

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Excepting for the first round and some interruption to the senior grade finals, cricketers enjoyed good weather throughout the 1994/95 cricket season.

The revised conditions for the finals, under which games were played, except for some minor variations, as per the normal home and home games enabled all to be completed prior to the deadline.

Congratulations to Croydon North, St Andrews and Aquinas who gained the major premierships of Chandler, A and B Grades respectively.

The withdrawal of the Vermont Club just pior to the commencement of the season allowed Ferntree Gully into the top grade and their performance in finishing in second place at the end of the rostered games was an incredible effort.

Unfortunately the changes caused a delay in the production of the new fixture book. However we were able to have the publication available at the Secretaries meeting. The book proved to be an outstanding success. As well as the fixture it contained other basic information which helped clubs prepare for the game and cope with problems during the game. It is planned to produce the book for season 1995/96.

Another innovation this season was the form made available to captains of matches where official umpires were not appointed. The form, introduced on a trial basis for the last two matches, enabled captains to report on various aspects of their game. The comments received have been most helpful and may enable us to effect changes beneficial to cricketers in those grades.

Our computer records have been under the direction of Stuart Newey and John Higgins. Early in the year Stuart also received valuable assistance form the family of the late Ken Dunham and I would like to record our grateful thanks to these people.

Changes to our requirements and the availability of new technology will require our computer systems to be substantially upgraded before next season and the Executive is currently considering options in this field. The Executive has worked well to further the interests of the Association and none harder than our Secretary, Lindsay Trollope. Lindsay has a deep love of the game and continually applies himself most diligently to ensure that cricket in the R.D.C.A.is enjoyed by all members. During the weeks of the actual season, with daily changes to teams, grades and ground locations, but Lindsay with the willing help of Beverley, seems to rise above these crises

to provide solutions to enable games to be played.

All other members of the Executive have worked hard and we are indeed most fortunate that persons of such high calibre and experience are prepared to give up their valuable time in the interests of improving our local cricket. We were most disappointed to receive the resignation of John Woolhouse during the season, but hope to see him with us at some time in the future.

Perhaps the most satisfying and encouraging indication of the success of the past season was the glowing comments I received in a letter from a father from a young cricketer in our Association. The boy had played junior and senior cricket for some years and had been selected in a few R.D.C.A.representatives under-age teams. The father wrote that his son was now too old for under-age cricket, but had benefited tremendously as a person by his involvement in the game. The father added that the attention given to his son by a succession of team managers and coaches from both his own club and the R.D.C.A. was at all times of the highest standard.

The letter reminded me of our obligation to provide the best possible environment for ALL cricketers in our Association, and I feel that the progress we have made together this season and in previous seasons, augers well for the future of the R.D.C.A.

#### GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Due to the A.F.L.Grand Final being played on 1 October, the opening date of the 1994/95 season was delayed to the following Saturday. Everything was in place for the opening until the rains arrived late on the Friday and continued throughout the night and into Saturday, thus causing the decision to postpone Round 1. wondered whether it was going to be a repeat of the 1992/93 season when inclement weather caused us to lose some 6 days of cricket prior to However, except for some minor Christmas. delays in Round 2 and a small hiccup in the finals, the balance of the season produced probably the best weather we have experienced for many years. Whilst we had an extremely hot summer, there was only one day of oppressive heat during the season and when the final ball was bowled in March to signal the end of the Chandler 1 final, the curtain came down on another successful season.

The official start to the 1994/95 season was on 19 August 1994 when the 75th Annual Meeting was conducted in the Ainslie Park clubrooms. The re-appointment of Bill Wilkins to the position of President for his 7th term indicated the confidence that clubs have in Bill's leadership. I have mentioned in many of the past reports that we are fortunate to have a person with Bill's experience in local government and community organisations as President of the Association and this was of vital importance in a year which has seen dramatic changes in municipal boundaries and the administration of the facilities which our clubs use each week of the cricket season. knowledge will be also of valuable assistance as the Association moves to a closer relationship with the new administrations.

The major change in the competition was the introduction of 2 day finals introduced following acceptance of the rule change by an overwhelming majority of the clubs. We also introduced a "C" Division in an attempt to ensure a more even competition in the lower grades. Another new feature was the introduction of a fixture book which also included basic information for captains and secretaries. This appeared to be a winner and will be repeated in season 1995/96.

The Vermont club decided to return to the Box Hill Reporter Association while Mt Evelyn decided to affiliate with the Yarra Valley Association. The decision by Vermont occurred after the draw and fixtures had been completed, but the movement of Ferntree Gully to Chandler Shield

was achieved without any problems while some rearrangement was necessary to "B" grade as a result of the Mt Evelyn decision.

As "B" Grade comprised only 8 teams a different fixture to the other grades was used with a 13 round season comprising seven two-day and six one-day games. This appeared to be a success and it was first suggested by the Aquinas club. Our thanks are extended to them for their contribution. The only real problem occurred when the clubs in "B" Grade had teams in the lower grades who were playing the normal two-day games.

In the latter part of the season we introduced, on a trial basis, "Captains Comments" forms in games where official umpires were not provided. The completion and return of these forms was on a voluntary basis and the Executive were delighted that some 55-60% of captains responded. It was interesting to note that 95% of the returns indicated satisfaction with most aspects of the lower grade games.

The members of the Executive were again to the forefront in playing their part in the administration of the Association. Joan Newey continued in her role as Treasurer with valuable assistance, as always, from Stuart who also remained in the position of Registration Secretary. Stuart, along with John Higgins, was also heavily involved with the computer work which had been undertaken in previous by the late Ken Dunham.

Steve Pascoe was again Bill's deputy and his leadership is of considerable benefit to the R.D.C.A. Steve is always looking at ways to improve the standard of the Association in all aspects of the game, with particular reference to seeking better conditions for players and clubs provided that both players and clubs adhere to the rules under which the Association is structured.

Ann Pascoe continued in her role as Social Convener and, as usual, both social functions were again highly successful. Ann also provides assistance to Rachel with the telephone scores when necessary as well as providing valuable input at Executive meetings.

Pat Meehan again served the Association in his position of Secretary of the Umpire's Association and, with a drop in the number of umpires from the previous season, his administrative skills were taxed to the fullest. Pat has worked tirelessly to improve the relationship of players and umpires and a read of his report will show that his work is bearing fruit.

#### GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT Cont.

David Beatty and Neil Tull remained our representatives on the Eastern Cricket Academy and their contribution was highly regarded by the Ringwood Cricket Club. David took charge of the Association un 21 and under 18 squads, while Neil was again Match Chairman for the senior group. Details of the matches played are shown elsewhere in this document.

Ron Ellis retired as the C.U.O.V. representative, but continued on the Executive and volunteered to be the Saturday "trouble shooter". Ron armed with his "trusty" mobile phone was able to arrive at trouble spots and cool situations very quickly. Ron provided a valuable service to the clubs and the move to a mobile phone from the old beeper system was most successful.

Duncan Cant was the "new boy" to the Executive and he brought to it years of experience in club administration. Duncan assisted Neil and David on the match and selection committees.

President of the R.D.C.A.Junior Association, John Tynan, replaced Neville Bradshaw as its representative on the senior body. Neville found it necessary to resign due to business commitments. John provided most valuable contributions to the Executive and his strong leadership of the juniors is a principal reason for the high standing that the R.D.C.A. has in connection with under-age competitions.

During the season John Woolhouse resigned from the committee and contributions have been greatly missed. John was an important part of the match committee and it is hoped that he will find it possible to return at some future time.

Fortunately only two meetings of the Tribunal were necessary during the season which indicates that the on-field behaviour has continued the improvement so evident over recent seasons. In addition 14 players (23 in 1993/94) were named for minor infringements of the rules and we look forward to a further reduction in these numbers next season.

Croydon North re-established their control of the Chandler competition with a comfortable victory in the final, while St Andrews signalled a return to the top grade with an emphatic win in "A" Grade. Aquinas recovered from a poor 1993/94 season to easily win the "B" Grade pennant and promotion to "A" Grade in 1995/96. All the details of the finals are in the Finals round-up section of this book.

The R.D.C.A. regained the senior Maddocks Shield in its game against the Box Hill Association while the Under 18 maintained its unbeaten record against Box Hill in its retention of the trophy.

Ken Johnston and Brian Gobbi again provided leadership to the Veteran's competition and it was no surprise that numbers were up on the previous season. The growth in the veteran's competition has been quite staggering.

Bill Dean continues as the Association's patron and it had been suggested that he is trying to be patron for at least the same number of years as he was President. Bill is of course still intensely interested in the R.D.C.A.and, as mentioned in the 93/94 report, has taken a special interest in the Veterans competition. Bill continues to receive a warm welcome as he does his Saturday afternoon "ground crawl".

We now look forward to season 1995/96 as the past season becomes a pleasant memory. The one-day 100 over game in the top grades will be played under similar restrictions to the V.C.A. District Competition while it is also possible that we will have a one-day grade in the lower divisions.

I express my sincere gratitude to the secretaries and other officials of the clubs for their excellent assistance during the past 12 months and I particularly thank them for their contributions to this report.

In conclusion I would be very remiss if I did not thank Beverley for the assistance given to me in the conduct of the Association's affairs particularly in view of her full-time commitment as Administrator of the Mountain District Badminton Association.

#### JUNIOR PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Once again I am pleased to record that the 1994/95 season ran smoothly. The Junior Presentation Night showed that many fine individual and team performances occurred during the year and I have no doubt that we will see a similar high standard next year. Incidentally, on Presentation Night the Karalika Theatre was filled to overflowing which has prompted us to seek a larger venue for next year.

You may recall in last year's Report that the Committee was keen to improve the skills of all Junior players by encouraging Team Managers and Coaches to gain coaching accreditation. accreditation course which the Committee arranged through the Victorian Cricket Association resulted in over 40 participants being successful in obtaining Level 1 standard. An invitation has to them to upgrade extended their qualification to Level 2. I would like to see more club officials gaining at least Level 1 During the year we coaching standard. acknowledged that the non-competitive team received little recognition for their efforts. correct this situation we decided to give a trophy to the best two conducted teams. The purpose of the awards is to encourage good sportsmanship from an early age. These annual trophies have been named after Neville Bradshaw and Josh Brown both of whom have worked tirelessly over many years to promote junior cricket. We were pleased that Neville and Josh were able to present the trophies at the Presentation Night.

Our thanks go to the veterans who generously donated a quality cricket bat to the juniors. The veterans have indicated that they will continue to support us in a variety of ways. We are very grateful for the interest shown by the veterans. The Committee decided that the bat would be awarded to the 1994/95 Junior Club Champion - Wantirna South.

The main challenges facing all clubs are not new but are worth re-stating:

- 1. Recruiting
- 2. Developing and involvement
- 3 Standard of conduct.
- 1. We must recruit more players. It is disappointing to see some clubs with only one or two junior teams. Not only will this affect the senior teams in the next few years, but there is a real possibility that councils will re-allocate under-used grounds to other sporting groups.

- 2. We must strive for continuous improvement skills. Most clubs not have at least one person who has Level 1 coaching accreditation. This should result in a higher level of skills development providing that all players have their fair share of batting and bowling during the matches. Team managers have an obligation to give everybody an opportunity every game.
- 3. We must insist on an excellent standard of behaviour. The vast majority of teams display excellent behaviour due mainly to the high standards set by their team managers. The junior committee, with the full support of the senior committee will not tolerate sledging, disputing umpire's decisions and general bad behaviour of players or officials. I ask all club officials to ensure that good sportsmanship is displayed at all times.

I am grateful for the support I have received from the senior committee, junior administrators, parents and players. My special thanks go to every member of the junior committee who have all given so generously of their time, expertise and advice. As I have decided not to seek re-election, I will certainly miss their camaraderie but I am confident that the junior division is in fine shape and will continue to improve under the new committee.

#### JUNIOR SECRETARY'S REPORT

Once again we have come to the conclusion of another season. I am most grateful for the positive support given by fellow committee. All worked hard over the winter to ensure a smooth start to the season and to maintain expertise and guidance to clubs throughout the season.

This association comprised 33 clubs fielding 131 teams. The number of new players registered was 574, 61 lower than the 1993/94 season. The loss of Mt Evelyn to Yarra Vally and Vermont to Box Hill Reporter did not help our cause. The declining trend from cricket in our association does pose concern. I know all members are aware of need to reverse this trend and the survey completed toward the end of the season will give incoming committee a line of attack to work on to try and increase numbers.

The association again acquitted itself well with teams participating in Inter-association/ Inter-carnival and School boys competition. We were also well represented in the Keith Mitchell Shield (U12) Hatch (U14) and Dowling (U16). Congratulations to award winners and premiership teams and thanks to other teams which played entertaining/competitive cricket each week. There were some notable achievements in our competition. Well done to those players.

The coaching clinic is an innovation that has been evident in juniors before. Although time consuming and with early teething problems, the executive was pleased to be able to provide an excellent opportunity for those coaches of which 31 have now reached level 1 accreditation.

My thanks to team managers and club personnel who made up the off-field team of hard working officials willing to spend many unpaid hours to ensure a successful season. My thanks also to Susan Davidson who did a great job in taking telephone scores and ensuring local newspapers printed information. My thanks also to my wife Mary for all her help during the season with the typing and the taking of telephone calls.

The season did not go without incidents. I am concerned at the number of investigations needed and more so at the needs to apply player suspensions and impose club fines. It is vital for players and team managers to respect the Code of Conduct. The future is bright and the challenges exciting. I am sure that you all can

maintain enthusiasm and help this association to become stronger. Keep in mind it is our responsibility to develop cricketers and enable them to play at the highest possible level.

Finally after much consideration, I have decided not to stand for re-election. This decision was indeed difficult. I have enjoyed my time within our association but more importantly the many friendships that I have made that I am sure will continue.

Thank you to all. My best wishes for continued success within all areas of the Association.

# REGISTRATION SECRETARY'S REPORT

I am sure that I do not have to remind the majority of club officials that in season 1994/95, we were unable to provide the same level of service to the clubs as in previous years.

This was, of course, the direct result of not being able to find someone to replace the late Ken Dunham. Ken wrote the programme for the R.D.C.A.and was virtually able to spend as much time as required to provide the service to the clubs. We "muddled" through the early part of the season and as the year progressed we were able to improve our computer output to the clubs.

I am confident that our service to clubs will be greatly improved next season, but until we have virtually full-time administrators we will not be in the position to provide the amount of support provided by Ken.

Despite losing two sizeable clubs from the Association, our registered players totalled in excess of 6500 with 35 clubs.

150 Senior teams participated.

131 Junior teams participated.

98 clearances were processed, while it was necessary to convene 3 meetings of the Permit Committee at which 2 appeals were upheld.

Because of the limited service provided to clubs, particularly early in the season, some leniency was given in relation to the fines imposed on clubs in relation to incorrect spelling, inaccurate player performances etc. Once again I thank Joan and my family for their support and assistance given to me in the performance of the functions of the above position. Special thanks are extended to Betty Dunham for putting up with the inconvenience of making Ken's computer room available to me and others to process R.D.C.A. results.

Unfortunately many clubs did not respond to the request from the R.D.C.A.and thus some semi-final matches only had one umpire. This was most disappointing. I hope for a better response next season.

Except for a couple of "A" Grade Clubs player behaviour was the best for many years, with the number of players both reported and named for breaches of the code of conduct far less than in previous seasons. All umpires hope that this trend continues as it makes umpiring more pleasurable.

On behalf of the umpires, may I congratulate all medal winners, trophy winners and premiers on their success this season.

I extend our members thanks to the captains, ladies and club members for their efforts and hospitality, before, during and after the game. A special thanks to all scorers for their dedication and assistance to umpires.

My personal thanks is extended to our President, Peter Williams, Vice-Presidents, David Rashleigh and Martin Pryers, Umpires Adviser, John Fearnley and Social Secretary, Colin Hill. I also thank the R.D.C.A. Executive for their continued support.

We had 26 teams this year with over 440 people playing. Two new sides Mooroolbark and Boronia were welcomed.

Great support of the concept was demonstrated with a record number of 230 people attending our Veterans dinner in February, and having a wonderful time with generous donations from Max Brown Real estate, Bowens Timber, Callen Sports, Top Line Sports and Our & Out Hair Care of Arndale. We had to turn clubs away which will need to be rectified next year. This night is successful, mainly to the MC, Pat Arbuckle of Croydon North who relaxes every one with his wit and demeanour. Thanks Pat.

Our Inter-Association games against Ferntree Gully were again a success, and we thank Norwood for hosting both these games. The Over 50's game was tense and exciting and while Pat Arbuckle's team lost in the last over, every one enjoyed it. Jeff Luscombe as Team Manager must be thanked. In the over 40's Ross Macauley led an extremely talented team to a comfortable win to retain the Trophy. Bill Stafford as Team Manager and arranger of the games worked hard with great results.

Since the last Annual Report, we sent a team of cricketers and their wives to Birmingham, England to compete against and associate with 90 other sides from all around the world. Ted Griffett must be thanked, and all that went would agree with that. We hope many others can take advantage of these trips in the years to come.

In our last report we made the point about the need for veterans to provide the ultimate in sportsmanship as an example to our young people. The prime aim was to arrest the slide of potential cricketers to other sports. I can report that we achieved the sportsmanship requirement, for which the executive are very grateful. In turn the amount of families and supporters from the clubs is increasing at our games and this can only go well to achieve the second part of the objective.

As an added push to achieve this result we have decided that we will assist our Junior Administration with sponsorships in the future. This is a sensible approach to take, as many veteran cricketers are in fact heavily involved in junior cricket.

On the playing field we had two undefeated teams contest Division 3 Trophy, with Bayswater Park overcoming Montrose in a high scoring game. Both had excellent years.

The Division 2, Ken Johnston Trophy, was played by two high profile teams, Warrandyte & Croydon North. While Warrandyte started favourite Croydon North won with both sides making 200+. The Division 1, Bill Dean Shield, was won for the 4th time by Croydon Hockyers against last seasons Division 2 premiers, South Warrandyte. On the turf at Croydon oval, Hockeyers experience and depth won the day by only 10 runs. It is an excellent effort by Hockeyers to have played in 5 Grand final in a row, and against a different side each year. This record will be hard to beat in future, especially with the high quality players that are now playing Veterans cricket in the various sides.

It was in this match that true sportsmanship was demonstrated. Hockeyers had suffered a series of injuries to key players prior to the game which left them with only 10 eligible players, South Warrandyte allowed them to play an unqualified player. During the match South Warrandyte suffered an injury and Hockeyers allowed the 12th man to bat. A lot of credit must go to these two teams for allowing the veterans ideals to come to the fore.

Special thanks to all the committee, especially Jeff Luscombe, for their work over the year.

In summary we can look forward to further gains for cricket from this style of cricket. Provided we can retain the prevailing positive attitude of all participating cricketers and future committee members, next season is eagerly awaited.

In the games against the Box Hill Association, the R.D.C.A. regained the Senior Maddocks Shield, while the under 18 team came from an almost impossible position to retain the Maddocks Shield. For the second successive season the Association lost any chance of making the finals in the Under 21 C.U.O.V.competition due to the abandonment of 2 games due to adverse weather. The Association feels that the rules of this competition may need to be varied to ensure all teams are on an equal footing. In the 2 games which were unable to be completed, it is believed that these were the only ones affected. Perhaps we should be looking at why it is necessary to play these games on turf when the overwhelmingly majority of participants are from non-turf associations.

The final representative game for the season saw the under 18 team well beaten by Yarra Valley, but overall the 1994/95 season was a good one for the R.D.C.A.

The Match Committee, together with some input from other Executive members were responsible for the selection of the All-stars team.

The Executive expresses its gratitude to Neil and his Committee with special mention to the tremendous work that David Beatty does with the two under-age squads. In addition appreciation is expressed to parents and other helpers in the organisation of these games. Thanks are also given to the St Andrews club for their excellent hosting of the Box Hill games.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

This years financial report shows that actual expenditure incurred exceeded income earned by \$1,945 and when write down of assets by way of depreciation is taken into account, a loss of \$2,695 was recorded for the season's activities.

There are two main reasons for this situation.

- Following Ken Dunham's passing, the
   Association was not able to provide the same
   degree of computer support as previously.
   Bearing in mind it was agreed by the
   Executive Committee that we would not
   impose fines for senior match result errors
   which in previous seasons amounted to more
   than \$1,000.
- 2. An independent review of Honoraria paid by the Association recommended an increase of \$2,750 which was not allowed for in my original budgeted estimates.

Despite the non imposition of match result sheet fines for seniors, fines totalling \$2,166 were incurred - a disturbing situation which I believe should be addressed by each club official to save his/her club this needless expense.

A serious concern to me is the amount of \$2,079 owed to the R.D.C.A.by twelve clubs. This means that each of these clubs will be starting the season with a debt which will have to be met by the next season's players rather than least season's players who incurred the debts. It also means that the club officials have not satisfactorily managed their financial resources. In accordance with a decision of the Executive Committee, I take the opportunity of advising clubs in the Association that all last season's outstanding accounts must be settled prior to the commencement of next season.

#### **FINALS ROUND UP**

Croydon North after a scare against Mooroolbark in the semi-final journeyed to East Ringwood as warm favourites to take out the coveted Chandler Shield pennant against a determined Wantirna South who defied the odds and the tipsters in its great win against Ferntree Gully in the semi-final. The loss of early wickets put the Southerners on the defensive and despite a fight back by their middle and late order batsmen, the final score of 151 did not appear to be enough against the powerful Croydon North batting. This proved to be correct and in the end Croydon North comfortably won its fifth premiership in the last 10 seasons including four of the past six.

St Andrews and South Croydon journeyed to Mullum Reserve to do battle for the double prize of the A Grade pennant and automatic promotion to Chandler in 1995/96. South Croydon were quietly confident as they had beaten the Saints during the home and home games. However St Andrews batting strength found its best form and a high first innings total put the team in a winning position. South Croydon lost early wickets from which they were unable to fully recover and premiership celebrations were held at Manson Reserve.

Knox Gardens were favourites to take out the B Grade premiership in their battle against Aquinas and when their powerful attack restricted Aquinas to 159 the favourite backers were counting their winnings. No one could anticipate what followed as Knox Gardens were bowled out for an astonishing 37, which is as far as can be ascertained the lowest score in a final in the past 40 years.

In a bowlers final the Chandler 2 match between Kilsyth and Warrandyte wavered between both teams almost from the first ball. When the final Warrandyte wicket fell late on the second day Kilsyth had scored a meritorious win in its first season back in the Chandler grade since 1981/92.

In A3 the Wonga Park bowlers set the scene for premiership celebrations when they dismissed the strong Croydon North batting line up for a most disappointing 130. The Park batsmen, without at any stage dominating the game, were always doing enough to ensure another premiership flag will adorn the walls at Wonga Park.

If the Chandler 2 game was close the Chandler 4 match between the same two clubs was a "heart attack" stuff. Kilsyth lost its wicket 3 runs short of the Warrandyte total to allow the "Dyters" some revenge for the earlier result. Warrandyte's win gave it successive flags in this grade.

Templeton and St Andrews faced each other to determine supremacy in the battle for the A 2 flag. In a high standard game which also had the odd lively moment or two, Templeton were able to outlast the Saints to score a significant victory.

The same two clubs faced each other in A 3 and when Templeton were dismissed for only 112, it seemed to be just a formality for the St Andrews batsmen to ensure yet another premiership for the club. The early part of the innings did nothing to suggest anything else until a sensational collapse saw the side dismissed for 89.

Templeton were looking for another premiership in A4 when they faced East Ringwood at the picturesque Kilsyth oval. However the Easterner's bowlers were all fired up and after dismissing the opposition for only 87, their batsmen, their batsmen showed how it was done and a most convincing victory was achieved which will see a further pennant unfurled at East Ringwood.

Knox Gardens may have been disappointed following the demise of their first eleven but a great fighting effort by their second eleven allowed them to score a close but convincing victory over a very competitive Croydon Hockeyers team.

Hockeyers and Knox Gardens faced each other in A3 and when the "Gardens" hit up 197, they felt very confident, but the Croydon batsmen found their best form and it was a delighted group of Hockeyers players and supporters who made the journey from Walker Reserve to Silcock Reserve to commence the celebrations.

A magnificent rear-guard action by the lower half of the Ferntree Gully C1 batting saw it snatch victory from a disbelieving St Andrews team who looked certain to take victory for the better part of the game.

In a match which swung from one team to another for the greater part of the two days looked to be over when Croydon North bowlers took quick wickets to leave Parkwood in a perilous position. However in another fine recovery which seemed to be a feature of these finals saw Parkwood grab victory from the jaws of defeat.

In the C3 final Wonga Park were always doing the right thing an at the end of the game the scores indicated a substantial victory over Wantirna South.

They reached the final with significant victories over well fancied opponents and in light which could only be described as poor, the Lilydale batsmen rose to the task and with a six off the last ball of the final snatched a thrilling 4 run victory.

An Inspiration to All

In Round 2 Leigh Walles of Ainslie Park bowled over 19 overs with 8 maidens in taking 4 wickets for 34 runs in Chandler 4. Excellent figures at any time but 7 days after this performance Leigh had a leg amputated due to cancer. Russell Davison, Secretary of the club said Leigh's courage in the face of adversity has proven an inspiration to the whole club.

Partnerships Galore

Kilsyth Club recorded the incredible amount of 28 century partnerships for the season, including two double centuries.

In round 6, B3 game between Croydon Hockeyers and Eastfield, Hockeyers Glenn Spencer and Simon Gibson added 290 for the 2nd wicket. It was a one-day game.

At Last

Croydon Hockeyers premiership in B 3 was the club's 5th senior premiership, but the first since 1977/78.

A Fine Comeback

Brett Haines was one player Hockeyers were looking at to provide them with a big score in their B 2 semi-final clash against Glen Park. Brett was dismissed for a first ball duck, but when handed the ball on the second day of the match took 8/50 off 22 overs, including the last four wickets to tie the match and enable his team to advance to the final.

#### By the way

- Rod Marget of Knox Gardens won his 5th Fairest and Best medal when he took
  the Steve Pascoe Medal
- Croydon United became the 8th club to return to A Grade after winning promotion from that grade in the period from season 1981/82
- Of the 14 teams which headed the ladder at the completion of the home and home series, only 3 went on to win the premiership, the lowest number since the number of grades totalled ten or more. (in 1993/94 it was 8/15). Only seven actually played off in their respective grade final.
- The difference in premiership points between the top and bottom teams in Chandler 1 was 88.1 points, just slightly more than the 86.5 of the previous season.
- This season saw me complete 10 years as General Secretary. Of the thirteer people who sat on the Executive in the 85/86 season, four are still on the committee today. In the 10 year period we have had thirty two people who have served on the Executive for periods ranging from two months to ten years.
- Three teams headed the ladder at different stages of the season in Chandler 1 while 2 & 3 reached those positions respectively in A 1 & B1. In relation to the positions in the four, 5 clubs did not reach the coveted positions at any stage in the season in Chandler 1, a similar number in A 1, while only one club did not reach the four at any time in B 1.

#### ANOTHER LOOK AT THE PAST

- Ringwood holds the record for the most successive premierships in the top grade with 6 from 1951/52 to 1956/57
- In the period from 1932/33 to 1942/43 Kilsyth were premiers on six occasions. In fact Kilsyth could almost be called the Collingwood of the R.D.C.A. In the first 40 years of the competition the club took out 11 top grade pennants, but is still waiting for their 12th.
- In 1937/38, the rules were amended to make it compulsory that the top grade players must play in their whites (or creams). Assume other grade players were able to turn up in any gear.
- In 1980/81 the computerisation of the Association records begun. Due to a faulty program, all the averages provided to clubs at the end of the season were incorrect.
- Special rules for the Under 12 grades were first introduced in 1976/77
- The Champion Club award was introduced in 1981/82
- The Fairest and Best Medals were awarded in 1977/78 with Tony White from the Lilydale Club being the initial recipient of the Bill Dean Award.
- In 1977/78 season Ian Callen became the first R.D.C.A. player to be chosen to represent Australia at test level.
- The number of senior registrations passed 2000 for the first time in 1975/76.
