

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is with great pleasure that I report to you that the 1990-91 season was a good one for the Ringwood & District Cricket Association.

I was particularly delighted with the general on-field behaviour of most players in all games of the Association which means less work by the Tribunal Members.

Thanks to the Committees of the Clubs concerned who took action to ensure that the behaviour of all their players was in keeping with the Code of Behaviour which is now included as Appendix (7) of our Rules.

The close competition, particularly in the top grades probably resulted from the executive's decision to reduce Chandler and A Grade to 12 Teams. The last two games games held a special interest in Chandler as it was possible for any one of ten teams to finish in last position and thus be relegated. Congratulations to Crovdon North who again deservedly won the Chandler Shield Although we all expressed some fear and trepidation when the rule regarding slow over rates was introduced, the change proved to be an unqualified success. We all revelled in the knowledge that cricket would finish each week closer to 6 than to 7.

Our Vote Count Night and Presentation Night were each an excellent entertainment. The Vote Count turned out to be a real heart-stopper with 4 cricketers featuring in a tie for the Chandler Shield Best & Fairest Award (The W.D. Dean Medal), another indication of the closeness of the competition this season.

The Presentation Night was held at the new York on Lilvdale Reception Centre and, in my opinion, was the best yet, due to some very hard work by Lindsay Trollope, Ann & Steve Pascoe and the Management of the York on Lilydale. Our Maestro of the computer, Ken Dunham has further consolidated the computerisation of our Records and Results and once again was able to produce accurate statistics for personal performances, points and ladders within a few days of the completion of each match.

Ken is a real wizard in his field and he works long and hard in his little office to keep us informed of our position on the ladder, but he readily admits that his work is useless if the Clubs do not submit accurate, timely records of match results. In the great majority of instances the Clubs do forward their Result Sheets in accordance with the Rules and on behalf of the othe Clubs and the Association I thank you all for your diligence in this regard.

The Executive of the Association have all worked well in the interests of Cricket and none more so than our Secretary, Lindsay Trollope.

Lindsay is unique in his organising ability of cricket activities and we are very fortunate to have Lindsay available to us on an almost full time basis.

The continued success of the Association is mainly due to his personal effort and professional expertise, and he enjoys excellent support from his wife, Bev., in presenting a formidable administrative team to overcome all the problems that arise throughout the season.

My thanks and congratulations on your behalf to the Members of the Executive for a job well done. I trust that cricket in the R.D.C.A. continues to prosper in the future and that each of you continues to enjoy your contribution to the game.

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The 70th Annual Meeting of the Association was held on Friday 17th August 1990 and heralded in another cricket season. Bill Wilkins was re-elected President for his 3rd term and we were pleased to welcome Pat Meehan onto the Executive as the Secretary of the Umpires Assocition. The weather in September was great and we looked forward to a great opening on the 1st Saturday in October, however the inaccuracy of Peter Sumich meant the cricket season opened on Sunday 7th October (1st time in R.D.C.A. History) and, by the time the last ball was bowled on Sunday 24th March, another great season had been conducted. Very little time was lost due to inclement weather and with the new grade structure proving highly successful the composition of the final fours in the major grades was not known until the final day of the Home and Home Series. In Chandler (1) it was possible for 11 of the 12 teams to make the finals with 2 rounds to go. The work of the Tribunal was less than in previous seasons and this indicates a vast improvement in player conduct. Croydon North won their second successive Premiership and details of all finals are in the "Finals Round-up" segment of this report. Congratulations, of course, are extended to Wonga Park and Knox City who have secured promotion to Chandler and "A" Grades respectively by virtue of their

Once again the off-the-field work of the Association was heavy and to all members of the Executive I express my own personal thanks for their continued assistance. The purchase of the Association's own computer again allowed streamlining of the administration and this will gain further impetus in 1991/92 when all financial records are computerised. My preparation of the statistical side of this report has been produced by some 30 hours due to the information obtained direct from the computer.

Clubs will be asked to make a decision regarding the erection of the administration facilities at Kilsyth. Also an increase in funding is necessary and again clubs will be asked to approve an Executive recommendation.

The Vote Count and Presentation Functions were held at York on Lilvdale and both were highly successful, although we believe that we should again have a Guest Speaker at the former.

Due to inclement weather the under 21 Team were really given no chance of making the finals, but to all players we express our appreciation for the manner in which they represented the Association. Neil Tull was again his highly effecient self in his management of the Team. Congratulations should also go to the highly successful under age R.D.C.A. Teams who scored success after success during the season. To the Junior Committee we give our gratitute. With so many other sports competing for under age competitors the importance of our junior administration cannot be underestimated. Secretary Neville Bradshaw is, of course a member of the Senior Executive and he maintains the close liason which is necessary for the future of the R.D.C.A.

Our publicity this year was handled by "The Pascoes" (Rachel, Ann and Steve) and I believe that this was the best year for the coverage given by the Press. Late in the season, the local FM Station commenced full time operations and "Yours Truly" featured in a sports show on Fridays and Sundays.

1990/91 was a good year and there were very few matters which caused any serious problems and much of this success must be due to the excellent leadership provided by Bill Wilkins.

In keeping with the high level of Chandler 1 we were able to provide 2 umpires to many games in that grade after Round 3. In finals matches we again welcomed the addition of volunteer umpires.

Many of our umpires again officiated at Inter-Association games for Seniors and Juniors. The Veteran's Final was also officiated at by R.D.C.A. Umpires.

The Umpires have expressed the view that on field behaviour by players had shown a marked improvement in Season 1990/91. Some players and clubs shall of course, need to examine their approach to the game, control by umpires and self-control by players is essential if we are all going to enjoy the game of cricket. I must add that the finals and all grades were played in a spirit of great competitiveness and all players and officials must be congratulated.

On behalf of all umpires I express our thanks to captains, players, other club members, the Ladies for their assistance and hospitality during the Season. A particular note of thanks to all scorers.

The introduction of penalties for slow over rates introduced into the R.D.C.A. this past season proved highly successful. The majority of games were completed close to 6.00 p.m. enabling players and umpires alike to enjoy the Clubs hospitality prior to making other commitments.

I appeal to all Clubs to encourage ex-players to return to umpiring to make our objective of 2 umpires in all Chandler 1 matches and one umpire in all other grades not just a pipe-dream but a reality.

In my first year as Umpires' Association Secretary, I pass on my thanks to my predessor Ron Ellis, for his continued assistance. Ron set a high standard and is a hard act to follow. My thanks also to our President, Ken Dunham not only for his work with our Umpires but for his enormous contribution to the R.D.C.A.

Lilydale Cricket Club shared in the VC.A Development Grant and I urge all clubs to look at this scheme when funds are expended on other than the normal day to day expenses.

FINALS ROUND-UP

However, Croydon North showed exactly why they are seen as great final performers as, after being dismissed for a moderate 167 their bowlers hit back. United did not recover from the early loss of wickets and were all out for a most disappointing 80. United came back in the middle stages of North's second innings but the result was really never in doubt from the end of the 1st innings.

Although at times Warrandyte's Chandler 2 batsmen were ultra defensive, their score of 9/312 at the compulsory closure was always going to be hard for Ainslie Park to beat although at one stage it appeared likely the runs would be attained. However a mid-innings collapse enabled the Warrandyte Club to score its first Senior Pennant since 1984.

Ainsle Park got compensation when they were much too powerful for a disappointing Croydon United in Chandler 3.

It looked odds on for the Southerners to move into Chandler in 1991/92 but a tremendous overall bowling and fielding performance by Wonga Park once again denied Wantirna South the prize.

North Ringwood's shock at missing out on the "A1" Final after being defeated in the Semi-Final was somewhat compensated by their defeat of Scoresby to take the A2 Pennant.

Wantirna South took its second successive 'A3'
Premiership when they were too strong for a determined

SOME INTERESTING FACTS FROM SEASON 1990/91

- Since the top grade became Chandler Shield (1966/67)
 Croydon North became the fifth team to achieve back-to-back premierships (three in a row not yet achieved).
- Croydon United's performance to come from "A"
 Grade (1989/90) to finish in on top after the home and
 home series was the best performance of any team
 promoted. However before any person tells us there is very
 little gap between the 2 top grades let me give you this
 interesting fact. Of the last 12 "A" Grade Premiers
 promoted to Chandler Shield, 8 have, at some stage, been
 demoted back to "A" Grade.
- Wonga Park emulated Croydon United by winning "A"
 Grade from 4th place. The similarities are quite uncanny
 as both needed good wins in the final round to make the
 finals and both, of course, played the hot favourites for the
 "A" pennant.
- Sympathy should be extended to Kilsyth. Needing a win to stay in the four in A1, their batsmen had to make 405 to win and achieved this only to find out that they had been "pipped" by Wonga Park who scored in excess of 500.
- Jay Sansom (Norwood) scored his 5000th senior run during the season Jay has also taken in excess of 350 wickets.

- Kilsyth's batsmen had a great year and scored ten partnerships in excess of 100 runs, with the top one being between D. Ralston and P. Ceeney (208 for 2nd wicket) in A4. R. Irvine figured in three 100+ partnerships in A1.
- Norwood's Stewart Hill and Andy Haines broke a 31 year old opening partnership record when they scored 253 against Lilvdale in Chandler 3. The original record was established in the club's first-ever season (1959-60) by Kevin O'Bryan and Dave Jamieson (Club Founder).
- Round 5 Chandler 4 Mooroolbark at 4.15 p.m. 1st day were 9/134 when 17 year old Travis Flanagan joined captain Neville Roper. Croydon United's batsmen were looking forward to 1½ hours at the crease. At 6.00 p.m. Mooroolbark were 9/334 with Neville on 106 n.o. and Travis on 102 n.o. A 10th wicket partnership of 200 (probably a R.D.C.A. record).
- God bless me if the following game Mooroolbark Ch 4 are again in some degree of trouble with Lilydale's bowlers having the Barkers 8/128 Travis Flanagan is joined by 13 year old Philip Lovell and when Philip is dismissed some 95 minutes later 198 runs had been added and Travis finished with 134 n.o. 236 runs in 2 innings for a player considered to be a most promising fast bowler but a novice with a bat.
- The eveness of Chandler 1 competition was shown when Croydon North (Premiers) and Mooroolbark (11th) both lost 5 games during the home and home games. The difference was that Croydon North won 6 games while in Mooroolbark's games in 2 rounds were curtailed by rain and ended in draws. In 1989/90 the team finishing last in Chandler 1 was 66.4 points from the four. In 1990/91 the bottom team was 20.2 points from the fourth team.
- In 1989/90 only 4 teams who finished on top of their respective ladders went on to win the premiership. This season 9/14 succeeded.
- Ainslie Park Chandler 5 went through season undefeated.
- Give some thought for North Ringwood the only loss for their Al Grade was in Semi-Final and their CH 5 game the Final.
- South Croydon needing a win in the final round to avoid relegation to "A" Grade in 1991/92 played host to third placed Vermont. The Southerners displayed their best form for the season to send Vermont plummetting from the four only to hear that 11th placed East Ringwood also rose to the occasion by dispatching Ainslie Park to the also rans. Another classic example of the eveness of Chandler in 1990/91.
