Remembering a couple of monumental blunders by yours truly at the beginning of the season as the only problems affecting the duties of R.D.C.A. General Secretary, all I can say is "serve myself right" and thank you to the 39 Club Secretaries with whom I have most contact and who made my job so much easier this past season.

Still searching for that elusive theme I feel I must state my views on the direction that competitive cricket is taking in the R.D.C.A.

It cannot be denied that our game is becoming more professional in attitude as each year passes and the influx of more and more players with District, State and/or International experience can only improve the standard of cricket within the Association — something we are all endeavouring to do.

However, according to R.D.C.A. Rules, professionalism, in terms of monetary gains, must be confined to one player per Club, although in terms of attitude alone, the more the merrier.

That there may be some Clubs flaunting this particular rule concerns me. A number of unsolicited (and, need I say, unsubstantiated) reports have indicated that monetary rewards are available for selected cricketers to transfer to some Clubs.

What are we, as administrators, expected to do in such circumstances? Of course we must administer in accordance with the rules as decided upon by Club delegates, but as we can obtain no proof we are unable to take action: — Look out if we do.

Perhaps it is up to Club Administrators to provide alternative ways of attracting the required standard of cricketer to their Club by providing the leadership, facilities and environment in which all present and prospective Club members can become happily involved.

In closing I must thank my fellow Executive members for their assistance in a season which saw them more involved in matters which were previously loaded on to me — no wonder I had less hassles.

Thanks also to my wife, Ann for her continued support.

UMPIRE'S REPORT

The Umpiring panel this year was reduced in numbers by a total of 13 and we only gained 4. Ill-health, relocation of work, change of occupation and umpiring in senior cricket were the main reasons for so few umpires. On occasions we only had enough umpires for the Chandler 1, A1 and B1 grades, in other words only in grades where the Umpires had to allot "Fairest and Best" votes.

We will have to recruit for next year and the first place to start is in the Clubs of this Association, where loyalty to the aims of the R.D.C.A. are strongest. So I appeal to all Secretaries to help us generate interest in umpiring by "OLD" players or keen types who have the interest in Cricket rather than the dollar. A training course will be conducted for those who require management skills in cricket umpiring and rule interpretations. It appalls me when I ask ex-players to try and help us out by umpiring, when they say "Do you really expect me to stand out there all day and put up with abuse and criticism from the players?" That is a disappointing attitude but it probably derives from grades where there aren't umpires. B grade was an illustration this year, the teams weren't used to playing under umpires and needed coaxing initially. On the other side of the slate is the case of the bowler who when playing in this association, consistently asked for LBW decisions and when he volunteered to umpire this year said: "Now I know why I didn't get a lot of those decisions".

Even so, the umpires were a loyal group, attending regular meetings consistently and on the field helping to keep the R.D.C.A. standard high and it must be high, as more clubs are applying to enter from other Associations. It has been an enjoyable year from their point of view, which probably helped the players enjoy their game more too.

A sad end to this report is to inform you that Alan Bonnett resigned as Umpire's President and as an umpire at our last meeting. Alan, who is a Life Member, has excelled in both categories and his services will be missed by us all especially me, because he always accepted each allotted game as a challenge even though I knew some of them wouldn't be easy. Thanks Alan for all those years of cricket goodwill you have given to this Association.

PINKS RESERVE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT REPORT

INDOOR CENTRE

Although the overall patronage of the Centre has increased in the last 12 months, the revenue from the practice period was somewhat disappointing.

This was probably the major factor in the Centre not reaching breakeven point. This factor, together with the increase in rental from \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year, contributed to a loss for the year anticipated to be in the region of \$7,000.

As the loss last year was about \$12,000, this means we have improved our revenue by about \$10,000.

Recently a coaching clinic has commenced at the Centre, staffed by V.C.A. qualified coaches led by George Tribe, ex-Victorian and Northamptonshire player. About 30 boys are being coached presently and it is hoped that this enterprise will flourish.

On the physical side, the lighting has been improved and is now excellent. Also, part of the rain damaged carpet has now been replaced under insurance.

OUTDOOR GROUNDS

Some variable performance occurred on the Pinks turf wicket this year mainly due to insufficient preparation by ground staff. Even so, the performance of the wicket was better than quite a number of turf wickets I have visited in the inner suburbs.

I have heard criticism along the lines that we ought to forget about the turf wicket and put in a synthetic. In my younger days when I was learning my cricket on country turf wickets with cracks the width of my little finger, I would have given my eye-teeth to bat on a wicket as good as the worst Pinks wicket of last season.

I think the problem that a lot of batsmen have with Pinks is psychological. It is interesting to note that those teams who have predominantly front foot players do reasonably well at Pinks.

Why should we give away using the turf wicket because some batsmen cannot adjust their technique and expect to get the always even bounce of the synthetic?

The ground has been pegged to site a boundary fence. Construction would assist in preventing damage to the oval by ponies, trail bikes, etc.

Also from Ringwood Council Mr. Frank Corr and wife and Cr Alan Smith and wife from Lillydale Shire and Mr. Doug Chandler and wife representing the Chandler family. It was also very pleasing to see representatives from the Sun Easterly in attendance.

Highlights of the evening were Warrandyte Cricket Club first Chandler Shield flag, and it was very appropriate too, to see Stan Davis who also won Chandler Shield Bowling receive the flag in which was his last season. WELL DONE STAN.

CHAIRMAN OF SELECTORS' REPORT

The selectors are pleased to report that the R.D.C.A. was represented by teams during the past season who played the game of cricket in the best of traditions that are synonymous with the "greatest ball game played".

Success in terms of matches won fell short of what we had hoped for, unfortunately we must report that the Ferntree Gully Association again emerged victorious over the R.D.C.A. Senior Eleven. After a good start the R.D.C.A. failed to make a reasonable total of runs sufficient to topple the home team.

The Under 21 team performed well only losing two matches in their six match program, the losses being to Ringwood 4th Eleven and the semi final of the C.U.O.V. Under 21 competition.

Notable performances for the R.D.C.A. were given by Ray Gale, Tim Discombe and John Hale for the Senior Eleven whilst the top performers in an under 21 team were Lindsay Wulf, Mark McGregor, John Schluter and Brett Kline.

The selectors are deeply concerned by the attitude of players and clubs towards representation in Association teams. The comments are often heard after selection has been made of "Why is this or that player in the team?" or alternatively "They could have selected a better side than that".

Facts are, clubs do not nominate their players for selection, the selectors can only select from the nominees submitted therefore the critics have no grounds for their remarks.

The nomination system as practised at the present time fails not because the system is bad but rather because the associations clubs do not support the system which they over the years have made a part of each seasons match schedule.

With this thought in mind the Selectors are proposing that provided the Association's clubs wish to play inter-association matches, that the nomination system be replaced with a system which enables the Selectors to select squads of players by invitation. Clubs would also be expected to assist with nominations should they feel that there are players who have missed the Selector's eye.

Such a system represents a radical departure from the past. As we believe your Association is worthy of being represented by the best possible teams, we believe the break from our traditional methods would be justified.

The season past, though not a vintage year, was certainly a good one for the Association. The players selected served the Association well and fully deserved their opportunity to wear the R.D.C.A. cap.

1982-83 will again present the opportunity and challenge to the Association and its players to show that it has the ability to be the top both in administration and on the field.

UNDER 21 REPORT

The R.D.C.A. is fortunate in so far that a great wealth of talent exists in the ranks of our Under 21 players, from performances given by representatives in the Association's representative team for season 1981-82 it would appear that the future of the association and its clubs is assured.

The R.D.C.A. was again represented in the C.U.O.V. Inter Association Carnival, and reached the semi-final of the competition before having to lower its colours.

Success was achieved in both of the teams Inter Association matches against Northern Suburban and Ferntree Gully Associations, both were exciting affairs, with victory going to the R.D.C.A. through consistency rather than brilliance.

The 1981-82 team provided the opportunity for a number of young players to gain experience on turf wickets and to test their skills against the best Under 21 players from other Associations. Notable performances for the R.D.C.A. were given by Lindsay Wulf and Brett Kune with the bat and Mark McGregor and the Anderson Brothers with the ball. Michael Dunn and John Schluter also contributed to an excellent overall team effort.

The Association extends its thanks to John Kirby for work as Manager and Coach. No doubt John's advice to the players will help their game improve in the future. Thanks are also due to Mrs. Shirley McGregor who undertook the Scorer's task and especially to the East Ringwood Cricket Club who were hosts for the team's home games.

Congratulations are due to all players who were selected and for their enthusiastic approach to the matches. Season 1982-83 will again provide the opportunity for Under 21 players to represent this Association. It is hoped that new batting and bowling stars will emerge to present the R.D.C.A.

THE SELECTION COMMITTEE

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA DELEGATE'S REPORT

The Union has continued its programme of examining all aspects of cricket.

Standard rules have been developed for Under 12 competitions and are being circulated to member Associations. These rules are designed to enable Under 12 cricketers to develop the basic skills of the game and ensure maximum participation by each player.

The rules are not compulsory for Associations, but are suggestions as to how Associations can best develop their Under 12 players.

This year the Victorian Cricket Association established a Cricket Development Fund. The V.C.A. has invited the Union and the Victorian Country Cricket League to participate in this programme.

\$20,000 has been paid into the Fund by the V.C.A. and invested. The interest will be used to develop cricket.

The V.C.A. expects to add a further \$20,000 to the capital of the Fund shortly.

The Union has made recommendations to the V.C.A. on the use of these funds, but the result of those recommendations are not yet known.

Despite several invitations by your delegate for clubs in the R.D.C.A. to participate in the scheme, not one application was received from an R.D.C.A. club. Are you all so prosperous that you do not need any grants?

The Union has also been quick during the year to defend cricket's right to use recreation grounds for 6 months of the year against the persistent attack of football interests.

The V.C.A. also invited the Union to participate in its Synthetic Wickets Committee. This Committee is examining the subject on three bases:-

- (a) Establishing and documenting the performance of existing synthetic materials.
- (b) Examining whether concrete wickets are the best bases for synthetic wickets.
- (c) Whether synthetic wickets can be designed with turf characteristics.

In the case of (c), two attempts have been made in England and Steve Pascoe, R.D.C.A. Secretary, has been commissioned by the Committee to report on these while on his overseas tour.

I should also report that your delegate has been elected Chairman of the C.U.O.V. Executive for the current year. This is a distinct honour for the R.D.C.A.

INVESTIGATION/ TRIBUNAL CONVENOR'S REPORT

Season 1981-82 saw three Investigation Committee meetings convened, of which only one had to consider a charge laid against a player.

This charge concerned a complaint of bad language and assault laid by Ringwood R.S.L. C Grade against an Ainslie Park player. The Committee found there was no intent of assault and the player was found not guilty on that part of the charge, but found guilty of swearing on his own admission. A penalty of a one match suspended sentence was imposed for Season 1981-82.

A protest laid and points claimed by Ainslie Park A Grade against Ringwood Footballers for using poor quality matting and changing one mat was heard and dismissed by the Committee. It was dismissed on the grounds that the evidence had not proved that the different matting had any marked effect on the result of the game. Ainslie Park appealed to the C.U.O.V. over this finding, but the appeal was dismissed.

Boronia appealed against an R.D.C.A. Junior Executive decision to let stand a forfeit by Boronia U12-5 against South Ringwood. The Committee upheld the appeal by Boronia and as a one-day game was played and won by Boronia pending the Boronia appeal, points were allocated as obtained.

No tribunal meetings were necessary to be convened.

Members of the Investigation Committees were chosen as per Association Rule 38(a). Our thanks go not only to those persons who readily agreed to sit on the Committees, but also to those who were available but not required.

REGISTRATION AND RECORDS SECRETARY'S REPORT

REGISTRATIONS

A total of 6,147 players were registered to play in our association during 1981-82 season — an increase of 707 over the previous season. These players were registered with 40 affiliated clubs who fielded 150 senior sides during the season.

Needless to say with such a large number of players to police, the use of computer facilities to do the basic recording and checking functions is invaluable. From my observations, the use of the computer appears to be gaining greater acceptance by the delegates, players, etc. By and large the problems experienced with the computer during the previous season were eliminated, however, like all good systems more "minor bugs" appeared which in turn will be corrected for the coming season.

CLEARANCES

117 clearances and/or permits were handled during the year and I am pleased to report that the permit committee met on only one occasion during the year to arbitrate on a clearance problem.

FINES

Unfortunately, fines totalling \$1473 for breach of rules, etc., were levelled. Some clubs showed a considerable improvement in their administration in that very few fines were incurred, however, many Clubs still incur unnecessary running costs by way of fines because they do not ensure that they operate within the rules.

JUNIOR SECRETARY

JUNIOR REGISTRATION AND RECORDS SECRETARIES' REPORT

The 1981-82 season saw a change in the allocation of the registration and recording of the junior results in that the previous position was divided to incorporate a Registration Secretary and a Records Secretary. This was necessary to reduce the increasing workload.

Overall, this change was successful and has enabled those members of the Junior Administration more time to assist in the administering of the junior section of this Association.

1981-82 season saw a great deal of coming and going of junior sides at the commencement of the season with, we are happy to say, more comings than goings. A total of 146 teams from 38 different Clubs contested each other in the various age divisions and, we are happy to say, we ended the season with a total of 13 winners. Whilst there may be some who will say that there were no winners in our Under 12 competition, we believe we are all winners for having participated. We know we are for just having been associated with the Juniors for this past season.

Whilst we cannot accurately state the number of junior players registered in our Association (the computer does not differentiate between them and the oldies) there were approximately 3,100 which is a considerable increase over last season.

As in past years, there was a predictable movement in players from one club to another for various reasons. For 1981-82 season, 112 players sought and were granted a transfer to play with another club. We trust these players enjoyed success in their new surroundings.

On a not so pleasant note, there were 53 unregistered players, 4 over-age players and 15 ineligible players from which 11 teams lost hard earned points. This compares with a total of 48 players in the previous season, a trend we would not wish to see continue.

Most reports issued by a corporation or an individual contain the usual things, statistics, profit and loss accounts, reasons why they cannot increase the dividend distribution and the inevitable lecture on the state of the economy. This report is no exception.

We have attempted to present below a statistical report of the seasons errors as collated from the Association's Official Result Sheets lodged after completion of each game. If your Club's name is at the top of the list, we trust that it will be your intention for it to be at the bottom of the list next year.

Undoubtedly, it is the opinion of some that the computer is the cause of the large number of errors and the higher level of fines imposed as a result of these errors. To those persons we say, the computer merely highlights the errors made by those responsible for submitting the data to the computer.

The number of errors has increased over the past years as the Association grows but, where once these same errors were detected and corrected by human beings with the capacity and ability to think like human beings our computer merely has the capacity to distinguish between right and wrong.

We therefore ask that you examine and where necessary, correct, amend, or adjust your own club's system of presenting these Official Result Sheets before you criticise or blame the Association's system of collecting and collating the necessary information.

Perhaps we should all sit back and picture ourselves at the other end of the line from time to time and ask ourselves "How can I help?"
