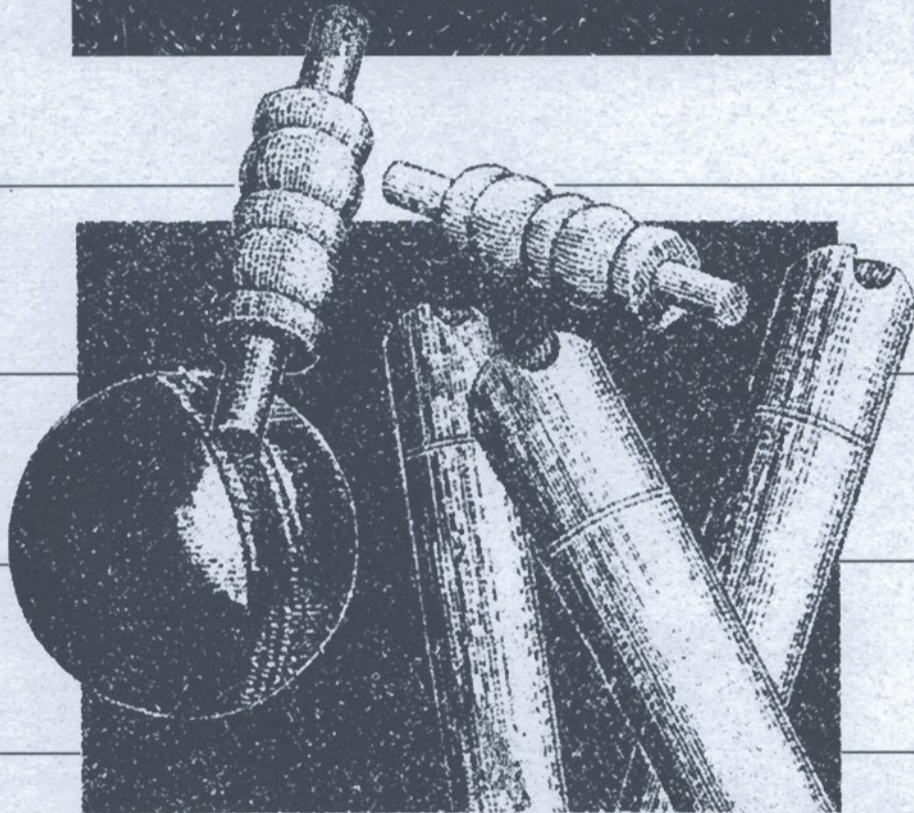

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 1993/94 season was a most interesting one, mainly due to the rather bold move of merging the B Grade of last season into a zoned A Grade competition due to peculiar circumstances which occurred after the closure of team entries.

Amongst other things the move allowed the future establishment of an A and B Grade competition for 1994/95 and further seasons based on performances in the season under review. While there were some one-sided games in the lower sections of A Grade, although this is not unusual in any season, the stronger clubs were able to reinforce their claim that the whole club deserved to have A Grade status.

My congratulations to Kilsyth and Ferntree Gully for their success in the two divisions of A Grade and to the former for their victory in the Challenge match and promotion to Chandler Shield.

Ferntree Gully were a new club to the Association and recorded excellent results with 5 senior teams competing in the final series. They have an excellent administration, great venues and will no doubt become a force in this Association in the near future.

The Chandler I competition was again very even and competitive. The crowd at the final was the largest I have seen and the game generated great excitement and as noted in this report Ainslie Park came from behind to snatch victory on the fourth day of the match.

Ainslie Park is to be congratulated as they have been one of the leading clubs for many years and their commitment brought the reward they have been seeking since moving into Chandler 10 years ago.

The Rule Book was restructured and simplified as a result of the work of an Executive sub-committee under the leadership of Steve Pascoe. The rule changes were kept to a minimum although significant changes were made to the match rules. In general the new over rates were implemented successfully although in the lower grade some difficulties were experienced.

One of the greatest strengths of our Association is the junior competition and once again, our junior officials combined well to provide a wonderful season of competitive cricket for the under-age players of this district.

Together with the Senior Executive, the Junior Administration has assisted with the establishment of a Development squad. This project is being undertaken in close association with the Ringwood Cricket Club.

The scheme aims to improve the standard of cricket in our area through close attention to our most promising young players, and will provide a path for the best of them to progress to the highest level of competitive cricket.

The Association continues to be well served by its Executive Officers. In particular our Secretary, Lindsay Trollope, aided at all times by Beverley, has worked tirelessly to overcome the many problems which arise during the year.

His dedicated team are always on the job and they have given solid support to all clubs throughout the season. I sometimes wonder how we would survive the season, if we did not have our Secretary so freely available to us.

All members of the Executive have contributed to the success of the season and, on your behalf, I

thank all of them for their interest, enthusiasm and good spirit, which is so important in making our Association an effective body which is responsive to the needs of its members.

A special word of thanks to the Pascoe family for their continued high class organisation of the telephone scores, vote count and presentation function.

Finally I congratulate all clubs upon the way you have conducted your activities this season, for I believe it has been mainly through your efforts that have resulted in the 1993/94 season being one of the most satisfying and successful in the long history of our Association.

KEN DUNHAM

You will read in various places throughout this report the expressions of gratitude and appreciation that officials of this Association have paid to Ken Dunham for the work and assistance he has provided. The report was in the process of being printed when I received the news of Ken's passing. Ken became ill, suffered a heart attack and died in the early hours of Friday 1 July.

Ken had given what seemed a lifetime to this Association and it will be the poorer for his passing. He played with North Ringwood for some 10-12 years from the mid-50's and also served that club as Secretary and President.

In 1967-68 he was elected to the RDCA Executive and was immediately appointed as a vice-president, a position he held until 1991.

In 1980 Ken was principally responsible for the introduction of computerised records for the Association and this was his main area of expertise provided to the Executive.

He also took a strong interest in the development of synthetic wickets and he and I took many trips together over the years to investigate the latest material being offered to cricket clubs.

After Ken's playing days finished he continued his involvement on Saturdays by becoming an umpire, it was not too long before he was one of the leading umpires in the RDCA. He served the Umpires Association as Secretary for many years and in 1989 he became President, a position he still held at the time of his death. He was a passionate supporter of moves to improve the standing of the umpiring fraternity and it is no coincidence that the number of umpires in the Association reached record levels under Ken's leadership.

The Association expresses its deepest sympathy to Betty, Denise, Barry and Lynne and their respective families.



GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Unlike the previous season when the floodgates opened prior to the opening date, season 1993/94 commenced in glorious sunshine and generally the weather stayed that way for the remainder of the season. As the last ball was bowled in the A grade Challenge at the Mooroolbark oval we were able to look back on one of the most successful seasons in the long and illustrious history of the RDCA, albeit that we created some spirited discussion with the decision to have two divisions in A Grade. This resulted from a decision by two clubs not to proceed with their affiliation after entries had closed for the season and original gradings established.

As it turned out the Challenge match to decide promotion to Chandler in 1994/95 produced a magnificent climax to the season. The Annual Meeting which was held on 20th August 1993 signalled the start of this history-making season. Clubs again expressed their confidence in Bill Wilkins when they chose him to preside over Association affairs for a 6th successive year.

The Association is fortunate to have a person of Bill's experience to be its spokesman. Bill has given a lifetime of service to a number of locally based organisations and his contacts throughout the area have proved on many occasions to be a bonus to the RDCA. In the long history of the Association we have not at any time lacked strong leadership. The work load to successfully administer the Association seems to be increasing each year and I thank all of my Executive colleagues for their valuable contribution in the past season.

The Neweys (Joan and Stuart) continued to look after financial and registration matters respectively. Stuart has been involved with the Administration side of the Association for some 20 years and his contribution can never be underestimated while Joan has assisted in the background until her more public work as Treasurer began 2 years ago. It seems there was not a time when the Pascoe family were not involved in some area of the Association. Steve as well as being one of the better cricketers to play in the RDCA, could have been excused if he had hung up his administrative boots after he gave up the Secretaryship late in 1985, but after only a short break from the Executive he has returned to once again play a leading role. Anne has always given Steve great support in his work, but of course she is now a member of the Executive in her own right and has been a power in the social area. Of course the third member of the family, daughter Rachel, is well known to us all as the lady on the phone each Saturday night.

Mr. Computer (Ken Dunham) is responsible for making the work load of yours truly slightly easier with information being produced from the computer at a moment's notice. Ken has been a member of the Association since the 60's and is threatening once again to say enough. Ken has always had marvellous support from Betty and it will be a sad day when they decide to end their association with the RDCA.

Neil Tull, John Woolhouse, and David Beatty are lifting the image of the representative teams in the Association and the success of the Under 21 and Under 18 can be traced to their efforts over the past season. Neil and David are heavily involved in the Eastern Cricket Academy and see the establishment of the Academy as a move which can only improve the standard of cricket in the RDCA over the next few years.

Pat Meehan serves the Association as the representative of the Umpires Association and his

experience both as a player and umpire makes him an invaluable member of the Association. Pat always put the umpires point of view strongly to the Committee and is keen to provide an environment in which players and umpires are both seeking to play cricket in a manner free from objectionable features.

Neville Bradshaw makes certain that the junior area of the Association is not neglected by the senior committee and he keeps us well informed on the progressive activities of the junior body. The high regard that the RDCA is held in relation to its under-age teams is a credit to Neville and his Committee under the firm chairmanship of John Tynan.

The authority in charge of Junior cricket in Victoria is the Cricket Union of Victoria and for the past ten years the delegate from the RDCA has been Ron Ellis. Ron has at all times put our view very strongly to the Union. As you will see from Ron's report you will see that he has decided to hand the reins over to another person. The Association owes a tremendous debt to Ron and he will be difficult to replace. Ron is also retiring from the umpires body and if everything goes as he and Connie plan, they will be moving back to New South Wales to spend some years with the rest of the family. We thank Ron and Connie for their years of service to the RDCA.

Only 3 hearings were required to be convened for adjudication by the Tribunal in cases involving 4 players. Three players were suspended for varying periods while a charge against a fourth was not sustained.

After suffering the disappointment of losing successive Chandler 1 finals, Ainslie Park were able to celebrate when they took out the Premier pennant of the Association. There was also cause for celebrations at Kilsyth and Ferntree Gully as they took out the East and West A Grade flags respectively. Kilsyth's celebrations continued following their elevation to the Chandler grade in 1994/95.

All the details of the finals are in the Finals Round-up section of this book. Details of the representative games are shown elsewhere. As I said at the Presentation Function the games will take on more importance in the coming seasons and look forward to having the Maddocks Shield returned to us next season. The creation of the All-Stars teams attracted great interest and all players will be striving to make this elite group in 1994/95.

Ken Johnston and Brian Gobbi must be congratulated for their work with the ever-growing Veteran's competition. Brian's report illustrates the impact that the group has made in just a few years.

The Vote Count and Presentation Function were again held at the York on Lilydale and were most successful.

No RDCA report would be complete without a reference to our patron and former President, Mr. Bill Dean OAM who continues to provide great support to the Association in many areas. He has taken a particular interest in veteran's competition and is also a welcome visitor to games each Saturday afternoon.

I express my grateful thanks to the Secretaries and other officials of all clubs for their co-operation, patience and support throughout the whole season. I thank Beverley for her assistance to me in the conduct of the Association's affairs. Season 1993/94 is now part of the history book and we eagerly await the opening of the 1994/95 season.

UMPIRES ASSOCIATION - SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Umpires Association is continuing to grow. 15 new umpires joined us and 2 returned to the fold. Unfortunately 5 decided not to continue and 5 resigned during the season. This meant that up to 50 umpires were available during the season, enabling 2 in all Chandler 1 and most A1 matches. We welcomed the following new umpires - Alan Beswick, Andrew Aumonn, Tom Smith, James Loftus, David Jacquier, Ashley Skillern, Doug Allen, Mark West, Chris Rashleigh, Brian Milson, Vic Whittle, Mark Kesters, Les Dineer, Gordon O'Rielly and Alastair Poton, while Jim Fisher and Tony McAdam-Roberts returned.

As in previous years the umpires officiated at Dowling Shield, senior and junior representative games and the IACC and Keith Mitchell carnivals. My thanks are extended to those umpires who offered their services. In addition we needed volunteer umpires for the semi-final matches and I thank those clubs who provided umpires. Unfortunately many clubs did not respond to the request from the RDCA and thus some semi-finals matches only had one umpire. This was most disappointing. I hope for a better effort next season.

The Code for Conduct for players seems to be having an impact on some clubs. However, during the course of the season and into the final series, many of our umpires reported a drop in behaviour in the senior grades, particularly in disputing decisions and sledging of opposition players. Some umpires have requested not to be appointed to certain teams. Even a withdrawal of services was canvassed.

Some umpires resigned during the season for this reason. This is an appalling situation for a large cricketing body like the RDCA. Some clubs need to look strongly at their players' attitudes towards umpires if they wish to have them officiate at their matches. Be warned - this will not be tolerated by umpires next season.

On a more pleasant note, on behalf of the umpires, may I congratulate all medal winners, trophy winners and premiers on their success this season. As in past seasons I would urge all clubs to act as recruiting officers for the Association by encouraging all retiring and ex-players to join our umpiring ranks.

I also express the umpires gratitude to the club captains, ladies and members for their hospitality, both at afternoon tea and after the game. A special thanks to all scorers, particularly the volunteers, for their dedication and assistance to umpires.

Two of our most senior umpires, Ron Ellis and John Fearnley have advised of their retirement from umpiring. I thank them for their valuable contribution to both the Association and umpiring over many years.

My thanks are extended to our President, Ken Dunham, Senior Vice-President, Peter Williams, Umpires Advisers, Stuart Newey and Ron Ellis for their assistance to me during the season. I also appreciate the continued support of the RDCA Executive.

Most importantly I thank my fellow umpires for their dedication, enthusiasm and assistance during the season, and for their attendance at our monthly meetings in such large numbers. Hopefully we will all return to umpiring in 1994/95.

CRICKET UNION OF VICTORIA DELEGATE'S REPORT

The on-going relationship and co-operation between the VCA and the CUOV has again produced benefits for all affiliated Associations. Grants totalling \$12,000 were distributed and three RDCA clubs, Vermont, Knox Gardens and South Croydon received \$1,000 each.

Training sessions for prospective umpires were conducted by the VCA and this will be repeated before the commencement of the 1994/95 season. It was good to see that the VCA reversed an earlier decision relating to umpiring of Dowling Shield matches and several of our officials were appointed to the matches.

CUOV scorebooks were again available at a most competitive price and, in the latter part of the season, a VCA publication became available at a cost of \$10. The book is a marvellous guide to assist in the administration of your club.

Mooroolbark represented the Association in the Puma Cup competition and reached the second round where they were narrowly defeated by North Melbourne.

The March meeting was held at the MCG and presentations were made to the Premier teams in the boys primary school and girls secondary college competitions respectively. Test umpire, Bill Sheahan, was the guest speaker and the audience enthusiastically participated in the question session.

The VCA appointed 4 development officers during the season to cover schools and establish clinics with co-operation from teachers, clubs and the VCA.

The close relationship which exists between the VCA, CUOV and its affiliated Associations augurs well for the future of cricket in Victoria.

I have been privileged to represent the Association for ten years, and have enjoyed the opportunity to discuss problems with other delegates and work on common solutions.

However there comes a time to step down and I thank the officials, executive and delegates to the CUOV for their friendship and co-operation throughout the years. I sincerely hope my successor obtains as much pleasure from this assignment as I have.

Our Association continues to grow and in 1993/94 we had 6549 players registered, 164 senior teams participated 142 junior teams participated

101 clearances were processed, while the Permit Committee met on two occasions and granted permits to three players.

It was disappointing to note that many clubs lost points due to their failure to meet the deadline for lodging team sheets and match reports. In addition, fines were incurred for incorrect spelling of players names and inaccurate recording of player match performance details. If little more care would be taken at club administration level it would save the club considerable costs.

VETERANS

The Veterans competition expanded to 23 teams this season, and more teams have expressed interest for next season. 390 Players competed in 1993/94. The weather was kind this season after last years difficulties and all games were completed.

One of the pleasing aspects of veterans cricket is the sportsmanship that continues to apply. It is our strongest wish that this healthy attitude displayed by our senior cricketers is not reserved for veterans games. We believe all cricketers playing in this competition have responsibility to cricket to use their experience and get the message through to all cricketers in their respective clubs that, disputing decisions, sledging and unsociable behaviour is not acceptable. It is a major reason cricket is being hurt by other sports, and hinders its growth with young people.

While results do not play a huge part in the enjoyment of our game, two new sides won premierships in their first year. In Division 3, Heathmont were successful from South Croydon and in Division 2, South Warrandyte beat Templeton in a thrilling one run win.

Division 1, saw the powerful Croydon Hockeyers compete in their fourth successive Grand Final. They recorded their third win against the Sub-District Vets Croydon. This year two of the finals were played on turf which proved a most successful format.

We had a successful veterans dinner when 170 people attended with Pat Arbuckle as M.C. His efforts plus those of Bill Dean & Ken Johnston in organising the function were greatly appreciated. Bowens Timber donated many prizes for the night.

Our thanks go to Bill Stafford in organising over 40's and over 50's inter association games against the Ferntree Gully Association. The games were played on adjacent grounds at The Basin which provided a carnival atmosphere for hundreds of spectators. RDCA won both games and our captains, Ron Blain from Norwood and Pat Arbuckle, Croydon North accepted perpetual trophies donated by Topline Sports.

In August this year Ted Griffett from Mt. Evelyn will lead a team of cricketers and their wives to Birmingham England, via Ireland for another Golden Oldies festival of cricket. This will be a trip of a lifetime for many, and they will thank Ted for his efforts. A happy journey is conveyed to all who will represent the RDCA. Max Brown Real Estate will assist the tourists.

Finally, thanks to Jeff Luscombe for his work as Reg. Sec., and on the committee.

The veterans competition can look forward to continue to form an important part in the structure of our clubs, and providing an enjoyable "safe haven" for our members and their families.

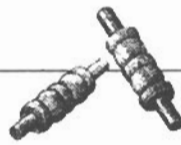

FINALS ROUND-UP

After winning a thrilling semi-final against Mooroolbark, Ainslie Park felt confident that 1993/94 was to be the year when they would take out the ultimate prize for the first time. On the other hand, Warrandyte who, at the Christmas break had firmed to hot favourites, had regained top form after a late season slump, were certain that 1993/94 was to be their year. In the 3 1/2 days that the final took to complete the final result was in doubt until the winning run was hit. Ainslie Park had returned from the depths of despair after trailing narrowly after the first innings to snatch victory from Warrandyte. The game attracted probably the largest crowd ever at a finals match and one would wonder whether any other junior cricket body could boast such a crowd which was there to see the start of the third day's play.

On a weekend which was made for a cricket final Kilsyth, with their batsmen showing top form at the right time, piled on the runs on the large but fast Mooroolbark ground to overcome a determined opponent in Ferntree Gully to win the Challenge match and thus rejoin the Chandler Shield after a 12 year break.

One weekend earlier Kilsyth and South Croydon battled each other at the Ferntree Gully ground as well as the carnival atmosphere and when the pipe drums and the clowns had gone home, Kilsyth were left with the A Grade East Premiership.

The festivities at the Mooroolbark oval were of a more sombre nature but, Ferntree Gully with their bowlers getting on top early, refused to release their hold and, despite a strong fight back late on the first day by St. Andrews, the early ascendancy enabled the Gully to run out comfortable victors and snare the A West Premiership in their first season back in the RDCA after a break of some 60 years.

Warrandyte's Chandler 2 players had put in the order for the Premiership cake after just 100 minutes of play when their bowlers ripped through Croydon North to have that team tottering on the brink of disaster at 9/39. In the greatest comeback since the return to life by Lazarus, the Northerners regrouped and when the dust had cleared had scored a convincing victory.

The Chandler 3 game, which produced the odd lively moment or two, saw both teams poised at different times of the match to take control and stake their claim for the pennant. In a game which belied its Chandler 3 status, Wantima South got up in the last stride to win by the proverbial short half-head over a gallant Lilydale.

Warrandyte's powerful batting line up was expected to make it the team to beat in the Chandler 4 final and, despite a magnificent rearguard action by Vermont, the prediction was right and Warrandyte was able to partly offset the disappointment of losing the more senior flags.

Parkwood's 5th eleven were able to bring home another pennant to fly on the flagpole at Quambee Reserve when they displayed great depth to overcome pre-match favourites Wonga Park in an entertaining Chandler 5 final.

St. Andrews were the top team to beat in Chandler 6 from early on in the season and the club's tremendous depth was quite evident when one looked at the standard of their 6th eleven. Templeton were also of a high quality and were not disgraced in a fighting effort. However, the Saints proved too strong and added to the impressive array of premiership pennants on display at the Manson Reserve rooms.

In the Eastern Division of A2, North Ringwood appeared to be in control of the game in the early part of the match but the strong Kilsyth team kept coming and in a great finish were able to outlast the Northerners.

In A3 East, Kilsyth went into the final series as one of the hottest favourites in RDCA history to take out the major prize and, although hot favourites sometimes "bite the dust", this was not one of those occasions and despite a strong performance from North Ringwood, Kilsyth made it three for the day.

North Ringwood arrived at the A4 East final confident that, by the end of the match they would be taking home the pennant. However, they found themselves opposed to a "fanatical" Croydon eleven who proved just a little too good in a high standard match.

In A5 East Ringwood always were going to be difficult to beat and, in a good standard match, the East Ringwood club scored a convincing victory over Wantima.

In the A2 West group St. Andrews and East Ringwood put on one of their classic encounters and when stumps were drawn at the end of the match East Ringwood were able to run up another premiership flag at their Mt. Dandenong Road home.

In the A3 title match which produced some moments of high tension St. Andrews were able to hold off the determined East Ringwood team to avenge the A2 defeat.

In season 1988/89 St. Andrews took out four senior premierships to create a record which most said would not be broken. Those people are still correct in that statement, but Kilsyth equalled the performance when their A4 West eleven took out the fourth pennant for the day in an upset victory over favourites Ferntree Gully.

BY THE WAY

2 members, including the captain, of the 1978/79 Australian team played in the RDCA this season. Graham Yallop (Knox Gardens) and Rodney Hogg (Warrandyte).

Nick Bole-Brown is the first player to win back-to-back Bill Dean medals and Chandler All-rounder trophies.

Winning the A grade premiership means automatic promotion to Chandler. Of the 12 winners in the period 1981/82 - 1992/93, 7 returned to A grade. Three Chandler 1 Premiers in that period have been demoted to A Grade and only one has been able to get back to the top grade.

Kilsyth A1 East premiership was the first pennant for its 1st Eleven since 1971/72 season. In 1994/95 the club will be aiming for its first Chandler pennant in 30 years.

Of the 15 teams which finished on top of the ladder at the end of the home and home games 8 went on to win the premiership. In 1992/93 it was 9/14.

Some of the finals in Chandler certainly proved the saying that catches win matches.

Ainslie Park's performance of coming from

behind on the first innings to win the Chandler 1 premiership was the first time that this had occurred since 1987/88 when Croydon North did the feat against Mooroolbark to deny that club its third successive premiership.

The gap in premiership points between the top and bottom increased in Chandler this season. In 1992/93 the difference was 63.1 while this had stretched out to 86.5 in the season under review.

One of our comparative recently formed clubs in Templeton achieved the great result of having all six senior teams play in the finals.

In A Grade 3 East, Kilsyth's average of 15.1 points per match and a final tally of 151 for a 10 round season would be an Association record.

Overlooked in last year's Annual Report we now acknowledge Keith Williams 43 years service to the Scoresby Club which came to a conclusion when he retired at the end of the 1992/93 season. Keith was a most talented batsman, while off the field he served the club in most administrative positions. An interesting note is that Keith did not wear batting gloves.

LOOKING BACK

The 1966/67 Rule Book consisted of 20 pages of rules with 47 rules. The 1993/94 book consisted of 72 pages of rules with 147 rules and with a great percentage of those rules having many parts. And we try to tell ourselves we have streamlined the administration.

Until 1962/63 the Junior competition was known as D Grade.

In the war years 1941/42 - 1944/45 only one grade was played. In 1945/46 three senior grades were played and this remained constant until 1960/61 when a fourth senior grade was established.

As well as being Treasurer for 50 years Bob Bisset also represented the Association at the cricket Union for 14 years.

It is interesting to note that we had more senior clubs in the Association in 1972/73 than in the past season, but the number of teams and registered players were almost 2000 lower.

The RDCA conducted a twilight competition from 1975/76 till 1977/78.

Special rules for the Under 12 competition were introduced in 1976/77.

Bill Wilkins assumed the Presidency in 1988/89, after 12 seasons as the Chairman of the Junior Committee.

1980/81 saw the introduction of computerised registration and results sheets.

The first printed Annual Report was produced in 1979/80.

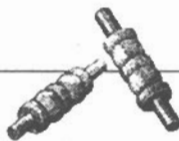
Ringwood's 1956/57 top grade premiership was its 6th successive pennant, a record which will be almost impossible to break.

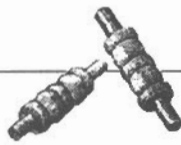

TREASURER'S REPORT

In submitting my third financial report as Treasurer, I am pleased to advise that our actual income exceeded expenditure by \$1,022 during the year. This was achieved by exercising extreme care over the money spent on behalf of the Association.
