SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Ringwood and District Cricket Association exists to provide individuals with the opportunity to participate in the sport of cricket, free from any objectionable features and for the better acquaintance and fellowship of the members of the Association.

Since 1920, your Association Executive have striven towards, and I believe, have achieved and will continue to achieve, this objective.

However, I am sure our founding Executive members did not envisage the extent to which the R D C A would grow when administering the first competition involving 6 teams representing Croydon, Montrose, Mooroolbark, Ringwood, Imperials, Ringwood Diggers and Wonga Park.

Progress and growth must be maintained as a constant goal of any institution but, as in our situation because of a general reluctance for people to commit themselves to helping others, the ever increasing administrative duties associated with this growth process, invariably fall on too few shoulders.

In my experience, the saying "If you want something done, give it to a busy person" appears to be the axiom in selecting sporting administrators. Unfortunately "I'm alright Jack" appears to be the attitude of the vast majority who elect these people and are quite happy and prepared to flow with the tide provided the equilibrium of their existence is not disturbed.

I am sure that Club administrators experience the same frustrations at times, so it seems feasible to assume that they can appreciate the need for more involvement of Clubs in Administrative duties previously burdened upon Association Executive members — of course, they will only appreciate such a move provided the extra duties are dispersed within the Club and not added to the Club Secretary's already onerous duties.

1980-81 saw the introduction of computerised registration and match result records and, although some "teething problems" were experienced, from an Association Executive view point, was a great success notwithstanding "rumblings" heard from some Club officials involved in collation, checking and dispatch of the data input.

Further Club involvement is envisaged, for next and future seasons, through an expanded Association Executive, involvement of Club nominees in resolution of investigation committee matters, players representation etc.

As you are aware, the R D C A Executive is a body appointed by Clubs to ensure that the Rules and Regulations, proposed and adopted by Clubs, are adhered to and/or policed as necessary. We are hopeful that this opportunity for more involvement will be supported because quite frankly, Executive members are being "cheesed off" with ever increasing workloads placed on them whilst being confronted with less co-operation and at times, subjected to attempted ridicule and outright abuse. Perhaps if more people become involved in Association administration they will realise that it is impossible to please all the people all the time.

Fortunately, in the execution of my duties I have received the co-operation of all Club Secretaries and my fellow R D C A Executive members and I thank them for assisting in making my job less onerous and more enjoyable.

Most importantly I thank my wife Ann for her continued support as Assistant Secretary and the issue of numerous "leave passes" to attend meetings etc.

To all Association members I wish a happy and successful season 1981-82.

UMPIRES' REPORT

Another successful year by the Umpires panel during the season. Meetings were well attended, where quite often there was spirited discussion on decisions and obscure rules. Although the correct interpretations were explained afterwards, the correct decisions were not always given, especially during pressure games. Where did the pressure come from? Who contributed to it? Could it have been stopped by a stronger Captain? I will leave it to the reader to decide the answers. Then there are the majority of games that are a pleasure to umpire, mistakes by all concerned possibly, but in all cases accepted, leaving the good game of cricket to proceed smoothly.

It was good to see ten new members, seven of whom had played in the Association previously, while the other three were experienced umpires from other Associations. Four resigned for occupational reasons or moving interstate.

Again this year there were enough volunteer umpires to help the Juniors through the finals, but unfortunately not sufficient for the semi-finals. Four Chandler Shield players from one Club volunteered so to those players and the others, I thank them sincerely on your behalf. But I am disappointed that some Clubs, especially big Clubs, do not provide umpires for the finals. Everyone knows how much an umpire not associated with either competing team is appreciated. So what can we do in the future, when there aren't enough for each game? It seems to me not unreasonable to only allocate umpires to games where one or both teams have provided volunteers for the current or preceding seasons.

The Indoor Cricket Centre contests have been umpired by more than 10 individuals. All concerned thank them for their concentrated efforts. Do you realise that 7 of those umpires come from the neighbouring Associations of Box Hill Reporter and Yarra Valley?

INDOOR CENTRE

The Indoor Centre has now completed its first 12 months of operations.

In a new venture of this type there are ups and downs, difficulties encountered and solved and new techniques to be learned.

Essentially this is a business operation and business principles must be applied if we are to survive.

Therefore, promotion of the Indoor Cricket Centre and indoor cricket has been one of the major aims of the Committee.

An attractive pamphlet was printed and distributed widely and coverage of indoor cricket arranged in local newspapers, the Post Journal and radio stations.

Success can be gauged from the fact that our client catchment now extends from Burnley in the West to Warburton in the East.

Building up a business enterprise is a hard slog and whilst the Centre is now being used five nights a week plus some use on Sundays during the Winter, there are gaps on which we now have to concentrate. These gaps are day use and some parts of the summer period. Your Committee is now concentrating on these areas so that we can turn this Centre into a profitable exercise.

There have been factors which have affected our profitability, such as the standard of lighting, the flooding of the Centre, and power blackouts.

Whilst we have made a substantial loss in our first year due to initial capital costs and the time it takes to build up a customer catchment, indications for the next financial year are that we will run very close to break-even point, or we might even make a profit.

If we can plug those gaps I spoke about previously with new business, then the 'bikkies' should start rolling in.

The lighting problem will probably be solved by the time you read this with new lights giving us 600 lux — twice the amount of light we have been getting.

I would like to say a special thank you to the Yarra Valley Cricket Association and its Secretary Keith Thompson in the way that Association has supported the Indoor Centre.

OUTDOOR CRICKET GROUNDS

The No. 1 ground was once again used for regular matches, whilst No. 2 ground was used to provide a ground for those Clubs who, for short periods, did not have a ground available.

Once again watering was a problem and if it wasn't for Bill Dean's efforts, the ground would not be as good as it is.

The Committee is still endeavouring to get a pavilion built to service both grounds and a fence around No. 1 Oval.

The Committee has obtained a management plan for the turf wicket from the Frankston Turf Institute and has passed this on to Lillydale Shire Council.

The Indoor Centre was in full swing for the pre-season period but during the season the usage dropped off and only the Indoor Competitions saw the most action. Problems with the lighting and our inability to attract other sports to use the centre have not given us the most successful year but better things are no doubt on the way.

The major headache facing a lot of Clubs was the introduction of the Computer. This sorted out all the incorrect result sheets, team sheets etc. and many Clubs finished up with hefty fines for lots of mistakes. A lot of teething troubles were experienced but with these behind us it is expected that season 1981/82 will show the wisdom of entering the computer age.

As with any new venture you may hope that everything goes like clockwork from the start but in reality it seldom ever does. If everyone gets behind their Indoor Centre and their Computer Programme then it will be a viable proposition for 1981/82.

On the newspaper and Publicity front I experienced almost nil co-operation from Clubs and at times from organisers of R D C A events as well. The local papers, once again failed to come up to expectations and promises, with a haphazard coverage some weeks and then more than enough on others. To promote the Association you need a reliable coverage in the locals and a reliable source of info on highlights, results etc. As a very vocal member of a top Chandler Club informed me, 'What a load of rubbish you write. I can do much better.' I hope that he is elected to the executive this season and does just this.

Due to problems at my Club I find that I will not be available to serve on the Executive this season as I feel my place is back there helping them so I wish the incoming Executive a successful season and I hope my successor can improve on my efforts in promoting the Association.

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA DELEGATE'S REPORT

The Cricket Union of Victoria (or C U O V as we call it) is a federation of 23 cricket Associations totalling approximately 1700 senior teams and over 1000 junior teams in the Melbourne Metropolitan area.

The C U O V's aim is similar to that of the R D C A — the promotion, advancement and fostering of cricket in Victoria.

In the past two years the Executive of the C U O V has been conducting a comprehensive review of its role, its place in the cricket hierarchy and the state of junior cricket in Victoria.

As a result of this review the C U O V now holds general meetings on special topics at which representatives of member Associations with special interests are invited to attend in addition to normal delegates.

It has also held discussions with representatives of the V C A on a proposal for regional administration, training of coaches and coaching juniors. A member of the C U O V Executive (Tony Smith) is now a member of the V C A Coaching panel.

Special subjects covered have been:

- Safety rules
- Safety equipment
- Synthetic wickets
- Problems of Insurance
- Legal liabilities of Associations & Clubs

Topics currently being actively considered by the executive are:

- Modified standard rules for Under-age cricket
- Modified standard equipment for Under 12 cricket.
- Standard forms to reduce costs to Associations
- Communication between senior & junior cricket
- Umpires — Recruitment & Training

As the University has no district from which it can draw Under 16 players, the C U O V provides the manager and players for the University's Under 16 team in the W J Dowling Competition in January each year.

If any Clubs have Under 16 players who wish to try themselves out for a place in this team, your delegate can always tell you who to contact. Practices are held at Melbourne University and matches are played on the grounds of the various District Clubs.

The C U O V was also responsible for organising and managing the Australian Junior Cricket Carnival. It was held at Scotch College between Xmas and 31.12.80.

The R D C A again had three representatives in the Victorian team. They were Adrian Brush (2nd Carnival) (Norwood), Noel King (Croydon United) and Stewart Gibb (Kilsyth).

The Carnival turned into an exciting finish and 20 minutes before its end, either Victoria or Queensland could have won it. However, Queensland put the issue beyond doubt by defeating N S W outright.

Both Adrian Brush and Noel King were selected in the Australian Junior Carnival Eleven and the Association congratulates them on this honour.

REGISTRATION AND RECORDS SECRETARY'S REPORT

REGISTRATIONS

Season 1980-81 saw a continuance of our Association's growth with 40 senior Clubs and 146 senior teams. Following a change in our registration procedure it was no longer necessary to register players as juniors or seniors. As the one registration entitled a player to play in any grade with the R D C A — depending on his date of birth in the case of eligibility for juniors, no figures are available separating junior and senior players. There were a total of 5440 players registered to play with the Association during the season.

It is no doubt unnecessary to mention that our records became computerised prior to the start of the season. Insofar as registrations are concerned this move was a great success and I thank the Club representatives as a whole for their support and help in this regard. During the off season further work has been undertaken on the various Club listings which, by simplifying the block list, should reduce and hopefully eliminate many of the teething problems encountered.

CLEARANCES

During the year 138 clearances and/or permits were dealt with. Once again many applications were received requesting permission for players to drop down grades after they had played more than 8 games in higher grades. Let me say here that the permit committee expect each and every Club to keep tabs on its player's performances during the season and play players in grades in accordance with these performances.

FINES

A total of \$1192 fines for breaches of the rules relating to registrations and/or team result sheet misdemeanours were levelled. I do not wish to labour the point except to say that fines seem to be a necessary substantial cost of running a Club for some whereas other Clubs incur little or no costs in this regard.

RESULTS

Linked to the computerisation of our records there was a major change in the method of forwarding team and result sheets this season. This change meant that we could no longer rely on the postal service to deliver match sheets. As a result all sheets had to be delivered to my home by 7 p.m. on the night following the match. By and large this arrangement proved quite successful and I would like to thank the Club representatives for their co-operation.

In all good systems there is inevitably a flaw. So far as the computerisation of our records went, the recording of match results was accomplished with very few problems. However, when we turned our attention to individual batting and bowling averages, it was realised that our testing of the program in this regard had not been comprehensive enough and we had a programming fault. The result was that averages took some time to compile and even then there were irregularities. Let me apologize to all on behalf of Dataworld who run our records for us and assure all that the error has been corrected and will not occur again.

Enough from me, once again thanks to all for their help in completing what was far from an easy year for us all — these thanks extend to my wife and family without whose help the job would have been much more difficult.

All the best for the coming season.
