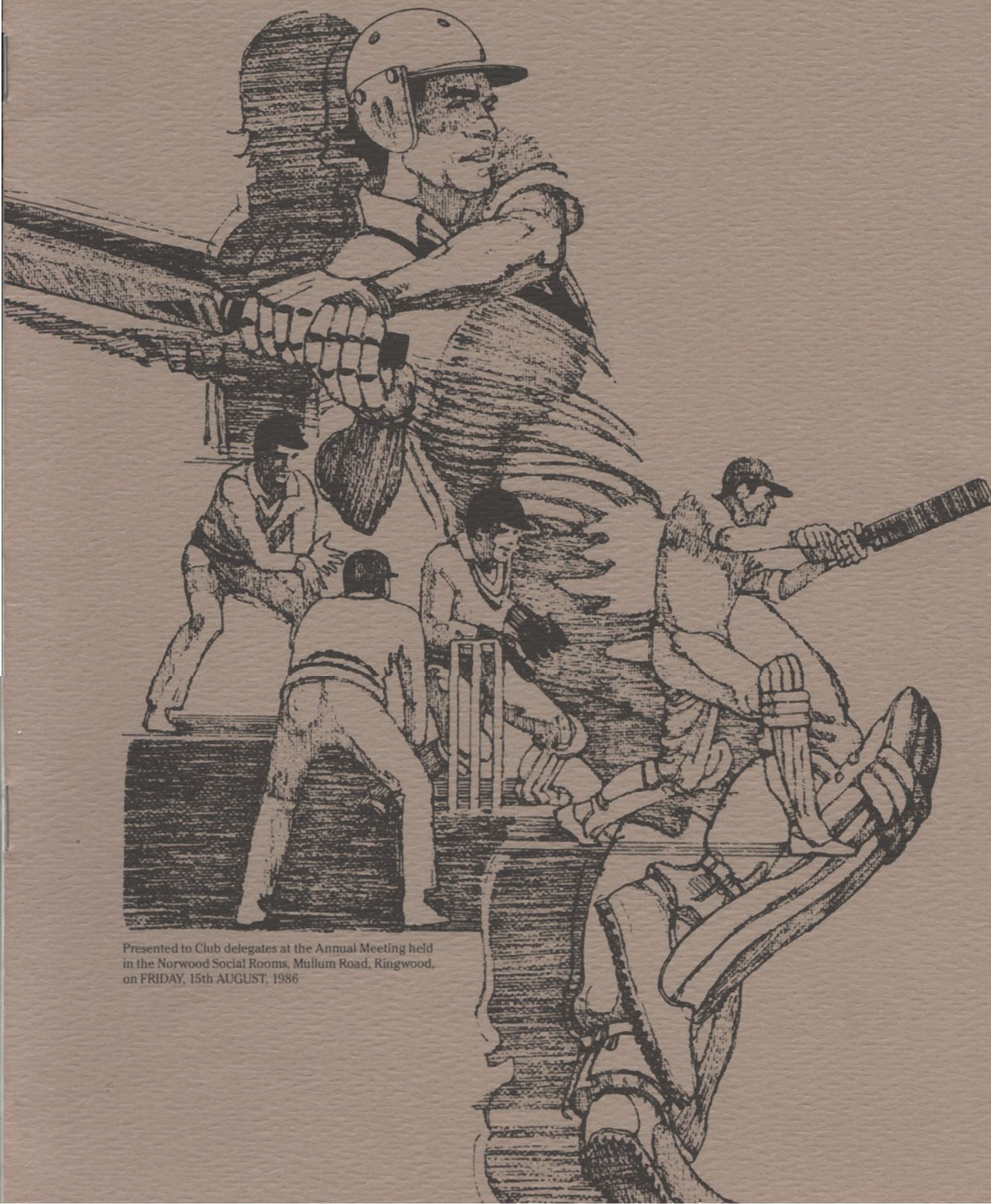

SECRETARY'S REPORT

One rule which was changed was to the amendment for the final series and this was one which should give all competing clubs a better chance of obtaining a result in these games.

Immediately after the conclusion of the 1985/86 season we were all shocked to learn of Bill Dean's illness but it takes more than a heart attack to keep a good man down and it is most pleasing to report that, at the time of writing, Bill was almost back to 100% and ready to continue serving the Association.

1985-86 UMPIRES' REPORT

You really are getting better at it chaps, more cricketers than ever enjoying their Saturday afternoons, it was good to see and hear about.

We had numerous cases of Captains praising the opposition for their sportsmanship, a team playing on the 3rd day to allow a young cricketer an opportunity to make his maiden century even though their cause was hopeless, and an Umpire donating and presenting a trophy for the best performance in a final. All good P.R., all good for the Association.

However, as always, there is a number of people (small in our Association we are glad to say) who don't do the right thing. They annoy Umpires and other players and then should not be surprised when sentenced after the incidents are investigated. Not only Professional Umpires can report players, players acting as Umpires are obliged to as well. One such case this season, which was officially reported by a player/umpire, was investigated by the Executive of the offending Club and the player severely dealt with.

Some Umpires were available to officiate at senior Inter-association games, Under 21 Inter-association games, Christmas Carnival Under 14 and 12 games, inter school games and Club practice or fund raising games. In all cases they were delighted to be of assistance.

Team Captains' greetings to particular Umpires before a match, sometimes cause quiet amusement. For example, they say "Gee what did we do wrong last match?", or "What is the LBW rule this year?". I wonder why they don't say "Good afternoon". Some Captains don't ever send in reports on Umpires, reports that are necessary for future appointments. At \$3 each time, it provides revenue but doesn't help me one bit. If an umpire is not appointed to their future games, whose face would be red?

There were twenty eight Umpires on the panel during the season, three new ones recruited but five left, two moved from the area, one played cricket and one was not prepared to umpire on Sundays. To the stayers, thanks for your help, co-operation and attendance at meetings.

We will all miss one of our most experienced Umpires next season, a person who was a friend to all and helped them enjoy their cricket, always willing to a change or accept extra appointments and assisted in umpire training. Thank you Arthur Thurston.

Ron Ellis and Stuart Newey were honoured with Life Membership of the RDCA Umpires' Association, each after 14 years of excellent service. Ken Dunham was similarly honoured but for slightly longer service.

SENIOR REGISTRATION SECRETARY'S REPORT

1985-86 season was again, in my opinion, a most successful one. By and large clubs were most co-operative and I hope they found me the same way. Unfortunately, there are always one or two "bad apples" that spoil it for the rest. As far as my responsibilities were concerned these "bad apples" caused the ladders which we produced match after match to be of doubtful value because of inaccurate or lack of information.

As mentioned at the rules night the Executive have decided to take stronger action next season and points will be deducted where clubs persist in not providing timely information.

The Executive are also asking that we revert to the original procedure of completing the match result sheet with full details of performances in order that results can be monitored by the computer. Last season 10 clubs challenged the results. Each one was successful although it did cost them \$10.00 each as their club had created the problem which, due to the procedures used to complete the forms, could not be checked. Incidentally, if four of these challengers had not been mounted, the teams would not have played in the final series.

A few facts regarding the season

6,463 registered players

43 registered senior teams

171 clearances/permits processed and from memory only three sittings of the permit appeals committee which to my mind means that clubs try to sort out their own problems as recommended by the committee.

Again, let me on behalf of all the club delegates say thank you to my wife and family, without whose help and support the satisfactory handling of this job would not be possible.

JUNIOR SECRETARY'S REPORT

Although I've been associated with teams in the RIDCA Junior Competition for some years, it's only over the last 12 months that I've gained a proper appreciation of the size of the competition and the numbers of people involved in it.

The statistics for season 85/86 are mind boggling: over 3000 registered junior cricketers, over 180 competing teams, nearly 1000 games of cricket played, etc. But it's seeing juniors out playing cricket on virtually every available venue, Saturday morning after Saturday morning right through the season, that is the real story. While we value our successes in Inter-Association matches, our real strength lies in the large numbers of junior cricketers we're able to attract to the game of cricket, by virtue of the range of age and skill levels we cater for, and the environment in which the matches are played.

Of course this doesn't just happen; it's the result of a considerable amount of administrative effort on the part of many people. We're fortunate to have so many dedicated people to serve on the Executive, as Club Junior Administrators, Junior Coaches and Team Managers or to assist in many other capacities. However, my observations as Junior Secretary during the last season lead me to suggest that, despite the number of people already involved, there's room for plenty more to either lighten the load some individuals currently have or to provide additional coaching for the huge numbers of junior cricketers registered with us. We should not be afraid to approach people for assistance, my own experience tells me there are people who'd like to help but who don't want to make the first move.

I recall Peter Liepins wishing me lots of luck when handing over the job of Secretary to me. As I look back over the year I have to say that it's not luck but, rather, the excellent co-operation received at all times from my colleagues on the Executive and the individual Junior Administrators that's the key. My thanks to you all.

Whether it be me or somebody else for 1986/87 I'm sure the same level of co-operation will be forthcoming and this time next year the reports will be of another great season of junior cricket.

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA — DELEGATES REPORT

Twenty three Associations are affiliated with the CUOV. Changes from last year being the amalgamation of Essendon Broadmeadows Churches with North Suburban — and the inclusion of the Victorian Womens Cricket Association and Eltham North Riding Cricket Association. The VWC.A. has taken particular interest in the Junior Girls competition organised by the R.D.C.A., and Helen Armitage, who is the Development Officer and also delegate to the CUOV, requested an invitation to our Junior Presentation night, when she presented the "Most Improved" trophies to the winners in the girls competition. The VWC.A. has also forwarded a donation towards the continuance and development of the girls competition.

Although the CUOV became an incorporated body in January 1984, the final adoption of Corporate Rules, Regulations and By-Laws took place in March 1986. One amendment is that two delegates be nominated from each affiliated Association, and David Thompson has volunteered his services as the extra delegate. Changes have been made to the clearance rule for Inter-Association clearances. The rule now reads as follows: — A player having played with a Club of an Association affiliated with the Union during the current season, shall before playing with another Club in another Association affiliated with the Union, first obtain a written clearance from the Club he wishes to leave, who shall forward a copy of such clearance to the Association he wishes to leave.

In the event of the clearance not being granted by the Club within fourteen days, the player may appeal to his Association for the clearance. Following an Association decision he shall have the right to appeal to the Executive Committee of the Union or its Sub-Committee who shall request his appearance and one member of his Club and its Association at a hearing before them.

The decision of the Committee shall then be conveyed to the player and shall be final.

The Inter-Association Under 12 competition for the Keith Mitchell trophy was again keenly contested and this year won by the East Suburban Churches and District team, who defeated the Ringwood and District team in the final. The members of the R.D.C.A. team are to be congratulated on the way they played the game and conducted themselves.

The "Victorian Cricket" magazine was published for the first time this year, with many interesting articles and news from all the Associations. The publisher, Robert White, well known in the R.D.C.A. is to be congratulated on this excellent magazine.

Four players who toured South Africa were suspended by the V.C.A. until the end of the 1986/87 season. This suspension extends to all Associations affiliated to the CUOV. The players are R. McCurdy, A. Hogg, M. Taylor and G. Yallop. The CUOV is constantly making representations to various Town Planning Councils and the Road Construction Authority in an effort to avoid the loss of any cricket grounds.

INDOOR CRICKET CENTRE REPORT

The game of Indoor Cricket has continued to grow over the past twelve months and the Kilsyth centre has shared in that growth. The most significant thing about the game is the number of schools who are participating and in many instances, official competitions are now being conducted. This, of course, augurs well for the future of the game.

Further improvements were made to the surface during the year and the whole area is now covered with super-grass. In addition new nets were installed earlier this year which has helped to make the conditions better for all players. The new nets were installed following some vandalism at the centre. As a result of the vandalism together with problems relating to the laying of the new surface, income during the third season was reduced by some \$10,000 on our budgeted figure. In addition the new netting was a cost to the centre of \$3,000 (difference between insurance on repairs and new nets) which has not been allowed for in our 1986/87 budget.

Discussions continued with the Shire of Lillydale regarding a new lease and also on repayment of the outstanding debt. It is pleasing to report that the rental for the centre was reduced from \$30,000 to \$20,000 per year as from 1 January, 1986. In relation to the outstanding debt the Shire would not make any reduction but agreed that the outstanding amount could be paid off at the rate of \$1,000 per month also commencing on 1 January, 1986.

Discussions also continued with the Shire on extensions to the centre but, as indicated in last year's report, it will be some time before any works will be undertaken.

Most pleasing aspect of the centre is the number of under-age players and consideration is being given to the establishment of further junior competitions on Saturday. As with any sport, the future of indoor cricket is based on the continued participation of juniors and while the junior and schools competitions are subsidised by the centre, a loss of some profit at this time will pay dividends in the future.

SOCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The most pleasing aspect of the 1985/86 season was the continued sponsorship provided by County Sports. Through that company's sales manager, Mr. Cedric Mason, substantial amounts of equipment were provided for team and individual trophies. In addition County Sports provided the Shield for the Junior Carnival. There is no doubt that the problems facing the major sporting bodies regarding the financial outlay required are slowly but surely moving into the junior sporting arenas and some form of sponsorship is required to help defray the costs. County's sponsorship of our Association is highly regarded by both participants and officials.

On the social side both the vote counting and presentation nights were outstanding successes. The Association was most appreciative of Max Walker coming to the rescue on the former night when Dean James was unavailable due to his being called away on State cricket duties. Bill Dean's illness cast a shadow on the Presentation Night but Bill Wilkins stepped in and chaired the function and we were all delighted to hear that Bill Dean was able to be present per medium of Ken Dunham's video camera.

My thanks to all club officials for their co-operation regarding the social events and for the efficient manner in which cricket balls were collected from my home.

I wish all clubs a happy season in 1986/87.

INVESTIGATION/TRIBUNAL CONVENOR'S REPORT

Three meetings of the Investigation Committee and two Tribunal hearings were convened to deal with reports received by the Executive Committee during the season.

The first matter dealt with by the Investigation Committee concerned charges of assault and player misconduct arising from a C Grade match in Round 4. The Investigation Committee subsequently suspended one player until such time as he firstly presents himself before the Committee of his Club and secondly before an Investigation Committee of the Association.

The second Investigation Committee meeting considered charges of player misconduct and an act of deliberate spitting arising from a Chandler 1 match in Round 6. The Investigation Committee subsequently suspended one player for two matches for improper behaviour in that he used indecent language towards an opposing player in the presence of others, including women and children. The charge of deliberate spitting was not sustained.

The third matter dealt with by the Investigation Committee involved a charge of assault and reports of alcohol consumption during hours of play arising from a D Grade match in Round 6. One player was subsequently suspended until such time as he presents himself before an Investigation Committee of the Association and one of the Clubs involved was placed on a \$100 bond of guarantee against player misconduct for the remainder of the season. The Club was also directed to convene a meeting of all players to ensure their awareness of the Rules of the Association, particularly in respect of alcohol consumption during hours of play.

The first Tribunal hearing involved charges of misconduct, failure to control players, abusive language and intimidation laid against a team Captain by the Official Umpire of an A1 match in Round 10. The Tribunal found that the charges could not be sustained.

The second Tribunal hearing involved charges of swearing, offensive behaviour, misconduct, disputing decisions and intimidation laid against a player by the Official Umpire of an A1 match in Round 12. The Tribunal found the charges to be proven and imposed a penalty of suspension for two matches on the player concerned.

Although not always required by the Rules it has been the policy of the Executive to ensure the charges are dealt with by the Investigation Committee or Tribunal before the commencement of the next round of matches in fairness to all parties concerned and having regard to the implications of possible suspensions or disqualifications. This often necessitates Committee and Tribunal Members making themselves available at very short notice and appreciation is recorded for the time and effort contributed by Members during the season.

Appreciation is also recorded for the co-operation of the management of the Badminton Centre at the Kilsyth Indoor Sports Complex which was used as the venue for Investigation Committee and Tribunal meetings.

MATCH COMMITTEE REPORT 1985/1986

The main highlight of the 1985/1986 season was the repeat performance of last season with the Senior Eleven's well disciplined win over Ferntree Gully District's Seniors.

Unfortunately Croydon Cricket Club's Centenary Eleven were too strong for the RDCA in the Local Ashes Match celebrating Croydon Cricket Club's Centenary Year.

The RDCA Under 21 Eleven had several convincing wins on their way to the CUOW semi final, where they were overwhelmingly outplayed by Eastern Suburbs — a team boasting several State representatives. In the other two matches against Ringwood IV's and Ferntree Gully, a general lack of commitment, support and genuine dedication from several parties contributed largely to the poor showing of the RDCA Eleven in these matches.

SENIOR ELEVEN

The RDCA Representative Senior Eleven competed in two matches — winning one and losing to Croydon Cricket Club. In the game against Ferntree Gully District RDCA, after being sent in, compiled 8/221 in the allotted 49 overs. Newcomers to the side, G. Painter and D. Klepak top scored with 15 and 41 Not Out respectively. Gully were immediately in trouble losing their two openers with only one run on the board. A middle order revival enabled Gully to recover, however, Robin King's four quick wickets for 24 had them bundled out for 188 after 44 overs.

In the Centenary Match against Croydon Cricket Club, Croydon celebrated their 100 years of cricket with a good win in an evenly fought match at the Croydon Oval.

UNDER 21 ELEVEN

In the CUOW Carnival, the Under 21's started their campaign with a good win over Eastern Suburban Churches. Andrew Freeman 41 and David Klepak 56 Not Out were the star performers in RDCA's 6/184. Churches could only manage 144 in reply with Chris Baxter 3/16 the chief destroyer, and Ken Trollope's somewhat expensive 3/39. The second CUOW match against the City of Moorabbin Cricket Association at the Albert Grounds was a keenly fought game with the pendulum swinging both ways throughout the day. RDCA batted first and compiled 9/190 with Mat Cunningham the major contributor with 13. In reply Moorabbin looked good at 2/101 but the light attack and excellent bowling of the RDCA team kept the run rate down and Moorabbin failed by 13 runs, reaching 8/167 when the overs run out. R. Armstrong, R. Ellsdon and G. Purcell were the chief wicket takers for RDCA.

In the third CUOW Match, RDCA Under 21's annihilated Oakleigh District by 113 runs. Oakleigh managed only 129 and this proved to be no match for the swashbuckling bats of Mooroolbark team mates Richard Ellsdon — 89 Run Out, and David Klepak — 56 Not Out, enabling the RDCA to reach 9/212.

The boot, however, was on the other foot when the RDCA Under 21's fronted for the semi-final against Eastern Suburbs. After being sent in to bat, the openers made a reasonable start but then the wheels fell off and only Geoff Purcell, 25, managed to score more than 20 in a paltry total of 127 from 38 overs. Eastern suburbs replied with 2/129 off only 27 overs and only one wicket falling to a bowler — Mat Cunningham.

In the annual match against Ringwood Fourth's, RDCA were soundly defeated, largely because of their own attitude rather than the ability of the opposition. A very lack lustre batting performance saw the RDCA reach only 8/106 — a target also poorly defended by the RDCA enabling Ringwood to easily win the match for the loss of only one wicket.

In the final match of the season against Ferntree Gully District, several key RDCA members opted for either fishing or club financial social attractions rather than RDCA representation — resulting in an extremely modified team playing one short. Ferntree Gully compiled a rapid scoring 6/290 after 48 pretty mediocre overs from the RDCA side. However, the game was kept alive with RDCA getting off to a great start with Neil Plumridge and Richard Ellsdon putting on 78 off only 12 overs. The continual chase for quick runs led to some very undisciplined batting and the RDCA were all out for 197 in the 35th over — giving Ferntree Gully their third successive win in the Under 21's.
