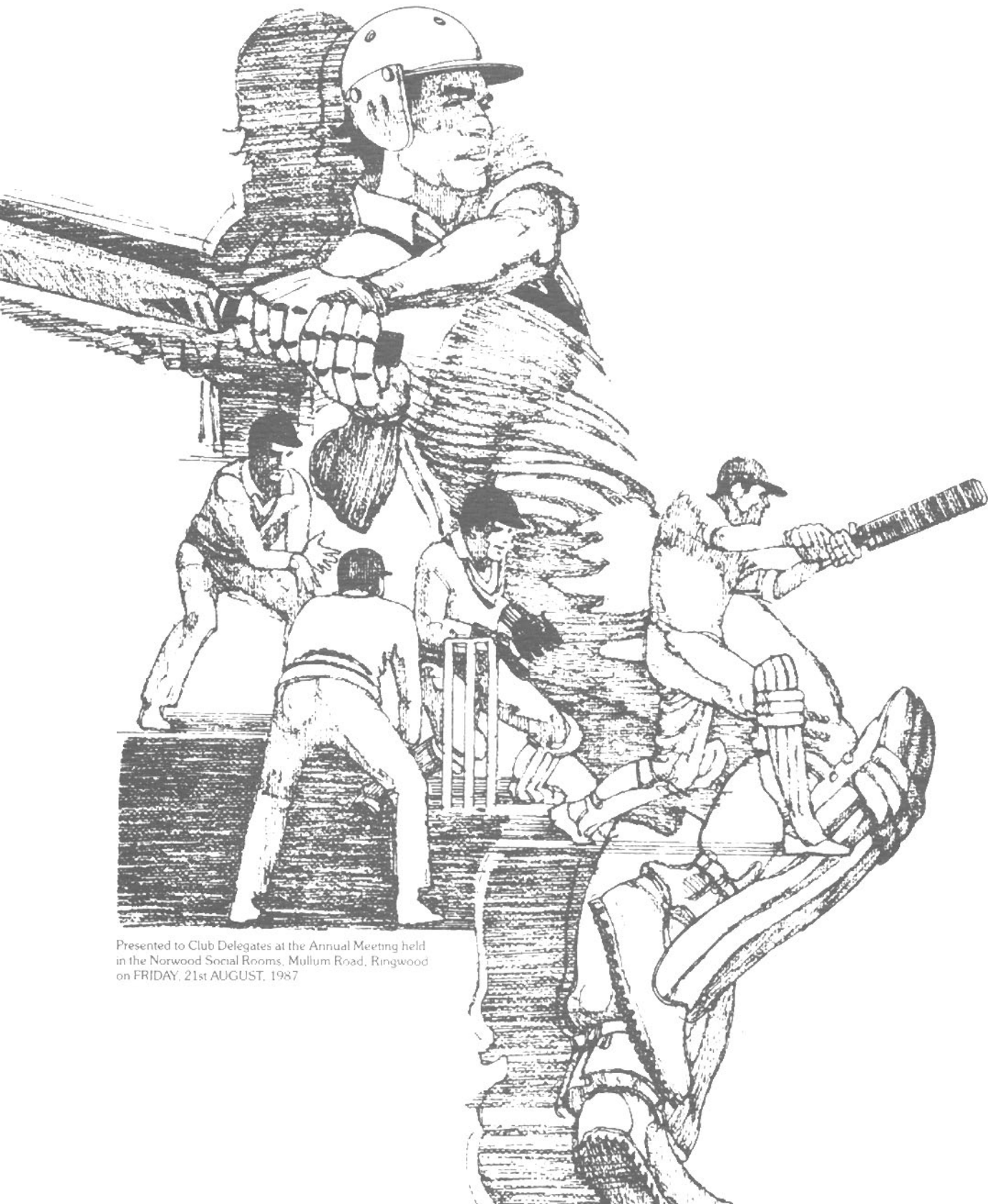

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 1986/87 cricket season will be remembered by many of us as "The Clayton Season" in particular its commencement which started by not playing our game of cricket.

The weather conditions, which we can't control, and the football competition that allowed the over-use of playing fields resulted in those grounds becoming unplayable. Some ground authorities did not exercise proper control by allowing the grounds to be over-used, which meant that restoration work couldn't be carried out in time for the cricket season to commence on the due date.

All these events worked against us and caused frustrations within our clubs. I am convinced that this frustration was carried on to the field once we started to play cricket, with the result that sportsmanship suffered on many occasions.

The disgusting language that some people seem to accept as everyday behaviour must be stopped. It is the responsibility of every club and member to control their players and themselves in this regard. The umpires, whether official or club must exercise more control on the players if they (the players) will not control themselves. It is not good enough to take the attitude, "This is how they behave at home". They are not at home, they are representing your club. I can assure you that any player reported and found guilty of using language that will bring our Association into disrepute, will be dealt with severely. What a pleasure it was to watch the "G" Grade final between Wantirna and Lilydale and to hear the remarks, (during and after the match) of both clubs. Both official umpires and supporters spoke of the enjoyment they derived from the closely played match. I wonder why this attitude isn't copied by all clubs and grades in our association.

Perhaps some players think they are "bigger than the game", let me assure you they are not.

However, let me now write of the pleasant aspects of the season.

A special "thank you" goes to Ken Dunham for the work he does for our association. The survey of synthetic wickets is a great help to clubs in other associations affiliated with the Cricket Union of Victoria.

The VCA have requested the information and so cricket at least in Victoria will benefit. He also conducted a survey (in liaison with Norm Barnfield, our future planning secretary) on club history and future planning which will be a great assistance to the association for years to come. The CUOV and the VCA have also shown interest and have requested a copy of those findings.

Lindsay Trollope wonders whatever he did with his spare time before taking on the job of general secretary, he doesn't have to worry about his spare time now - he doesn't have any.

And so it is with the other executive members all devoting their time for the benefit of cricket. On your behalf I thank them as well as the junior executive who under the efficient leadership of Bill Wilkins do such a wonderful job for cricket in our junior competition.

I wish you all a very happy season in 1987-88.

It may be better not to participate in these games if the association cannot be represented by its best team.

I thank all club secretaries for their assistance to me throughout the season. I am, of course, well aware of the time involved in club administration, but 99.9% of the time, I received the necessary information without the need for follow-up action. My personal thanks to my daughter, Vicki, for her assistance with the typewriter and also for being responsible for the phone scores, despite giving birth to her second daughter just prior to the season.

I also thank other members of the executive for the valued help throughout the year. Our computer genius, Ken Dunham, certainly lightens the load of the secretary, particularly with his assistance with the compilation of the draw.

The future of the RDCA is assured but we must not rest on our laurels. As we approach the end of the 80s, questions relating to ground availability, pitch surfaces, Sunday competition, paid administration will need to be faced and answered. We look forward to your co-operation. I wish all clubs a successful season in 1987-88.

UMPIRE'S REPORT

Numerically this was our best year for some time, and 33 umpires were available for appointment. We gained the services of several ex-players, Neil Brunlow, John Griffin, David Kavanagh and Peter Williams - also 2 experienced umpires, Max Lyon from the Ferntree Gully Association, and Colin Hill from Sub District. Colin will also be remembered by many players as Past President of Mooroolbark Cricket Club. Ken McKenzie and Andy O'Sullivan who have previously officiated in the RDCA returned to the fold and we were delighted to welcome back Stan Thompson for the latter part of the season - after being unavailable earlier due to illness.

We were able to supply two umpires for every final match - and in addition the inter-association games - senior, Under 21, Under 14 and Under 12 were all covered. This coverage was quite an achievement, for neighbouring associations have not been as successful - but we are still hoping for more. Players considering retirement and other interested persons will be made most welcome in our ranks. Cricket can be enjoyed by the umpires, as well as the players.

Considering the size of our association, the number of players reported this season would represent a very small percentage indeed. However, a little more self-control from the players involved and more control by the captains could cut this percentage to zero. Our umpires gain no pleasure from reporting a player, and everyone enjoys a match that is free from unpleasant incidents. Having written those few words, I would like to say "thank you" on behalf of our umpires to the captains and the vast majority of players who believe that cricket is a great game and play it that way.

I would also like to thank all the members of the Umpires Association for their support throughout the season, and for their attendance and participation at our meetings, which have on occasions been extremely lively with plenty of constructive discussion.

Finally I wish to express my gratitude to two long-serving stalwarts, our secretary, Ken Dunham and our adviser, Stuart Newey for the time and effort they place into the Umpires Association, over and above their contributions to the RDCA as members of the executive committee. Every organisation needs members of this calibre and we are extremely fortunate to have them.

The 1986/87 cricket season started off in what has become the familiar pattern of withdrawn teams as the expectations of the clubs with respect to new players were not realised

Unfortunately the very bad weather in September and October prevented the Junior Cricket practice from getting underway and the direct result of this was a record number of withdrawals.

The fixtures had to be redrawn in many grades and this involved Bob Giles and other members of the Junior Committee in a lot of extra work and the season did not really settle down until November

The bad weather also upset other games during the season and played havoc with the final series

In fact some Under 12 teams only played a full game of cricket on six Saturdays, so it was a very short season for them.

Both Rod and Bob have indicated that they must relinquish their position on the junior committee and we will miss the enthusiasm and diligence of the two hard working men

In hindsight one of the main problems with a season like we've just been through is that we don't get to a stage where we settle into a routine. Thus, for many, every Saturday we play is like the start of another season. This makes it harder on everybody as little problems keep arising to prevent games proceeding smoothly. As a result, not only do we lose playing time because of the weather, we also lose time when we're able to play because we're never properly organised.

At executive level we've settled into a regular pattern of handling the things we have to do each season. This makes it so much easier as we don't have to re-invent the wheel each season - all that's needed is to identify where changes to the routine have to be made for whatever reason and to arrange for these to be made. When seasons like 1986/87 come along, the value of having a basic routine to work from is immense. Clubs that have severe difficulties during 1986/87 ought ponder this seriously. If your club is one of these, I suggest before next season's activities start that you go through all 86/87 junior circulars noting the timing and requirements of each one. Then, from this, draw up your own timetable of what you are going to need to do at various stages through 1987/88. Plan your activities around this and you'll find things will go so much more smoothly.

As I write this report I'm very conscious that it's my last as Junior Secretary. While I'd like to front up again, other circumstances make this impossible for me. So, before I finish I want to sincerely acknowledge and thank you all for the co-operation and support I've enjoyed over the last two seasons. I trust my successor will be given the same support and will find the job as enjoyable and satisfying as I have done.

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA – DELEGATE'S REPORT

This year the RDCA was represented by two delegates (Ron Ellis and David Thompson) at the Cricket Union of Victoria (CUOV) meetings for the first time. This measure was adopted to ensure that information flows more readily between all levels of cricket particularly from CUOV to association to club. It is probably too early to judge the success of this move, however, we feel there is still room for improvement, particularly at club to association level.

The CUOV serves the cricket community at large with its overall guidelines for playing conditions. The CUOV's major public face is shown with its annual cricket carnivals for Under 21 and Under 12 players. The RDCA participates in these cricket carnivals and they provide our better players with a chance to play against other top cricketers in Victoria, thereby improving the standard of cricket in this association.

The VCA Development Fund was again distributed to clubs within Victoria, and an RDCA club, Heathmont Baptists, benefited from this grant.

The union continued its lobbying for the preservation of cricketing facilities by succeeding in persuading Malvern City Council to abandon its plan to remove six cricket ovals from the area with the construction of the South Eastern Freeway extension. The union has also been actively involved in opposing the Melbourne City Council's plans to replace Royal Park with a native open landscape.

The union has also communicated with councils to ensure that football does not encroach any further into the cricket season with the increased VFL team structure. Councils were asked to reserve six months to each sport, and some have responded favourably to this appeal. The union has also written to councils seeking them to liaise earlier with clubs and associations to finalise ground allocations by 1 August each year. Again, most councils have responded favourably.

The Victorian Cricket magazine was again published this year and will be continued in 1987-88.

I have found the involvement in the CUOV to be a rewarding experience this season and am honoured to have been nominated by this association to serve on the union's executive committee.

FUTURE PLANNING OFFICER REPORT

Prime duty: To oversee completion of club survey, access information supplied, report to RDCA executive including recommendations where appropriate.

Many questions were put to club officials: past, present and future concerns. A short list of questions asked hereunder.

- Year founded — Year joined RDCA
- Teams entered — past, present, projected
- Club headquarters — Amenities — size, fencing, drainage, practice wickets etc.
- Ground control — Council — RDCA — COM schools, other — Fees (share use)
- Current club grounds — present and future.
- Type of surface — synthetic, matting etc.
- Support of women's competition
- Support for synthetic surfaces
- (Maintenance, vandalism, cleaning, costs, etc.)

There were many more questions asked. I hope clubs will appreciate their importance.

Summary of responses:

Women's competition: For 35, against 8.

Uniform policy on synthetic surface: For 34 against 9.

A majority of clubs support synthetic surfaces.

Most popular — superior grass types — Simpson test.

Question most commented on "Amalgamation".

An overwhelming response was negative mainly concentrating on club identity.

Sunday play: Not supported (excluding finals).

Earlier starting times: 50-50.

I would recommend now is the appropriate time to establish a Sunday competition. The exact nature of rules etc should be open for discussion but there is a definite need for pursuing this aim.

Finally I would like to thank all clubs for their assistance in responding to the survey and hope the RDCA will prosper even further because of it.

INVESTIGATION/TRIBUNAL CONVENOR'S REPORT

Two meetings of the Investigation Committee and two Tribunal hearings were convened to deal with reports received by the executive committee during the season.

The first matter dealt with by the Investigation Committee concerned charges of threatening behaviour and misconduct arising from a B2 Grade match in Round 4. The Investigation Committee subsequently imposed a suspended penalty of disqualification for the remainder of the season on one player and also disqualified that player from any captaincy position.

The second Investigation Committee meeting considered charges of player misconduct and an affray arising from a Chandler 4 match in Round 7. The Investigation Committee subsequently suspended two players for the remainder of the season and made a recommendation to the executive committee that no points be awarded in respect of the match.

The first Tribunal hearing involved two charges of offensive behaviour and one of striking laid by the official umpire of an A1 match in Round 10. The tribunal found that the charges of offensive behaviour could not be sustained. The striking charge was found proved and the player concerned was suspended for four matches.

The second Tribunal hearing involved charges of swearing, offensive behaviour and disputing decisions laid against a player by the official umpire of a Chandler 2 match in Round 11. The tribunal found the charges to be proven and imposed a penalty of suspension for one match on the player concerned.

Although not always required by the Rules it has been the policy of the executive to ensure that charges are dealt with by the Investigation Committee or Tribunal before the commencement of the next round of matches in fairness to all parties concerned and having regard to the implications of possible suspensions or disqualifications. This often necessitates committee and tribunal members making themselves available at very short notice and appreciation is recorded for the time and effort contributed by members during the season.

Appreciation is also recorded for the co-operation of the management of the Badminton Centre at the Kilsyth Indoor Sports Complex which was used as the venue for Investigation Committee and Tribunal meetings.

MATCH COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

This season was disappointing for the RDCA seniors and Under 21 sides. There was a general lack of commitment at club level to the representative sides which made it difficult for the Selection Committee to field the Association's strongest sides.

SENIOR ELEVEN

The Seniors won their match against the Croydon Sub-District side in the battle for the local ashes. It is a pleasure to see them return to the RDCA after a couple of years. Next season the challenge is to retain them. The Seniors played two other games for the season. The annual match against the Ferntree Gully Association was lost with the opposition scoring over 300 runs in 50 overs. The RDCA players battled to chase the total, but despite an excellent effort, it proved too large. Bayswater Cricket Club again provided excellent facilities for the match.

The last game was played against the Essendon Broadmeadows and North Suburban Cricket Association on matting. The game was won by the opposition but the game was played in great spirit.

UNDER 21 ELEVEN

The Under 21 side competed in the CUOV carnival again this season under the captaincy of Peter Young (Norwood). Unfortunately, the RDCA lost its first game against Dandenong and despite winning the following two against Northern Suburbs and Sunshine, it was not enough to make the finals. It should be noted that the final had to be abandoned due to inclement weather and no result was declared.

On a lighter note, two RDCA Cricketers, Chris Baxter and Jamie Arbuckle (Croydon North), were selected to play for Victoria in the Under 21 State Representative side. They were both selected, based on their excellent performances for Victoria, to represent Australia.

The annual game against Ferntree Gully was played at East Ringwood and although the match was won by the RDCA, the result has been declared void due to the RDCA playing an ineligible player.

I would like to thank all of those players who represented the RDCA this season and thank them for their efforts and commitment they gave in attending training sessions and matches.

I would also like to thank Denis Dunn for all his efforts in co-ordinating the Senior sides this season. Without his efforts, the job would have been even more difficult.

Finally, I would like to appeal to all clubs to provide their best players with an opportunity to represent this association and allow them to benefit by competing against other 'top' players in Victoria. This will enable the RDCA to field stronger teams and show that we are not only the largest association in Victoria, but also the best.

JUNIOR REGISTRATION AND RECORDS SECRETARIES REPORT

Season 1986-87 saw the junior section of the RDCA maintain its high standard of junior cricket. Not only has the standard been maintained, but the size of the competition has been maintained. Obviously with a large body to administer the workload placed on the committee of the junior executive is proportionate. However this work can be reduced by careful planning and administration by all participating clubs, particularly junior administrators and team managers.

The three major areas of concern each year are:

1. Final team nominations, this is usually not settled until RD 3. Careful planning by clubs may alleviate this problem.
2. Unregistered or ineligible players. This leads to either fines or loss of points to the clubs concerned. Close liaison between team managers and junior administrators will reduce this problem.
3. Match result sheets. Errors that occur in this area are misspelt players names, team codes and grades incorrect and players performances omitted. These errors lead to fines that could be reduced by careful administration by team managers.

The season past saw 40 clubs field a total of 161 competition teams and 19 non-competitive teams and provide cricket for approximately 3500 junior cricketers. Clearances applications totalled 91 this by far the lowest number for many seasons.

Unfortunately there will always be problems with unregistered and ineligible players, the result being loss of points or fines. In season 86-87 there were 34 unregistered players and four overage players. This resulted in 10 teams losing hard earned points, whilst the remainder received fines.

Apart from the problems mentioned, the clubs which form the RDCA must be thanked for providing cricket of a high standard for many junior cricketers.
