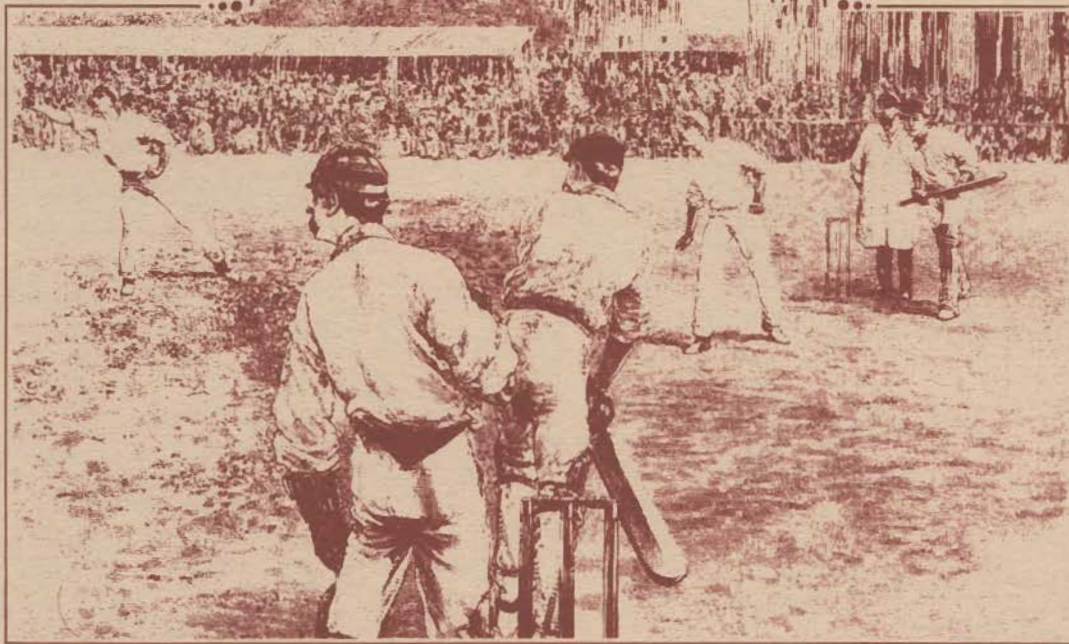

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In setting down the lasting impressions of the 1989-90 cricket season, one outstanding bad trend dominates my thoughts.

This trend was an increasing number of physical clashes in the lower grades between players and in a few instances, between players and the amateur umpire. In each of these incidents there were very experienced cricketers involved and, in looking over the statements that were made to the Investigation Committee, it is obvious that these mature people reacted in an uncharacteristic way to a situation that they had probably faced many times before in a cricket match. Cricket is a game which requires all participants to play the game by the Rules and to apply common sense and courtesy to any situation which the rules may not precisely or fully cover. The experienced cricketers within the Association must set the example in sportsmanship and goodwill to the younger players. Fighting with and abusing other players and the umpire is **Just not cricket** and I trust that the very firm action taken by the Investigation Committee in suspending the players concerned for long periods will serve to remind all members of the Association that we all deserve the opportunity to enjoy our cricket free of these unpleasant incidents.

The other jarring note from last season was the number of forfeits given in the last home and away game. These forfeits certainly spoil the last game for a lot of teams - those who received the forfeit missed out on a game of cricket, but more importantly the teams relying on a good win the last game to make the final four were very frustrated in a couple of grades because the team above then received a forfeit (with maximum points) and thereby blocked any other team from making the four. Several clubs were deeply upset that their team effort was spoiled in this disappointing manner and some changes to the rules and points system have been suggested to ease the problem. But the more acceptable solution is that each club makes a very real effort to fulfill its obligations to field all teams each Saturday.

But enough of the bad things that have happened! There were many, many good things that were pleasant reminders of our past season.

After the usual wet start we enjoyed generally good weather conditions and during the finals series perfect weather enabled all games to be decided on merit. A very thrilling Chandler Shield final saw a win to Croydon North after it seemed that Norwood had the game sewn up. The game was played in a wonderful spirit, totally free of some of the incidents that plagued our final series in past years. In fact all games in the final series were most enjoyable for players and spectators alike and were a real credit to all members of our Association. We made the preliminary moves to establish our own cricket headquarters at the Kilsyth Indoor Cricket Centre and hopefully this facility will be available for our meetings and administration work before the end of next season.

The vote count and presentation ceremonies were well organised and most enjoyable evenings and in contrast to recent years were not a financial burden.

Ken Dunham put a lot of hard work into our computer system in the early part of the season, so that our system became the envy of all other cricket associations for its accuracy, speed and simplicity. The R.D.C.A. is most fortunate that Ken has been available to volunteer his knowledge of the computer industry and apply it to his love of cricket to produce a computer system second to none in cricket administration. His efforts in obtaining all the data within two days of the end of the season left all the other Associations for dead, and this feat was performed at minimal cost to the clubs. Thank you Ken for your efforts on behalf of all cricketers in the Association.

All members of the R.D.C.A. Executive deserve your thanks for the way each of them has shouldered their share of the work load. Our meetings have been real work sessions with every member contributing solidly to the success of the Association.

A special mention needs to be made of the dedication shown by our Secretary, Lindsay Trollope, whose efforts on behalf of the Association are worth very much more than we could ever pay him. Lindsay receives excellent support from his family but his interest in cricket and this Association drives him to perform minor miracles at regular intervals and overcome obstacles that would have been insurmountable to others. On your behalf I thank him for these many hours of work and I trust that he and his family will continue to serve the Association for many years yet.

I thank all of you for your efforts in supporting the Association and I trust that you thoroughly enjoyed your cricket in 89-90.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The 69th Annual Meeting of the Ringwood and District Cricket Association held on Friday 18 August, 1989 officially opened the 1989/90 cricket season.

Mr. Bill Wilkins was re-elected unopposed to the position of President and with a committee of both old and new faces we looked forward to a successful playing season. The normal pre-season organisation proceeded smoothly and we awaited the first Saturday in October with eager anticipation. However, Mother Nature was not on her best behaviour and it looked, for some time, that the cricket season may need to have been played on Ken Dunham's computer. However the skies eventually cleared and the ground dried up and the on-field activity began and, with a little juggling of the fixture, we were able to play a full season of cricket. On the last Saturday in March we were able to look back on yet another great season in the R.D.C.A.

In general terms the cricket season was one of great highlights although there were some problems with behaviour on the field particularly in the latter half of the season. Bill Wilkins has advised of these in his report and I do not wish to dwell on these except to re-iterate his comments that cricket is a game that should be played free of unpleasant incidents.

For the third successive season the Chandler 1 final was a thrilling game in which Croydon North came from almost certain defeat to score a meritorious victory over Norwood. With apologies to Bill Dean, a football comparison would have seen Croydon North ten goals behind at three-quarter time. Congratulations to all other premierships winners and, in particular to Croydon United and Westwood who secured promotion to higher grades by their victories in A and B grades respectively.

Off-the-field the work of the Association seems to increase each year and to all members of the Executive I express my gratitude for the many hours of toil and their assistance to me personally which certainly lightens the work load. The information provided by Ken Dunham through the computer certainly has streamlined our administration.

Oversighting all this off-field activity is Bill Wilkins and, on behalf of all members of the R.D.C.A. I thank Bill for his leadership throughout the year.

I referred in last year's report to the possibility of the Association erecting its own office and administration facilities on the mezzanine floor of the Kilsyth Indoor Cricket Centre. We have advanced somewhat and at the time of writing, plans have been submitted to the Shire of Lillydale to obtain the necessary permits for the work to begin.

Bill referred in his report to the assistance given to me by my family and to Beverley and Vicki I thank them for their continued help with typing, answering telephone calls, etc. Bev got her own back as I seem to spend a lot of time answering queries on Badminton. We all look forward to another great season in 1990/91 and, with the new grade structure, it is anticipated that this coming season will prove to be the most even in R.D.C.A. history.

UMPIRE'S REPORT

1989/90 has been our strongest year numerically. We lost the services of 3 umpires from last year due to personal circumstances, but were fortunate in gaining 8 new ones. On several occasions, we were able to appoint 29 umpires, covering Chandler Shield, A Grade 1, B Grade 1 and Chandler 2 games and also some A Grade 2 matches. As well, throughout the season we were able to officiate in Inter-Association matches (Senior and Junior), High School finals and the Veterans final.

In the finals series, we received assistance from 11 volunteers, who performed admirably, receiving excellent reports from the captains.

Two umpire training courses were held, and all clubs were requested to participate. A copy of Tom Smith's book, "Cricket Umpiring and Scoring" the most comprehensive work on the rules of our game, was donated by the R.D.C.A. to each club that attended the course. Certificates were presented to the players who passed an examination at the end of each course. A video featuring Dicky Bird was shown and also a video and slides were made by members of the R.D.C.A. Unfortunately five clubs did not attend any of these sessions.

Several players had to face the tribunal as a result of reports of misconduct, and regrettably sledging and abuse incidents increased during the season with some players being warned. I believe that this type of behaviour should be controlled by the captain/coach of the teams, and that umpires should not be expected to control these incidents. I would like to express our thanks to many teams who cooperate fully with the umpires in making the game of cricket enjoyable.

My thanks also to Ken Dunham and Stuart Newey for their contributions both to the Umpires Association and also the R.D.C.A.

Out thanks to the R.D.C.A. Executive Committee members for their continued support of our Association. Finally I wish to express my gratitude to the umpires who participated in our meetings and officiated at matches throughout the season, and particularly this season to my wife, Connie, for acting as Receptionist, Secretary and telephonist in my absence.

Late team sheets continue to be a problem. The result was that a minority of clubs cause the remainder to suffer as correct ladders cannot be compiled and maintained.

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA — DELEGATE'S REPORT

The 1989/90 season offered further opportunities to share ideas with the other affiliated associations. The majority of these associations has solved the problem of slow over rates and late finishes by imposing a loss of bonus points for each over not completed by 6 p.m. and it is my belief that this is the only way that we will remedy the situation.

The Victorian Cricket magazine was distributed to all Clubs again this season and the C.U.O.V. scorebooks are being reprinted and will be made available at a lower price than purchased made from other sources.

A copy of two umpire training videos, the basic one featuring Dicky Bird and also one for advanced training have been provided gratis to each Association.

The Victorian Cricket Association spent over \$5,600.00 on the umpire promotion programme which they will be repeating this year with advertising in August and training programmes in September. The V.C.A. again allocated funds for development grants — at the time of writing this report details are not available regarding which Clubs were in receipt of these grants (Croydon Hockeyers and Mooroolbark received grants in the 1989/90 season). The R.D.C.A. was represented at all C.U.O.V. meetings and David Kavanagh was also a delegate for his second year.

On behalf of the R.D.C.A. I would like to thank the C.U.O.V. Executive members for their time and efforts, which have contributed to another successful year for the Union, in its role of assistance and support to the 24 affiliated associations.

I have enjoyed the opportunity to act as R.D.C.A. delegate, along with David Kavanagh, and to participate in discussions with the aim in view — the game of cricket and its future.

Mooroolbark also entered a team but was unable to produce enough players and withdrew just prior to the commencement of the Vets Season. The Veterans Season commenced with Round 1 on Sunday 29th October and after 7 home and away rounds concluded with the final between the top two teams on Sunday 25th February. Unlike the Saturday competition the Vets after two seasons are yet to lose a day through inclement weather.

A total of 155 players (five of them 60 plus) participated for the 9 teams with the trend moving towards teams comprised of players that are playing solely veterans cricket. This was evident in the final when former top grade players Hans Milo, Rob Jonson, Pat Arbuckle and Kevin Donchi played dominant roles for Croydon North in the defeat of Kilsyth in a high scoring game at Hughes Park.

This season saw the introduction of an Inter Association game when the R.D.C.A. travelled to Ferntree Gully on Sunday 3rd December. The team was captained by Hans Milo and defeated the Ferntree Gully Cricket Association in a very interesting game. A return match has been pencilled in for Season 1990/91.

Another innovation was the End of Season Veterans Picnic which was held at Warrandyte Reserve on Sunday 4th March with a Spit Roast and games for the ladies, children and the vets. Old timer, 63 year old, Neville Asquith won the Veterans Handicap with great dash. Thanks to John Springett and his committee for organising this function.

Congratulations to Croydon North as premiers and thank you to the R.D.C.A. Volunteer Umpires Colin Hill and John Tate who officiated in the Final. Thank you also to our Patron, Mr Bill Dean, who supported us admirably once again.

TREASURER'S REPORT

I am pleased to present the Balance Sheet of the Ringwood and District Cricket Association Inc. for the year ended 31st May, 1990.

The R.D.C.A. is in a reasonably sound financial position at this stage, but, owing to continued increases in the running costs of such a large organization, there will be an increase in Affiliation Fees for the 1990/91 Season.

It is unfortunate that some clubs have had to pay a bond for misdemeanours throughout the Season. These bonds are held by the Association for the period decided by the Tribunal.

The Executive are aware that some clubs are finding it difficult to meet their financial obligations. This situation is aggravated, in many clubs, by changes to office-bearers mid-season and lack of communication between Delegates to R.D.C.A. Meetings and their Club Committees.

The Junior Committee report the necessity to impose fines totally \$2,000 for the Season, to many clubs. The Senior Committees of these particular clubs are neglecting to watch over their Junior Teams sufficiently. There were several cases of \$20 fines to clubs for not providing umpires for Junior Finals. A little more care in club administration would greatly improve the financial situations of many clubs.

The Vote Count Night was a success, even without a Guest Speaker. The Executive will endeavour to provide a Speaker or Entertainer for the next V.C.N.

The Presentation Night was well supported by 268 members and guests. We have been very happy with the central venue of the past two years, but the Executive are looking at the possibility of a change of venue for the 1990/91 Presentation Night.

May I offer my congratulations to Anne and Steve Pascoe, who, as joint Social Secretaries, did a magnificent job in their organization of both the V.C.N. and Presentation Night. Well done Anne and Steve. They took over the collection of all monies for these functions which made my job much easier and enabled me to enjoy the night without financial problems.

In closing I would like to thank all Treasurers/Officials for their co-operation throughout the 1989/90 Season.
