the Glen Park members decided to disband. This required a recasting of the grading system from A Grade downwards resulting in three clubs namely Olinda, Eastfield and South Warrandyte having their first eleven competing in B Grade. The balance of the B Grade comprised second elevens from 9 of the A grade clubs. This was considered by the Executive, to be the best least disruptive option to the whole competition.

The three affected clubs accepted their situation and to their credit all finished in the top four of B Grade with Olinda reaching the Grand Final. The grading system which applied in the season under review will continue in the 98/99 season. The decision of Croydon United and Croydon Hockeyers to merge into a new club may create some minor variation to the grading structure.

Congratulations are again extended to Croydon North who came from third place on the ladder to repeat their 1996/97 Chandler 1 success against Ferntree Gully. Templeton earned promotion to Chandler Shield in 98/99 when they defeated East Ringwood in a nail biter A Grade grand final. With great player depth and a strong and virile administration, Templeton will prove a worthy member of the top grade. The final series enjoyed good weather, good cricket and generally an excellent spirit of sportsmanship.

At the end of the season almost 5000 people were registered as players with the RDCA. You will recall that, at the end of the 96/97 season a complete review was made of the membership list which saw some 3000 names being omitted. Those who had not participated in a game in the previous season were deleted. Approximately 1300 new people were added to the player lists in 1997/98, thus indicating a high interest in the cricket in our area.

Much of this comes from our very active junior competition, which showed a substantial increase in its membership base despite a downward trend in some other sports and other cricket associations. All thinking cricketers realise that a strong under age competition is essential for the continued development of cricket at our level and we are indeed fortunate to have a dedicated team of experienced and enthusiastic people on our junior executive and in our clubs.

Ian Spencer has indicated he will not be continuing as President of the Junior section and we extend to Ian our grateful thanks for the wonderful service given to the juniors of the RDCA during his period as President.

Early in the season we expressed disappointment with the coverage given by the local press to the Association. However, following approaches to both main groups the coverage improved vastly as the season progressed. It was good to see one group which did not provide any coverage in the 96/97 season, give reasonable space in their papers, particularly in those printed for the Maroondah and Yarra Ranges municipalities. The Executive will continue to press for this coverage to improve further next season. While there are other ways of distributing information to clubs and players the publicity generated by details provided in the local press is invaluable.

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT cont.

One of the most positive outcomes of the recent changes on local government has been the planning that the Councils are giving to the upgrading of our sporting records, so that maintenance is reduced while the playing surface is improved and better conditions prevail for the whole season.

During the season our fixtures were disrupted while several of our top ovals underwent extensive upgrades. It is understood that a number of other grounds have been listed for major works over the next few seasons. Clubs should make representations to their respective councils to ensure that an appropriate priority is set for the work to minimise the interruption to the cricket season. The Executive will assist where possible with discussions with Councils.

My thanks to members of the Executive for their continued hard work and interest. We welcomed Russell Jenzen on to the Committee and his experience coupled with his enthusiasm enabled him to contribute solidly to the work of the Executive.

I expressed my thanks to the Pascoe family for their continued work for the Association in the social area, score reception, press reporting and in regard to Steve his assistance to me as vice-president. The Newey family are among our hardest workers, covering the registration and financial aspects of the Association with flair and gusto.

We continue to reap the harvest of the steady, reliable organising work of our Secretary. I am certain that our success and good reputation of is assisted by the administration work Lindsay, who makes himself available at all hours to respond to your concerns and queries. We are fortunate to have Lindsay as our secretary, because his wide cricket experience and deep love of the game and his desire to make the game as enjoyable as possible for every member of the Association.

My personal thanks to each of the Executive members for their input at the meetings and to their contribution to the smooth operation of the RDCA.

I look back on the 97/98 season with a warm sense of enjoyment because of the keen competition and good sportsmanship that existed during the season.

I look forward to future cricket seasons with confidence knowing that our administration is the best in the business, we have a solid financial and membership base and perhaps, most importantly, an increasing number of under age players participating in the various grades.

# GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The 78th Annual Meeting held in the Ainslie Park clubrooms on 20 August officially commenced the 1997/98 season of the RDCA. Bill Wilkins was re-elected as President got the 10th successive year.

As indicated in Bill's report the loss of two clubs caused a restructure of all grades below Chandler. In retrospect this probably provided a more competitive season in many of the lower grades. When the last ball was bowled on 15 March, all agreed that this was the least interrupted season, weatherwise, in the past 30 years. It is interesting to note that the one day competition has grown to 16 teams since its inception two seasons ago when 6 teams competed.

The agreement with Kookaburra for the exclusive use of the company's balls reached its third and final year. The number of complaints received was the lowest in the three seasons. The Executive will consider all offers received for the supply of cricket balls for the forthcoming seasons.

One of the major achievements of the season was actually accomplished prior to its commencement. I refer to the revision of the rule book which was officially adopted at the AGM. The new layout makes it far easier to follow.

Croydon North continued its dominance of the Chandler grade with another premiership while Templeton will play in the top grade for the first time in 98/99, following its narrow win in the A Grade grand final. Details of all Grand Finals appear in the appropriate section of this book.

The Tribunal and Investigation Committee met on 2 occasions during the season and two players received suspension of 2 matches while a further 2 players accepted a 2 match suspension in lieu of a tribunal hearing. The Investigation Committee suspended 11 players for a total of 44 weeks (4 weeks each) for a breach of the rules in relation to the use of alcoholic drinks during the hours of play. 13 players were named for breaches of the Code of Conduct (the lowest since the code was introduced in 1993/94).

Two clubs sought leave to appeal to the CUOV against decisions of the RDCA Committee. Leave was granted but the Union refused each appeal.

Members of the Executive again managed the affairs of the Association with great professionalism and expertise.

As indicated above, Bill Wilkins completed a decade as President of the Association. As I have mentioned in other reports, Bill's vast experience in local government has proved invaluable to the Association. You will have read in his report the extensive amount of ground worked which have been undertaken and Bill has been able to provide his expertise in many cases. It is hoped that when Bill decides to move from the presidency, he will continue to assist the RDCA in this area. Thanks are extended to Bill for his leadership of the Association and the Executive.

Steve Pascoe remained as Bill's deputy and on a number of occasions stepped into the President's role when Bill was unable to be present. Steve is a strong advocate for players to be given the opportunity to play their cricket in the best possible conditions, but he is also firmly of the view that clubs and their players must follow the rules or suffer the consequences.

Ann Pascoe continued with her role as Social Convener and the success of the functions each season is proof of her organising ability. Ann also helps Rachelle with the phone scores.

Joan and Stuart Newey form another family combination as Treasurer and Registration Secretary, although at most times they are assisting each other with their respective roles. Stuart, of course, as part of his role with the Association is in control of the computer. Stuart's business expertise, particular in the finance area, has made his contribution to the RDCA most invaluable over a period now 20 years.

The Match Committee comprises Neil Tull (Chairman), David Beatty, Adrian Brush and Russell Jenzen. David concentrates his activities on the Under 18 and Under 21 squads and he shows exceptional enthusiasm and dedication in relation to the management and training of these two squads. Neil also assists David with the above mentioned squads. Neil with Adrian and Russell have control over the selection and management of the senior squad. They are also responsible for the selection of the All Stars team. Further details are outlined in other sections of the report.

As mentioned in the Presidents report, the Executive appointed one of its number, the Chairman of the RDCA Umpires Association. John Tynan accepted the position without hesitation and members of the Executive were of the opinion that it allowed for a greater exchange of views between the two bodies. John appointment was widely accepted by the umpires. Pat Meehan, although not umpiring in the 97/98 season, continued as Secretary and his contribution to the RDCA Executive and to the umpires over an extended period has been invaluable. Pat has decided to step down from his position but is keen to continue his membership of the Executive.

Ian Spencer continued as Junior Representative in his role as President of that Administration. Ian is a strong advocate of the need for a strong junior group to ensure the future viability of the RDCA. The number of Association activities undertaken by his Committee on behalf of all under-age players is quite remarkable and the success of the representative teams is proof of the commitment provided by Ian and his Committee. Due to some other pressing cricket priorities Ian is standing down from the Presidency at the next AGM. His presence will be sorely missed.

Of course, as well as their concentration on the areas referred to above, all members are part of your elected executive which looks at all matters relating to the operation of the Ringwood and District Cricket Association. I thank them personally for the assistance they give to me as the Secretary of this Association.

Twenty years (1968 - 1988) as President and now ten years as Patron is the record of William Dean OAM JP. Prior to that Bill was Social Secretary and a member of the Executive, so we are approaching 40 years of service to the RDCA. Bill, as well as being Patron, is very active in the Veterans area and also is seen as a strong advocate of the Junior section of our Association. Bill, as he did during his time as President, spends the greater part of his Saturdays during the cricket season at different games throughout all the grades. We look forward to his continued involvement in the Association for many years.


# GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT cont.

A special thanks to all scorers for their dedication and assistance to umpires. My personal thanks is extended to John Martin, RDCA Delegate Gerald Giles and Training Officer Colin Hill who assisted David Rashleigh in the training of new umpires. Special thanks to David for his tireless outstanding efforts in dealing with appointments, captain's queries, his advice to umpires which included travelling to many games each Saturday. David is appreciated by all involved with the RDCA.

# CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA - DELEGATE'S REPORT

The Union oversights the operation of all junior cricket in Victoria to ensure that the proper recognition is given to Associations such as the RDCA for the work that they play in the development of cricket at the grassroots level.

The Union is active in the organisation of various cricket carnivals ranging from the Under 21 competition played from November to February each season to the under 12, under 14 and under 16 carnivals played during the school holiday period in January. Scorebooks were again provided at a most competitive price but at this stage it is not certain whether this service will continue in 98/99 as many Associations have opted to use other books.

The VCA Facilities Fund is administered by the CUOV and the Association strongly recommends the fund. The Union is also developing its own grant scheme details of which were sent to clubs during the last season.

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Unlike the previous season, the weather god was extremely good to us with only one days play interrupted.

Unfortunately that day was our "grading" rounds and the inability to get results made the determinations on whether teams should be moved to other divisions somewhat clouded. This process is very subjective and at times clubs are not in the respective divisions were relatively even in standard.

Premiership are terrific to win, but in my view junior administrators have an obligation to enter teams in a division which challenges their players ability to prove the level of their game.

When I first joined the junior executive, four seasons ago, cricket was faced with a real challenge from basketball and the number of teams in the competition was diminishing.

It is therefore extremely pleasing to report that in season 97/98 there was an increase of 8 teams (to total of 148) and new registrations were up by more than 100 as compared to 96/97.

Essentially this increase is a spin off from the "Vic Hit/Milo have a go" program and those clubs who have embraced and worked very hard with this concept have and will continue to reap considerable benefits from their efforts. Clubs that have not yet become involved are urged to give it serious consideration.

A consequence of the increase in teams is a shortage of ground availability. Clubs should be on notice that the Junior Committee, perhaps as soon as next season, will have to schedule games on a Friday night and/or Sunday morning.

In keeping with the Rule that it is now compulsory for clubs to have a certain number of accredited coaches we arranged the conduct of courses prior to, and during, the season. The response was again positive and in excess of forty people obtained accreditation. Thanks to the generosity of the RDCA Veterans Association and the VCA there was no cost passed to the clubs and/or participants.

In last years annual report I wrote that a disturbing aspect of the season 96/97 was the number of instances that necessitated a penalty for breaches of the rules and/or procedures and the club administrators were asked to make a big effort to improve in this area. I would like to report that the result was positive but, in fact, it was quite the opposite and extremely disappointing.

Whilst no longer on the Junior Committee, I will continue to have some involvement with juniors at club level and looking forward to continuing contact with many of you in forthcoming seasons.

The final series was an outstanding success with the contribution from the volunteer umpires and official RDCA umpires who officiated in the under 16-1. The number of clubs who support the Junior Final series by their seniors volunteering to participate is left to few and this needs to be addressed in the coming season.

In closing I would like to thank the Committee for all the hard work and dedication throughout the season which made the task of secretary much easier. I am not seeking reelection as secretary but will continue in a different role next season. My thanks goes out to all the Junior Administrators for their support through my term as secretary.

Congratulation to all the premiership and the individual RDCA award winners.

# JUNIOR RESULT SECRETARY REPORT

# VETERANS REPORT 1997/98

The tenth season has been completed very successfully. Only one forfeit occurred from the 111 games played, and that was due to a mix up of grounds. Thanks to all the coordinators for meeting their commitment to the Veterans competition.

We have been free of unsociable conduct for ten years, unfortunately Bayswater Park Vets were involved in a dissapointing situation in their Grand Final, which we are assured will not occur again.

The 30 sides (an increase from 24) enjoyed wonderful weather all year and no games were lost from weather. We welcomed new clubs LowerEltham & Panton Hills this year and they fitted in very well. Previous clubs, Croydon North, Norwood and WongaPark all returned.

The Inter-association game is the highlight of the year and many new faces played this year. The results in both the over 40,s and over 50,s were good wins to RDCA. The games were played at Silcock, and we thank Croydon Hockeyers for hosting the games, at very short notice, when wet weather caused the Bayswater pitches to be unplayable. Captains Ian Spencer & AvianWilliams led two good sides with both teams playing to a very high standard. Thanks to Bill Stafford, Jeff Luscombe, Steve Pascoe and Alan Duffus for their efforts as managers and selectors.

This profit will continue to financially support the core of cricket, (our junior cricketers) at every opportunity, and assist the cricketers that represent our Association either Interstate or Overseas.

Sixteen people represented us in South Africa, at the Golden Oldies festival. Over 50 teams attended from all around the world. We thank these people for representing RDCA on their three week trip.

The competition standard continued to improve with all the best of the districts over 40's participating in our teams.

In Division 4, our new division. North Ringwood, the underdogs managed to beat Ely Park at Ely Park, well done. They are the winner of the Max Brown trophy.

In Division 3, we saw Wonga Park finish on top, undefeated, but lose to a very good team in Norwood. Both very good strong clubs returning to Vets, well done to both teams.

In Division 2, Bayswater Park won the Ken Johnston trophy from undefeated Warrandyte, which was a fine effort.

Our patrons trophy in Division 1 was won Croydon Hockeyers who finished on top. # Cricket in Capetown

A Ringwood District Cricket Association Veterans Team has recently returned from 22 days in Africa. The main purpose of their tour was to attend the World Golden Oldies (over 40) Cricket Festival in Capetown, South Africa from March 8th-15th. Ken Johnston President of the R.D.C.A. Veterans, was Tour Manager and Steve Pascoe Captain of the Team.

The eight day Festival attracted entries from 69 participating teams representing the following countries:- South Africa, New Zealand, Bermuda, Botswana, Canada, England, USA, Zimbabwe, Argentina, Namibia and of course Australia and in particular Victoria which was represented by two teams. The other team being The Australian Cricket Society who had as a member Phillip Opas QC who is 81 years old. Phil played for Ringwood District by invitation in Game 3 at Hermanus.

All matches were played on excellent turf pitches which resulted in three very close and exciting finishes followed by wonderful hospitality from the hosts, Western Province, Wynberg and Hermanus Cricket Clubs. The match against Western Province was scheduled for the Newlands Stadium but overnight rain and a nervous curator (the Test at Newlands was the next week) transferred the game to their No.2 ground, Impala Park, which had excellent facilities and would compare with our District grounds. The after match festivities were at Newlands where team photos were taken on the oval and the Museum visited prior to partaking of their Braai (BBQ). The RDCA inscribed Boomerang was presented to the Chairman of the Western Province Cricket Club with a request that it be displayed in a prominent position in the Museum.

Both Impala Park and the Wynberg Public High School Ground had the famous Table Mountain backdrop while the third match was played at the picturesque seaside resort of Hermanus, 130 kms south east of Capetown. Also included in the Festival week were an impressive "Opening Ceremony and Marchpast" at Kirstenbosch Botanical Gardens, a Picnic Day at the Spier Estate Winery and the Finale Dinner for 1000 people at the Capetown Civic Centre.

Spare time was used in visiting the Cape of Good Hope, sailing on Table Bay, visiting Robben Island or taking the Cable Car to the top of the mountain. Seven Ringwood players arranged a visit to the black settlement of Langa, where they presented cricket equipment to the Junior Teams coach. They visited the village homes as well and were made most welcome.

Prior to the Cricket Festival, the group (16 in total) visited Zimbabwe, home of the famous Victoria Falls (flown over by helicopter). They cruised the Zambezi River and stayed 3 days at Safari Lodge in the Hwange Game Park where many exciting hours were spent in very, very close company with lions & elephants. These as well as the graceful giraffes, kudus, zebras, antelopes and numerous other wildlife were photographed from an open safari vehicle.

The week after the festival was spent travelling the Garden Route from Capetown to Port Alfred via Wilderness and Port Elizabeth. They visited the Ostrich and Cheetah breeding farms, the Cango Caves, took spectacular photos of mountain passes and enjoyed the Eastern Cape beaches before finally arriving in Durban.

Durban is a 24hour city with a holiday atmosphere and a mix of Zulu, Indian and Western cultures. Their hotel was right on the Beachfront amongst the rickshaws and the craft markets. Their final venture was a day trip to Shakaland, a Zulu village created for the filming of "Shaka, King of the Zulus", where the history and culture of the Zulu people was explained and demonstrated.

They returned home exhausted but pleased at the success of "The Tour of a Lifetime".

The next Golden Oldies World Cricket Festival will be held at Rotorua New Zealand in March of the year 2000. There will be an Interstate Carnival at Albury/Wodonga from March 21st -27th 1999.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

It is pleasing to report that the Association recorded a profit of \$599 for the 1997/98 cricket season after allowing \$1,000.00 for depreciation of our computer and printer.

Delegates and Members will recall that we completely reprinted our Rule Book prior to the start of the season and the cost of that exercise was in excess of \$4,000.00. We were able to finance this project without imposing any additional financial burden on clubs due to the amount of Sponsorship monies the Association received relating to the sale of cricket balls during the 1996/97 and 1997/98 seasons.

Again this season, fines and penalty fees incurred by clubs for breaches of rules were significant, representing over 6% of the Association's total income - a matter which I believe should be addressed by each club official in an effort to save club's needless additional expense.

Despite regular submission of accounts to clubs throughout the season and following completion of the season, nine clubs remain in debt to the Association for the amount of \$1,522.00 as at the close of our financial year. This means that next seasons players will have to meet debt's incurred by last seasons players and indicates less that satisfactory management of financial resources by club officials.

These clubs are reminded that all last season's accounts must be settled prior to the Association's Annual General Meeting.







- of the 12 teams which headed the ladder at the end of the home and home series, 10 went on to play in the Grand Finals, but only 5 were successful in winning the premiership.
- the difference in premiership points between the top and bottom teams in Chandler 1 was 60.7 compares with 83.2 in 96/97
- Croydon North led the Chandler 'ladder after the first round but Ferntree Gully took over the position and held it till the end of the normal rounds. In A Grade Templeton led the field for the first 3 rounds and also at the end of the 11th round, East Ringwood was number 1 for rounds 4 to 10
- Ferntree Gully and Croydon North were in the top four at the completion of each round of Chandler 1, while Templeton and East Ringwood achieved a similar performance in A Grade. In this grade Lilydale were in the top four for all but one round while St Andrews only time in this group was at the completion of round 11. In Chandler 8/12 teams were in the top for at least one week, while in A Grade it was 6/12. In both grades 3 of the 4 teams in the final four were in the four at the end of Round 1.
- North Ringwood became the 9th club since 1980/81 to return to A Grade after winning promotion to Chandler.

### HOW WAS IT IN 1906

Rule 23 of the 1905/6 South Suburban Churches Cricket Association Rule Book read as such:-

Selection of Umpires - Umpires shall be chosen on the ground by the captains as from time to time required, but no umpire shall be appointed or changed without the consent of both captains. Should, in the opinion of THE PLAYERS, the decision of the umpire be unfair, he will be reported to the association with a view of preventing him umpiring in the future. (I suspect players would like this rule to be included in the RDCA).

In the same year the games commenced at 2.45 and concluded sharp at 6. If the game had not started within 15 minutes of that time the offending team automatically lost the game, except for games played in the way out suburb of Oakleigh where an additional 20 minutes grace was given...

It was also interesting to note that, unless teams were level on points at the end of the season, the team on top would be awarded the premiership. Balls cost 8/6 (85 cents) which would be equivalent to at least \$65 today.

# LET US REMEMBER THEM

### W.R. (BOB) MOYES

Bob Moyes was the Parkwood Cricket Club's first Life Member. Bob was the scorer for the first eleven for as long as anyone can remember. He scored for the last time only ten days before his death. Club scorer was the role most people saw Bob in, but his involvement in the club was far greater than that.

Bob was not a young man - he was in his mid seventies and up until the last couple of years was always at the annual preseason uncovering of the pitches. This is a time at all clubs where the gathering is small and Bob made sure that he always had his shovel with him.

Every winter Bob would repair the boundary flags, carry out maintenance on the scoreboards and numbers and, if a scoreboard was beyond repair, he would make a new one.

Bob served on the Parkwood committee for over ten years and was secretary for many years, he regularly painted the creases on the pitches and made sure the stump boxes were always full of soil.

Both Senior and Junior ladders were continually brought up to date and displayed in the clubrooms by Bob.

These were just a few of the ways he helped the club, but there was more than that to Bob.

Bob was a special person, one who never said a bad work about anybody, a gentleman, highly respected not only by the members of our club, but by all the met him throughout the RDCA and many other sporting and community groups.

The Parkwood Cricket Club is the richer for having known Bob.

### LAURIE FLYNN

Laurie Flynn was a member of the Wonga Park Cricket Club until he moved to North Ringwood when he was brought to the Parkwood Cricket Club by Andrew Tonkin.

Laurie while not a stylish player was determined and prepared to put himself on the line when opening the batting for the first eleven. Having played most of the 1995/96 season in the first eleven he was made twelfth man for the semi final against Ferntree Gully. There was no moaning from Laurie, he just turned up with his whites to help the team any way he could.

It was after the 1995/96 season that Laurie became ill and after treatment he was well enough to play in the 5th XI after Christmas the following season. It was during this time that Laurie made two centuries - 107 v Croydon North and 106 n.o. v Kilsyth, Laurie's only centuries.

Laurie always had a smile on his face and a joke to tell, the last time he visited Parkwood for a beer was late in November 1997, just a couple of weeks before his premature death.

In recognition of his involvement with both the Wonga Park and Parkwood Cricket Clubs, the Laurie Flynn Memorial Trophy has been provided by both clubs to be held by the winners of Parkwood versus Wonga Park first eleven games.

However Grand Final nerves took over and Ainslie took complete control of the game to register a most decisive victory and make it 3/3 for the final series.

First and second on the ladder played off for the Chandler 3 premiership and after Croydon North had posted a most competitive 252, the odds had shortened for the Barngeong team to be celebrating at the end of the game. However a marvellous batting display by Ainslie resulted in victory by 7 wickets and resultant premiership.

The favourite backers had their money on Wonga Park in the Chandler 4 Grand Final. At the end of their first day they felt home and hosed with Ainslie Park out for a disappointing 136. However a huge effort from bowlers and fieldsmen alike saw the Ainslie Park team score a narrow but very convincing win and the first home game next season will see the flagpole decorated by the Chandler 4 flag.

Olinda were red hot favourites to take out their first senior pennant in 75 years when they faced up to East Ringwood at the impressive Alan Smith oval in Kilsyth. East battled determinedly on the first day to register 213, but this did not seem enough to overcome Olinda. 
# THE FINALS WERE GRAND cont.
