In this regard promotion of Carnivals and representative teams over past years has provided many with the impetus to progress to District level and beyond. These players and others represented the RDCA in Under 16 competition during season 1982-83. They represent the future of cricket in our area.

If you see these names in District, state or our International teams in future; spare a thought for where they started their cricket and the amount of time and energy that, not only the player involved but, many people have contributed to assist them to realise their true ability.

INDOOR CRICKET CENTRE REPORT

The 1982-83 produced both pleasing and disappointing results for the Indoor Cricket Centre. The pleasing result was the record number of teams (48) which played in the 1982 Winter Competition which necessitated four grades to be conducted. On the other hand the lack of support by many clubs during the practice period, despite the imposition of a compulsory levy was most disappointing. Only 15 clubs used up to or in excess of their levy amount.

Overall the revenue derived at the centre maintained the level of 1981-82. The coaching clinic conducted by Stan Craker and George Tribe continued throughout most of the year and a number of young cricketers have been considerably assisted in their efforts to improve their cricket ability.

A series of discussions were held with the Shire of Lillydale regarding many of the problems facing the RDCA in its management of the Indoor Cricket Centre and some changes can be expected in the next few months.

The Committee met on 10 occasions during the year. At the end of 1981-82 Merv Ashwell found it necessary to resign from the position of Secretary/Treasurer. Merv's work during the early days of the Centre was most appreciated by both the RDCA and the Indoor Centre Committee.

The financial statement appears elsewhere in this report.

It could be said that it is only coincidental, but in my involvement with the Association our general sportsmanship to our opponents has never been better. If we have pleased most of the people most of the time then I guess what we have achieved has been worthwhile, but I was bitterly disappointed that some people sought to ridicule me personally. The publicity that I have corresponded has given support to every club who offered their co-operation (and many who didn't) and it was totally demoralising to be told otherwise.

SENIOR MATCH COMMITTEE REPORT

Senior Representative Teams for the RDCA enjoyed mixed success for season 1982-83. Based on the quality of previous teams selected to represent the Association, the teams selected both for the Under 21 and Senior Matches during the past season appeared to have greater depth and experience and therefore would succeed where in the past we had failed.

Teams chosen in the selection room unfortunately do not always display on the playing field the same skills that the selectors believed they possessed at the time of selection.

The RDCA Senior Eleven was perhaps one of the strongest teams to ever represent the Association yet we were unable to win the annual match against Ferntree Gully Cricket Association.

Losing by eleven runs is no disgrace but it certainly is a large disappointment for the players, the match committee and the RDCA in general.

The match started in gloomy weather, light rain, overcast and cold. Batting first the FTGCA batted slowly to begin with but stepped up the pace when their Captain L. Symonds got on top of the RDCA attack and scored what eventuated to be a match winning 39 not out, out of his teams total of 5 for 169.

Noel King with 2 for 54 was the RDCA's most successful bowler, brother Robin King was his main support and between them they bowled 31 of the 42 overs allotted.

A good start was given to the RDCA innings by G. Dans with 30 runs, but runs then became hard to get, a number of batsmen made a start and failed to go on. A valiant effort was made by Garry Paver with 39 not out, however, when Robin King was bowled for 18 time and luck had run out for the RDCA.

The senior eleven's second match against the North Suburban Cricket Association was a much happier affair for the RDCA.

An excellent team innings saw the Northern Association amass a total of 8 for 212 from 45 overs. Ray Gale with 4 for 58 was the leading wicket taker and Bruce Cass claimed two wickets.

A first ball wicket put the RDCA under pressure and it was then that the teams fighting quality was displayed, an excellent 83 not out from opener Ian Stewart and an aggressive 46 from John Kirby set the basis for a good team score. Three scores of 22 from Michael Piggot, Ray Gale, and Claude Reid (not out) and 16 from Noel King gave the RDCA victory at 5 for 214.

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA

DELEGATE'S REPORT

UNDER 21 ELEVEN

A number of new players made their debut in what can be claimed as the Association's most important representative team. Important on two counts:

1. The team mirrors the results of the Association's efforts to promote the skills of the game and the development of the game of cricket amongst young players.
2. The matches in which the team plays, provides the opportunity for young players to experience first class playing conditions, against players of the same age and of above average ability, with an opportunity for State Representation.

The Under 21 Eleven like the Senior Eleven in season 1982-83 had what appeared to be a more talented team than the previous year and indeed on a number of occasions displayed that talent.

Six matches were scheduled for the Under 21 eleven and the team won four of these games losing to Ringwood 4th Eleven in the first game at Pinks Reserve, and to Sunshine District in the CUOV Carnival which eliminated the RDCA on percentage from the semi-final of that competition.

Twenty players were given the opportunity to represent the Association in the Under 21 team. All did so in a worthy manner, although some enjoyed more success than others.

Greg Moorhouse was a consistent performer with the bat, with the Bowling Honours being shared. Much hard work was carried out by Darren Dean supported by Michael Dunn. However, it was not until the game against the Northern Association that our bowlers were able to call the tune (a matting wicket helped).

SUMMARY FOR SEASON 1982-83

The Selection Committee for the first time for many years invited players to join the respective senior squads; this, I believe, improved the quality of the group from which the various teams were chosen.

Training sessions were well attended and an excellent attitude to training was displayed.

Invitations were extended to players other than Chandler Shield Players, the object of this being to establish that the skill of all players in the RDCA was recognized.

Despite the considerable improvement in the selection process, it appears further improvement is necessary as some invitees put club interests before the association by making themselves unavailable.

FOR SERVICES RENDERED

The well worn phrase "It makes more than one swallow to make a Summer" aptly describes the many people who assisted in the organisation that is necessary to stage representative matches VIZ:—

THE PLAYERS

All players selected represented in the RDCA and the game of cricket in a manner which reflected the best traditions of the game.

THE SQUAD MEMBERS

A willingness to train hard, and a recognition that to be invited to join an RDCA selection squad was clearly in evidence amongst the squad members.

THE UMPIRES

"The Men in White" performed their roles with a minimum of fuss and their contribution to the respective games was appreciated by both players and officials.

THE CAPTAINS

Ray Gale, Senior Eleven, and Lindsay Wolf, Under 21 Eleven, each led their teams in a manner which brought credit to the Association. The respective Vice Captains ably supported the Captains.

TEAM MANAGERS AND SCORERS

Scoring is an arduous task and the Senior Eleven is indebted to Mr W. Discombe for his accurate recording of match details.

Total commitment is the only way to describe the Dunn family from the Mount Evelyn Cricket Club. The family provided players, manager, and scorers for the Under 21 Eleven. The Match Committee extends thanks and well done to the Dunns.

GROUND MANAGERS

Pre-match preparations begin early in the week, the Match Committee thanks all those involved in providing venues, wickets, materials and catering.

A special note of thanks goes to the East Ringwood Cricket Club and its president Bill Wilkins for the use of the Club's ground and magnificent facilities.

THE MATCH COMMITTEE

Without the work of a conscientious Committee the season would not have proceeded as smoothly as it did in 1982-83. As chairman I thank all Committee Members for their involvement and dedication to selecting teams worthy of representing the RDCA.

MATCH COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

The RDCA is a member of the Union, together with 22 other Associations, representing some 45-50,000 cricketers in the Melbourne and Metropolitan area.

The Union's primary objective is the promotion, advancement and fostering of cricket in Victoria. Therefore, it is in the interests of clubs in the RDCA to take an interest in what the Union is doing. If you do not, you may let an opportunity slip by and regret it later.

I mentioned last year that the VCA had established a Cricket Development Fund and that the VCA expects the Union to advise it on the allocation of funds in the form of grants to clubs. Last year the Union and the Victorian Country Cricket League made recommendations for grants totalling more than \$6,000.

This year the amount available for grants will more than double that amount.

The Union developed a submission to the VCA on ways and means to increase the number of umpires in junior cricket. This project is titled "Come On Ump." The VCA is presently considering this submission.

The VCA's Synthetic Surfaces Sub-Committee has continued its work this year. A number of synthetic surface manufacturers have been invited to put down pitches using their own synthetic materials. Most of these have been installed and testing is about to begin. The Frankston Turf Institute has indicated an interest in this project and has offered the use of equipment for testing purposes.

Your delegate continued as Chairman of the CUOV Executive for the second year.

INVESTIGATION/TRIBUNAL CONVENOR'S REPORT

There were three Tribunal and three Investigation Committee meetings during season 1982-83.

Early in the season the Tribunal disqualified a Captain/Coach for the remainder of the 1982-83 season after being found guilty of striking another player with a bat.

Another Captain/Coach was disqualified for two matches after pleading guilty to misconduct and disputing an umpire's decision.

The third decision of the Tribunal was a two match suspended sentence until the end of the 1983/84 season given to a player for swearing at an umpire.

The Investigation Committee acted on an Umpire's match report and investigated misbehaviour of a Captain/Coach. After being found guilty, a two match suspended sentence until the end of the 1982/83 season, was imposed.

An Investigation Meeting was called to hear an appeal against a Junior Executive decision which found a team was wrong to leave a game early, due to weather conditions, without the agreement of the opposing side and awarded six match points. The Investigation Committee upheld the decision of the Junior Executive.

The third Investigation Meeting was to hear a charge laid by a Club against an opposing player for misbehaviour and bad language. The player was found guilty and given a four match suspended sentence until the end of the 1983-84 season. As well, his club was fined \$50.00 for failing to maintain adequate control of its players.

In the three cases where Captain/Coaches were involved, the Chairman of the Meeting made it clear the Captain/Coaches have major responsibilities and must set the right example to their players.

The Tribunal and members of the Investigation Committees were in accordance with RDCA Rules 38 and 38(a).

Our thanks go to all the members for their time and efforts.

REGISTRATION AND RECORDS SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Association continued its growth in the 1982-83 season with 6283 players being registered to play with the 152 senior and 156 junior teams of the 39 affiliated clubs. Once again the use of computer facilities to perform the basic recording and checking function relating to players and teams has proved invaluable. As we all become more and more familiar with the computer input requirements the accuracy of the results produced can only improve and this has been demonstrated in this years print outs.

163 players sought clearances and/or permits during the season and I am pleased to report that once again it was only necessary for the Permit Committee to meet and arbitrate on one clearance problem.

It is not so pleasing to report that fines for breaches of rules etc!! still constitute a major problem for many clubs. It never ceases to amaze me that clubs persist in adding considerable costs to their club's running expenses because they do not operate within the rules. Several clubs have succeeded in eliminating this cost, so it can be done — let us have a concerted effort by all clubs next season to reduce fines.

My thanks are again extended to Dataworld (now O-Rielly Computers) for their continuing co-operation and assistance, to club representatives for their help in providing timely computer input and to my family on behalf of club representatives and myself for their assistance with the various tasks involved with running our Association.

JUNIOR SECRETARY'S REPORT

After my first season as Junior Secretary for the RDCA, I would sincerely like to thank all the Junior Executive and Junior Administrators of the Association for their assistance and co-operation.

We had rather a rough start to the season and I am sure that we have learnt a great deal by our mistakes and should start season 1983/84 a lot better.

With an Association as large as ours, it takes many man hours to be able to compile fixtures and commitments for 158 sides. The many withdrawals of teams at the start of the season created many a headache, but with nominations of sides to be in earlier next year, this should be eradicated.

Another large problem is grounds, lack of — unplayable — Council commitments — etc. Whilst we realise that in many cases ground changes are unavoidable, I am sure that in the bulk of circumstances had the Association been notified when Clubs initially knew of their plight for a ground, the confusion of ground allocation in the early part of the season would have been largely eliminated.

The weather was very kind to cricket throughout the season, although I am sure that there were many who felt as though they were playing on concrete Car Parks I threatened to put teams on.

Many thanks go to Brian Plumridge for the running of the Association Carnivals. The RDCA really can hold their head high when it comes to competitive cricket against other Associations.

Junior Presentation Night at the Cultural Centre was a very successful evening. It is most pleasing to know that the Carlton Trophy will be open to all Under 16 boys from now on. John Scholes from Carlton spoke extremely well and held the audience's interest throughout.

JUNIOR SECRETARY

JUNIOR REGISTRATION AND RECORDS SECRETARIES REPORT.

Another season completed, more teams competing, more players registered than ever before, will we ever stop growing — hopefully never.

However it was not without its moments. Before we had even reached round three, there had been four teams withdraw and four different teams added to the competition. This did not help with the arranging and completion of the season's fixtures which had to be amended very soon afterwards as we learned of the unavailability of grounds. These alterations also affected rounds eight and ten in the Under 12 competition and the failure of Club officials in ensuring their Team Managers were aware of these changes was, at the time, disappointing. Some complaints were received that Clubs had not been advised, but these major changes to the fixtures were advised in a numbered circular. The idea behind numbered circulars to Clubs is that they should be kept in chronological order and if a circular is not received the matter can be rectified by them quickly.

After all that had blown over, we ended up with a total of 158 teams from 38 different Clubs contesting each other. The number of teams has grown from 138 in 1980/81 and 146 in 1981/82. Probably the biggest limiting factors in the future growth of our Junior Competition will be the associated costs in providing equipment for these players, sufficient Mums and Dads to look after them (particularly after they leave the Under 12's) and the availability of having somewhere to play our competition matches each Saturday. These are important matters that affect us all but, regrettably, we do not have the answers to them.

We still have not been able to convince our computer to provide a count of the junior players in our Association but there are approximately 3270. This is an increase of 5.5% over last season and 17.04% over the 1980/81 season. Of these 3270 players, five are young girls, one of whom played for Ainslie Park U14's, one for Croydon North U12's and three for St. Andrews U12's. We would like to see some more young girls enter into our competition and show the boys how it should be done.

As is the case every year, a certain percentage of players seek transfer from one Club to another for varying reasons. This season, a total of 93 players sought and received a transfer to another Club. Some of the reasons given for requesting a transfer are interesting:

"I never got a game and I didn't like the coach." "Friends."

"Unable to get a game."

"Father wants son to change Clubs to get a better go and have a chance of playing cricket." We trust that they all got a regular game and that the new coach was a good guy.

This season has been a bad one for Clubs playing unregistered, ineligible or over-age players. We mentioned in last season's report that this was a worsening trend and there really is little excuse for this development. Perhaps the pressures and work loads are too heavy for that every decreasing band of voluntary helpers and the player registration/recording at the Club level is given insufficient attention. It must be a terrible experience to have to inform the team that even though they won the game they didn't get the six points. Could you believe that one Club played the same unregistered player in four (4) matches even though they were informed after the first match in which he played.

Look at these figures, last season's figures are in brackets

In comparing these figures over the 1980/81 season, the results are really appalling — look 1980/81

What these figures also show is a trend that the increasing number of unregistered etc. players are in actual fact coming from a decreasing number of Clubs. We hope yours is not one of them.

The organisation and management expertise required in administrating a successful cricket club today is not far short of that required in running a successful business venture. It takes a lot of time and effort for a Club to run smoothly and efficiently and the above figures do, we believe, strengthen our point that more effort in the ways of systems, expertise etc. in the recording and registering of players must surely be a top priority for some Clubs in the seasons to come.

Last year we gave a lot of attention to the errors made by the Clubs in their presentation of the Association's Official Result Sheets. We do not intend to repeat these statistics again this year. However it would be wrong of us if, after having started something last season, we did not follow it up this season. We are pleased to record that the error rate decreased remarkably with the majority of Clubs at the top of the table reversing their trend of last season and finishing at the bottom of the table. We believe that the highlighting of these errors achieved the result we set out to achieve — an improvement in the completion of the result sheets by most Clubs, result — less work for us, less costs to Clubs. To those people who managed this form reversal, we both say a hearty thank you.

We did not start out on this report with the intention of looking at the darker side of our season just passed, but statistics are able to be used (as you all know) to present all kinds of pictures to those who wish to know and sometimes to even those who do not wish to know.

We now have the greatest pleasure in presenting a statistical record of the 1982/83 season as seen through the eyes of firstly, the participating players of those teams who were winners in the various grades of our Junior Competition, the individual trophy winners and those batsmen and bowlers whose performances during the season were rather special.

We trust that those young men leaving our Under 16 competition this season will go on to bigger, better and brighter happenings in senior cricket for many more years to come and if it has not been your luck to score a century in junior cricket, remember that it took the President of our Junior Competition (no names mentioned here) 37 years before he scored his first ton.

Thank you to all those persons at Club level, and in a lot of instances to their wives, who helped during the season in endeavouring to reconcile which bowler bowled all the no balls and the correct initials of F. Cook who is called Fred but is registered as D.
