

1984-85 UMPIRE'S REPORT

I'm sure you are all aware that the R.D.C.A. is a well organised and successful Cricket Association. The standard of administration and positive thinking by the Executive is to the benefit of all clubs within the RDCA. So too is the standard of club administration and cricket ability a benefit to the Association. To maintain this standard all members of the R.D.C.A. should be looking ahead and continually asking the question "How can we improve our club" which in turn will improve the Association. Your Executive have this positive approach and to this end a future planning committee was formed last season. This committee is made up by representatives from 6 clubs within our Association all of whom are located in a different municipality Ringwood, Knox, Lilydale, Croydon, Nunawading, and Doncaster/Templestowe. The Executive is represented by Steve Pascoe, Ross Kennedy and myself. Each club has filled in a questionnaire and by your answers the future progress of the R.D.C.A. could be decided. One positive suggestion is to be implemented this coming season "a girls competition". Look around your club and see if there are any girls who would like to play cricket in a girls team. Perhaps you don't have enough to form a team. Give us their names and addresses and we can form a composite team or include them with another club, the main thing is to have them playing cricket. I thank on your behalf all members of the Executive for the excellent work they have done this past season. I would also like to thank those clubs that made me welcome at matches and/or social functions throughout the season. I extend to all members best wishes for the coming season.

Some time ago I based the theme of this report on the reasons which have influenced my involvement in cricket administration. The benefits to me in a personal, rather than tangible sense, have been numerous and I still get a kick out of seeing more and more people enjoying their game of cricket, whether it be with the RDCA or elsewhere.

Like most non-professional sports administrators, the motivator for involvement has been the aim to achieve an environment for their chosen sport, in which it can be played by as many people, at the best standard and with the best available facilities that are possible to obtain.

Over the past 15 years the RDCA has witnessed many changes; not the least of which is a 30% increase in affiliated clubs and a 76% increase in team entries. This growth is certain to continue in the near future and can only be checked by the restrictions placed by venue availability or short-sightedness by administrators.

With this in mind, and having regard to the need to put into train a future action plan to cater for trends before they become a problem, an Executive sub-committee, comprised mainly of club representatives, was formed to address club and Association requirements for a period of up to 10 years.

The initial phase of this exercise was to request clubs to supply data, both historical and current, and based on this information, their views on the future and philosophies of the club.

Judging from the submissions received, it is evident that many clubs exist on a season to season basis, with no forward thinking in relation to the future of their club and the facilities which they offer their members.

With the importance of an exercise such as this, it was somewhat frustrating that the quality and timeliness of submissions left much to be desired especially after the executive committee went to great lengths to explain its importance.

As an honorary office-bearer, the lack of response and corresponding enthusiasm from clubs has had a deflating influence on my enthusiasm for the job at hand.

Unfortunately last season presented a number of "deflators" ranging from failure of club delegates to support executive initiatives to lighten the burden of executive administrative requirements, to unsavoury on-field incidents and down right abuse.

These experiences have led me to the personal conclusion that many clubs and individuals do not have the well being of the Association as a whole at heart.

Their thinking and planning, if any, for the future revolves around what they can gain, without regard to the consequences on fellow clubs, members and/or the Association Executive.

Whilst acknowledging that affiliated clubs, through their delegates to the general committee, control the rules under which our Association operates (the Executive Committee merely administers these rules) perhaps the time is fast approaching where more direction, including rules changes and club administrative requirements, should be forthcoming from the Executive Committee.

I urge all clubs to give considerable thought to their involvement as a member of RDCA Inc. and to ensure that their representatives are properly instructed prior to attending delegates meetings.

If this achieves anything, it may rekindle my enthusiasm.

That was a much better season, the 1984-85 one. More teams than ever, more umpires than we have had on the panel previously and even a new umpire preparing for next year. Where did they come from and why? Four were ex-players of the RDCA, who couldn't afford the times for practise etc. but still wanted to be part of cricket in the RDCA, four were experienced umpires from other associations but who lived in our area and two had previously umpired for us but been absent for some years.

The umpiring standard improved from what we hear at the games, for instance one experienced Chandler Coach said the standard was consistently higher than he'd seen before. This improvement could have come from more captains' reports being sent in, or the use of these reports to compile statistics showing umpires how their performance compared with colleagues, or the improved co-operation from clubs and captains. All combined or any one of these categories could have been the answer, but I believe that any umpire can do a better job if he obtains co-operation from the captains and players. He can even enjoy the afternoon of cricket played properly.

Jack Burgum left to umpire in the Yarra Valley Association, Ross Carr moved to Buderim in Queensland, Stuart Gaunson umpired in the VCA, Paul O'Regan and Geoff Ward played cricket again, while one umpire hasn't been seen since a certain finals match last year.

Simon Burke and Craig Gaunson had major surgery during the year, recovered, and came back to finish the season. Umpires and players were glad to see them both fit and well again.

One aspect of the cricket calendar that must be considered in future is the playing of cricket on Sundays. Councils request greater usage of grounds such as play on Sundays, the Association can roster final games on Sundays, but some umpires prefer not to officiate on Sundays. Each year will give a different percentage of availability.

Thanks to all umpires for their loyal efforts during the season, you all contributed to the improvement on the field, and most of you to the lively interesting meetings held during the year.

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA — DELEGATES REPORT

22 Associations are affiliated with the CUOV comprising a total of 3030 teams (1828 senior teams and 1202 junior teams). 340 of these teams are from the RDCA. The VCA Development distributed cheques to 19 clubs.

The VCA Development distributed cheques to 19 clubs, including St. Andrews, South Croydon, and Norwood from the RDCA.

The CUOV training programme for umpires was organised — unfortunately the recruitment of new umpires did not meet with much success.

At the meeting held on 14th September, 1984 a tribute was paid to my predecessor Mr. Phil McCallum for his services to the CUOV. Phil was chairman of the CUOV Executive for 3 years. A minute of appreciation was recorded.

The Under 12 carnival played during January 1985 was won by the Ringwood District Cricket Association team and I was honoured to receive the Keith Mitchell trophy on their behalf. Eight Associations competed in the carnival and the members of the RDCA team are to be congratulated on the way they played the game and conducted themselves.

On February 14th, 1985 the Commissioner for Equal Opportunity, Commissioner Fay Marles, addressed the meeting on the effects of the Equal Opportunity Act (State) and the Human Rights Commission (Commonwealth) which came into force in August 1984. About 800 cases were settled this year — 95% of these were settled privately. Under the age of 12 all persons must be able to participate in any sporting activity, irrespective of sex.

Much discussion was held on revision of CUOV permit rule number 43, regarding clearances from a club in any Association to a club in a different Association. This matter has yet to be finalised.

INDOOR CRICKET CENTRE REPORT

The Indoor Centre has now reached the stage where there are very few vacancies. Games are being played each weekday from 6.00 pm to midnight and on Sundays from 4.30 pm to 10.30 pm. In addition there is a junior competition being played on three afternoons per week while schools are using the centre to a far greater extent than in 1984.

Financially the R.D.C.A. can look forward to a reasonable return in the years ahead. Expenditure over the past year was heavier than expected due to substantial increases in material costs.

The opening of the new Centre in Bayswater caused some problems late in 1984 and the number of teams fell below the minimum required for profitable operations, but with some different form of advertising, we recovered, to have a record number of teams for the season which began in March. It is expected that we will maintain these numbers although there will be no doubt, some reduction when the normal cricket season commences (this is common to all indoor centres).

If any person doubts the popularity of the indoor game, it is interesting to note that in the area covered by the R D.C.A. there are some 8,000 people playing indoor cricket each week.

Over the Christmas shut-down period the pitch area carpet was replaced by Super-Grasse and this has proved to be superior to the previous surface. It is hoped that over the next 18 months the whole area will be covered in Super-Grasse. Over the past twelve months other improvements have been made which have added to the appearance of the Centre.

In association with the other sports at the Kilsyth Sports Complex, preliminary discussions have been held with the Shire of Lillydale regarding future development of the complex. Amongst items being considered is the extension of the cricket centre to accommodate a further two courts or alternatively a new building on the other side of the carpark which would incorporate four courts. However, it must be stressed these are preliminary discussions only and it will be some years before any works will be undertaken.

No report would be complete without a mention being made of the work undertaken by Howard (Noel) Cox. Whilst Noel is a paid employee, he does a lot of minor maintenance work at the Centre and has proved to be a great supporter of the Centre.

Over the next few years the Centre should enable the R.D.C.A. to undertake certain initiatives to improve local cricket which otherwise would not have been possible.

MATCH COMMITTEE REPORT

The 1984/85 season wasn't one of the best seasons for representative teams of the RDCA. The one notable victory was the Senior Eleven's creditable win over the Ferntree Gully Association — something we've been trying to do for years. Other senior matches were closely fought and remained in the balance until the end

The Under 21 Eleven failed to repeat 1984's winning performance in the CUOV Carnival, but were victorious over Ringwood's 4th Eleven for the second year in succession.

I would like to congratulate all players selected in the Association's representative teams. Unfortunately, the attitude of several selected squad members let the teams down and new measures will need to be introduced to ensure the selection of keen squads in the future.

Spectator support at representative matches is also appreciated and I would also like to thank all those who attended. Let's hope we can do better in 1985/86.

Senior Eleven

The Senior Eleven competed in three matches during the season. They went down in the first match to a revitalised Croydon Sub-District Eleven who took things much more seriously this time. After getting off to a good start, the RDCA were held to a reasonable 6/175 in their allotted 45 overs by an accurate Croydon attack. Captain John Salter, batted exceptionally well for 55. Croydon batted with lots of purpose to reach 3/176 in the 38th over.

The second match saw the annual clash with the Ferntree Gully Association and a very business like RDCA team amassed 3/219 in their 45 overs. Ken Bronghill batted throughout for 102 not out; receiving excellent support from Ray Gale with 59. Gully put up a good fight, however impressive bowling from Robin King with 4/20 from 10 overs ensured an RDCA victory by dismissing Gully for 181.

The final match was a real cliff-hanger with North Suburban winning on the second last ball of the day after requiring 10 off the last over to win.

RDCA put together a reasonable 6/179 with Geoff Dans contributing 60. RDCA bowlers Doug Pedlar (4/38) and Robin King (2/47) kept the North Suburban batsmen struggling and at 9/148, it all seemed to be over, but then came a remarkable unbroken tenth wicket partnership of 33 to claim the match for North Suburban for the first time in several years.

Under 21 Eleven

The Under 21 Eleven had a disappointing season, winning only 2 of five matches and failing to have the numbers to field a team against North Suburban.

Captain Cameron Milnes provided the batting highlights in the first match against Box Hill Reporter District — scoring 58 of RDCA's total of 8/156. Box Hill were able to compile the necessary runs thus all but eliminating any chances of the RDCA winning the CUOV Carnival two years in succession.

Geoff Purcell had a brilliant day against Ringwood 4th Eleven, capturing 6 for 53 with the ball and knocking up a sound 57 not out with the bat.

The tight RDCA attack held Ringwood to a meagre 7/144 — a target which proved more difficult to reach than anticipated. RDCA lost wickets rapidly to be 6 for 56 when Dave Klepac (35) joined Geoff Purcell. Together they steadied the innings and laid the foundations for the second successive victory over Ringwood 4ths.

Dave Klepac (34) was again in form, along with his Mooroolbark mate, Peter Ricci (42), in assisting the RDCA to a winning score of 8/169 against Oakleigh District. Excellent bowling by Darren Dean with 5 for 12 from 8 overs limited Oakleigh to a total of 144.

Unfortunately, the winning streak didn't continue. A poor batting display against Essendon, Broadmeadows, Keilor Districts had the RDCA dismissed for 117. Only Dave Klepac (25), Geoff Purcell (22) and sundries (13) reached double figures. After losing early wickets Essendon recovered to reach 143.

The Under 21's also lost their final match against Ferntree Gully Association for the second year running. This has been a big morale boosting performance by Gully and a more concerted and keen approach will be needed by future RDCA teams. This is further evidenced by the fact that insufficient players could be found to field an Under 21 team against the North Suburban Association. More responsibility by both the club's and the nominated players themselves would be appreciated in the 1985-86 season.

INVESTIGATION/TRIBUNAL CONVENOR'S REPORT '84-85

There were two Tribunal and four Investigation Committee meetings during season 1984-85.

The first Tribunal meeting took place after Christmas and heard two matters that had occurred before Christmas. A player reported for misconduct (swearing) was given a severe reprimand while a second player was suspended for the remainder of the season for urinating on the playing field while the game was in progress

The second Tribunal meeting took place at the end of the home and away games and again involved two matters. The first matter concerned a captain who was reported for offensive behaviour, misconduct and disputing the umpire's decisions. The first two matters were not sustained while the charge of disputing the umpire's decisions was sustained and the player was reprimanded. The second matter concerned a charge against a side for misconduct and this charge was withdrawn by the umpire prior to the Tribunal hearing the matter. The Tribunal chairman noted that future charges against sides would be referred back to the Investigation Committee.

The first Investigation Committee meeting took place before Christmas and heard two matters. The first concerned a player reported for misconduct and the Committee found the charge sustained and suspended him for two matches. The second matter concerned complaints by the umpire about the behaviour of both captains from the match he was umpiring. The Committee found the charge sustained and warned both captains of their responsibilities as captains to ensure that the game is played in a sportsmanlike manner.

The second meeting of the Investigation Committee took place early in January. Again, two matters were heard. The first concerned a captain reported for misconduct. The matter was not sustained due to insufficient evidence. The second matter concerned the reporting of three players for misconduct (swearing, offensive behaviour) and the Committee found the matters proven, reprimanding the players and fined the side a total of \$50.

The third meeting of the Investigation Committee took place at the beginning of February and involved, initially, cross-complaints by two clubs. One charge concerned swearing, offensive behaviour and unsportsmanlike behaviour. The swearing was found proven and the other two charges were dismissed. The player was reprimanded. The second matter concerned the bahaviour of a capitain and involved swearing, drinking during the game and fighting. All three matters were found proven and the player was suspended until the end of the 1985-86 season.

The fourth meeting of the Investigation Committee took place after a junior semi-final and involved a fight between two parents of the opposing sides at the completion of play. The Committee found that the incident resulted primarily from the actions of one of the parents and reserved its decision.

The Tribunal and members of the Investigation Committee were in accordance with RDCA Rules 37-43 and Appendix 6.

Our thanks go to all members for their time and efforts, often at short notice.

Croydon's Hatch side won through to the semi-finals. Warrandyte's Reece Kline was named Victorian Under 16 captain.

Kilsyth won the Under 12 flag.

RDCA Under 16s defeated Goulburn Valley Under 16s. Richard Armstrong from St. Andrews and Stephen LeGet from Norwood also represented Victoria's Under 16 side.

Ringwood won the Clive Fairbairn Club Championship. Over 50 centuries were scored in the Junior competition this year.

However the Treasurer feels it is necessary to point out to all clubs that with increasing costs in Administration and the uncertainty of the amounts we will be required to pay for past rentals of the Indoor Cricket Centre, to the Shire of Lillydale, this sound financial position could change drastically. This would necessitate considerable increases in Affiliation and Registration fees.

May I offer my thanks to the Treasurers of all clubs for their assistance and co-operation throughout the 1984-85 season.
